The Christmas Fund 2014

The generous gifts of UCC congregations and individuals to the Christmas Fund enabled the Pension Boards’ Ministerial Assistance program to provide some form of ministerial assistance to impact the lives of hundreds of persons during the past year.

- **Christmas “Thank You” gift checks** totaling \$235,800 were sent to 543 retired UCC clergy/lay church employees. This special gift at Christmas time reminds these Veterans of the Cross that they have not been forgotten.
- **Monthly pension supplementation** for 408 lower-income retired UCC clergy/lay employees. Our retired clergy/lay employees relied on this income supplementation for basic needs such as food, utilities, living and/or medical expenses. Pension supplementation totaled \$1,342,000 in 2013.
- **Quarterly health premium supplementation** for 239 lower-income retired UCC clergy/lay employees. These funds subsidized premiums for the UCC Medicare Supplement Health Plan with Rx so that individuals could afford/receive quality health care. Assistance totaled \$508,000 in 2013.
- **Emergency grants** for 65 active or retired UCC clergy/lay employees. Grants assist in covering unexpected costs such as: large medical expenses or home damage resulting from natural disasters.



Your gifts are needed more than ever to help the growing number of retirees whose low income annuities make it difficult to meet increased living costs. 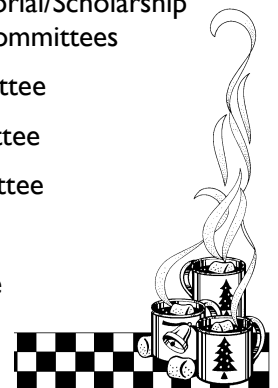

FROM THE PASTOR

In the Advent season we prepare for Christ's birth. In preparing for his birth, we also think of his death. Almost everything in the Gospels either told of how Old Testament prophecy applied to Jesus or else pointed to his passion and resurrection.

The favorite Old Testament lessons for Advent come from Isaiah. I think we have all read this:

*For a child has been born for us,
a son given to us;
authority rests upon his shoulders;
and he is named
Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God,
Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.*

Isaiah the prophet is writing at a time of great tumult, like the time Jesus lived in. The Jews have lost their independence and are now ruled by a great empire. The people wish to be free again. Isaiah rights about a different kind of King:

*For he grew up before him like a young plant,
and like a root out of dry ground;
he had no form or majesty that we should look at him,
nothing in his appearance that we should desire him.
He was despised and rejected by others;
a man of suffering and acquainted with infirmity;
and as one from whom others hide their faces
he was despised, and we held him of no account.*

After the trauma of the crucifixion and resurrection, the followers of Jesus saw in Isaiah clues to understanding Jesus and his mission. Isaiah goes on to describe the suffering servant.

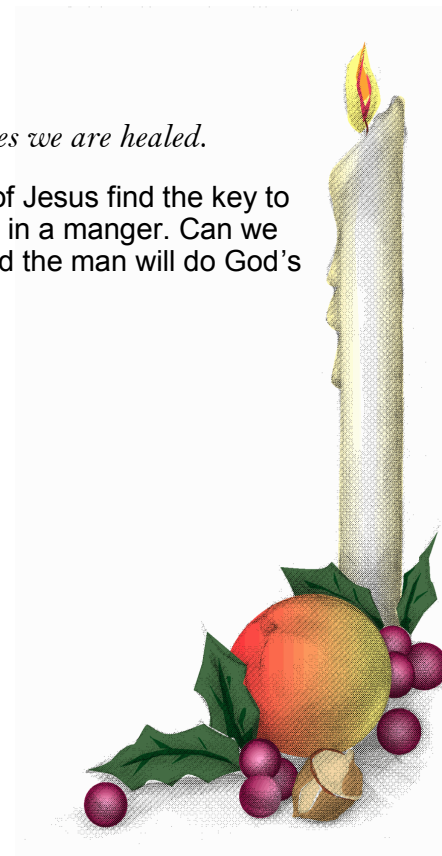
*Surely he has borne our infirmities and carried our diseases;
yet we accounted him stricken, struck down by God, and afflicted.
But he was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities;
upon him was the punishment that made us whole, and by his bruises we are healed.*

And so, in a book written 500 years before Jesus was born, the first followers of Jesus find the key to understand Jesus' life and message. We love the baby Jesus, so fragile, lying in a manger. Can we also love the man so fragile tied to the tree? The baby will become the man and the man will do God's good work.

*The righteous one, my servant, shall make many righteous,
and he shall bear their iniquities.
Therefore I will allot him a portion with the great,
and he shall divide the spoil with the strong;
because he poured out himself to death,
and was numbered with the transgressors;
yet he bore the sin of many,
and made intercession for the transgressors.*

May God intercede for us. May we lay all our sins at the feet of Jesus that he may count us among the righteous.

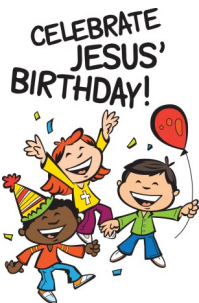
