SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE AWARDS

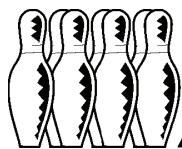
In April three high school seniors submitted applications for church scholarships.

June is Myasthenis Gravis Awareness Month, National Scleroderma Awareness Month, Home Safety Month, National Scoliosis Awareness Month, and June 1st - July 4th is Fireworks Safety Month. June 1st is National Cancer Survivors Day. The 1st -7th is National Headache Awareness Week. June 8 -14 is Sun Safety Week. The 9th -15th is National Men's Health week.

It was just brought to my attention that many children sleep through smoke alarms due to their sleep patterns. I just spoke with an Auburn fireman and he told me that there are voice activated alarms available from electrical stores. The alarm has the parent's voice recorded and it yells to the child to get up. The children respond to the voice and wake up in seconds.

1773-1786

A few years ago I read and copied a ledger that was stored in the town hall basement. I don't believe this book has been read in the last two hundred years. It is a complete record of the step -by-step decisions made by our men in building our meetinghouse and forming our town.

Hearof feall not and make due return of your Doings here in hous of the Subscribers on or before the Said 27 Day of August.

Liard Apple Cake

Preheat oven @ 350 degrees.

Ingredients:

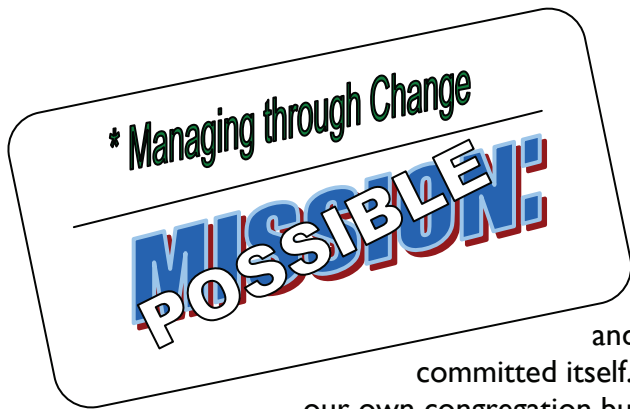
3 Cups Flour	3 Eggs
½ tsp Salt	2 Cups Sugar
1 tsp Baking Soda	1 Cup Oil
2 tsp Cinnamon	2 tsp Vanilla
3 Cups Unpeeled, Cored, Chopped Apples	1 Cup Chopped Nuts (optional)

Sift dry ingredients into large bowl. Mix in apples & nuts.

Beat eggs into sugar, one at a time until fluffy. Add Oil; beat well; add vanilla.

Stir mixture into dry ingredients. Blend well. Batter will be stiff.

Pour into 13x9 pan or tube pan. Bake for 40 – 60 minutes until inserted toothpick comes out clean. Enjoy!

Library Tidings by Gloria Whitehead

THE CHURCH LIBRARIES ARE NOT TAKING A VACATION THIS SUMMER

Instead, they're sending out a message that when "the livin' is easy" and "the fish are jumpin'" it's time to forget the "slippin' and the slidin'" and the "gasin' and the ridin'" AND start "travelin' by readin'" some of the great books - ADULT and CHILDREN'S - in the children's library. Remember that it's at the end of the hall from the vestry where church services are being held during renovations of the sanctuary.

The following books being reviewed will be on display in the temporary library corner (TLC).

Bud Not Buddy by Christopher Paul Curtis is a book that Ron and Connie Hanks have been recommending lately for adults to read. It's listed among books for children 8 and up. We reviewed this book several years ago and everyone says it's a good book.

The year is '36 i.e., 1936. The place—Flint, Michigan. His age - 10. His momma? He's motherless and his father is a mystery man but Bud thinks there is a clue in flyers his momma left him on Herman Calloway and his Dusty Devastators of the Depression. Bud's suitcase holds his treasures and NOTHING is going to stop him from finding this band leader - his dad? It's an adventure and amazing lesson wrapped up in one award recipient that you won't want to miss.

You've probably heard of the author Deepak Chopra, M.D. whose book, The Seven Spiritual Laws of Success, sold well over a million copies. Following this, he received so many letters from people, he was inspired to write The Seven Spiritual Laws for Parents. It's an effective translation for children of the first book. He begins with the fact that success depends on who you are, NOT on what you did. His concern is that parents must nourish their children's spiritual needs in this world of chaos and instability. We are responsible for as many children as possible to grow up in a civilization that has been transformed by love and compassion. There's a listing of 7 laws for success and the following is a listing re-phrased so that children will be able to understand and use them.

- 1st law - Everything is possible
- 2nd law - If you want to get something - give
- 3rd law - When you make a choice, you change the future
- 4th law - Don't say no - go with the flow
- 5th law - Every time you wish or want, you plant a seed
- 6th law - Enjoy the journey
- 7th law - You are here for a reason

Every child has a spiritual life already. How come? Because we are born into the space of creativity and unspoiled awareness that is spirit.

Is it getting complicated? Not really. You might need to read some sentences twice but the understanding becomes 2 x's as clear.

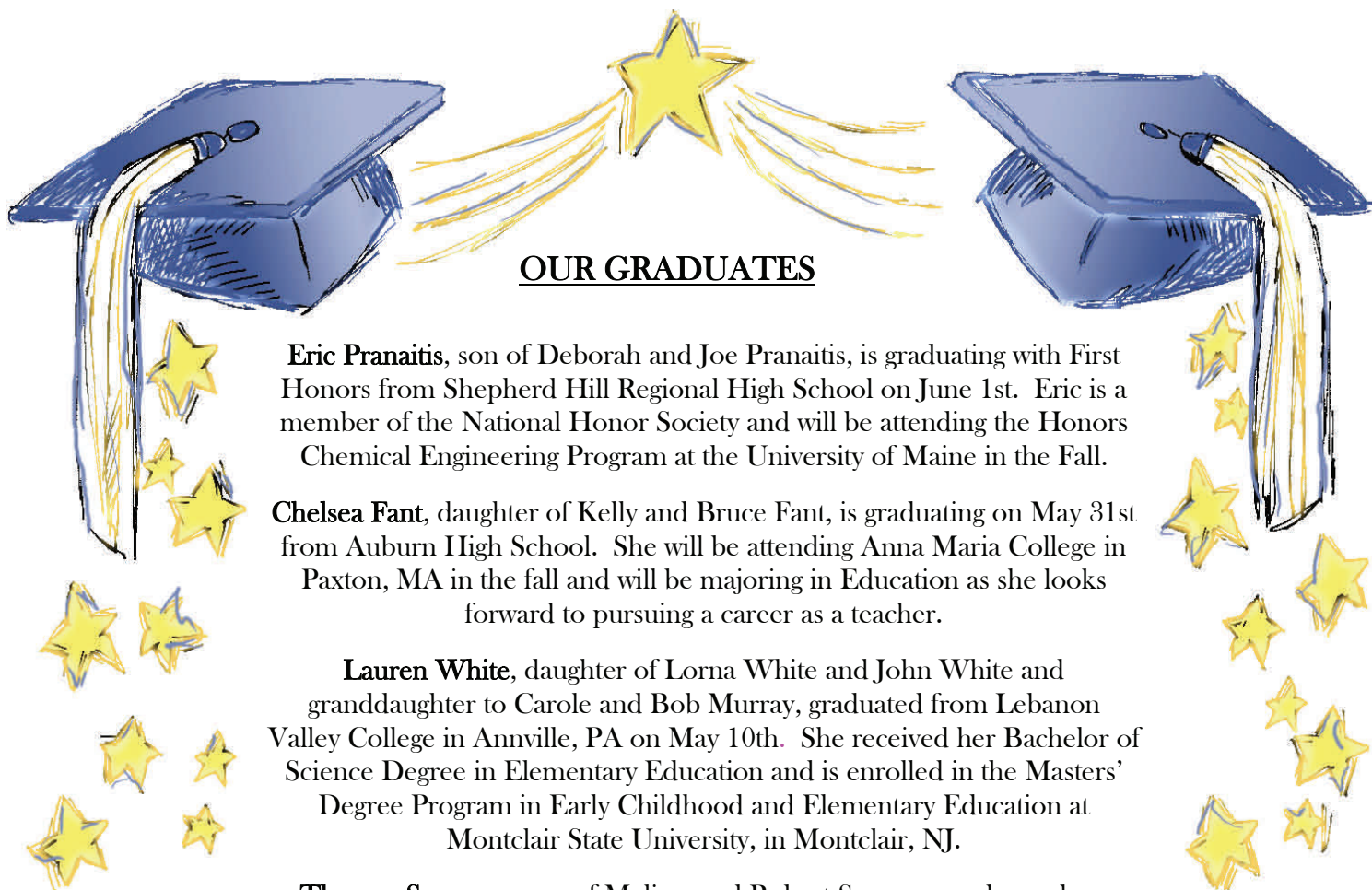
