## FROM THE PASTOR - God is Never Changing

I do not think we, Americans, like the idea of eternal, never-ending things. Take tattoos, for example. Tattoos are permanent. They cost more to remove, than to get. There are rules about being sober and old enough to get one. We want tattoos to be a sober, mature decision since they will be with you all your life. I think most tattoos are sober, sane decisions. There is great art in tattooing. Tattoos can have a great effect on a person's idea of themselves. I know people who think tattoos make them more pretty. Or help them to honor and remember a beloved person who has died. According to *The Week* magazine, 23% of women and 19% of American men have a tattoo. Also according to *The Week*, I am just a little too old for a tattoo; 30-39 year olds are most likely to have a tattoo (38%). Then it drops off as the cohorts get older with only 12% of 50-64 year olds having a tattoo.

I am not opposed to tattoos. There are great artists who do wonderful work. I like tattoo TV shows that show what artists can do with a difficult canvas - human, living skin.

The Army gave me some tattoo prejudice. Tattoos were for the Navy and Marines, not the Army. This was made clear by sergeants and senior officers. Though a soldier could not get punished just for getting a tattoo, they could (and would) find another reason to punish a soldier if they ever found out he had gotten a tattoo on active duty.

I find the only reason I do not get a tattoo is permanence. I do not think I can love any piece of art for the rest of my life. According to *The Week*, tattoo removals have increased 32% in 2012. So I am right to wonder if that tattoo will still be an asset in 20 years. Could we accept a tattoo that no longer seems perfect? Could we live with a love that does not live up to our (high?) expectations?

My old neighbor was a Navy man in World War II. He had a tattoo on the inside of his forearm. We shared a driveway so we were close. I asked him about the tattoo, did he like it? He replied, "I would not get it again, but it is part of me and I could not imagine myself without it." My neighbor had run a business, raised a family, been a deacon, a trustee and many other things. The tattoo was a reminder that he had once been a young sailor out, literally, to take on the world. That sailor would always be a part of who he was.

So with God - God does not change, but we change. As we change, our understanding of God changes. "When I was a child, I talked like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I put the ways of childhood behind me."

It is hard to move into a mature place with God. Life can be hard on our faith. God can feel so close we can touch Him. At other times He feels as distant from us as the far side of the universe. For many, God seems distant in times of crisis. For me, I feel the distance more in normal times than in crisis.



We have received news that our friend/host in Haiti, Franceli Joseph, is healing well and is expected to make a full recovery. Thank you all for your prayers and concern. Check out this month's newsletter from Monadnock Bible Conference at www.monadnockbible.org for more information.

Now that the crisis has past, Randy and I are moving forward with our plans to return to Haiti as part of another medical mission team this fall. The dates are September 30th to October 9th. It is a slightly longer trip than we have done before, 10 days instead of a week. We will be venturing out of Port-Au-Prince to some more remote areas for the clinics. At least that is the plan as of this moment; as with any mission trip, plans are ALWAYS subject to change based on weather and other conditions.

Of course, because the trip is longer it is more expensive. This year's trip is \$1,700 per person. The funds include food, travel, lodging as well as some of the medical supplies we will be taking with us and purchasing in Haiti. The Outreach Committee has generously supported us by paying our \$500 deposit....so we're on our way, but we still need your help. If you would like to help, please speak to Randy or me or you can give your donations directly to Lori Stockhaus.

As we get closer to departure, probably some time this summer, I will have a list of over the counter medicines we will also be collecting for our trip. "Love In Motion," the division of MBC that runs the mission trips, has another medical team going to Haiti in March. When they return we will have a better feel for exactly where we will be going and what additional items we may need.

We thank you from the bottom of our hearts for your support, your love, and your prayers for the people of Haiti and especially the children.
