**Identity Theft Alert** - It has come to our attention that there is yet another scam being used on unsuspecting individuals. In this con, someone calls posing as a court officer who states that a warrant has been issued for your arrest due to your failure to show up for jury duty. The caller claims to be a jury coordinator, and when you protest that you never received a summons for jury duty, they request your social security number and date of birth in order to cancel the arrest warrant. Don't be the next victim—**remember always to be on guard when someone calls asking for your personal information.**

We've also been informed of another phone scam where a caller identifies himself as a telephone company employee conducting a test on the telephone lines. He states that to complete the test he needs you to touch nine (9), zero (0), the pound sign (#) and then hang up. By pushing 90#, you give the requesting individual full access to your telephone line, which enables them to place long distance calls and bill them to your home phone number. **DO NOT press 90# for ANYONE.**

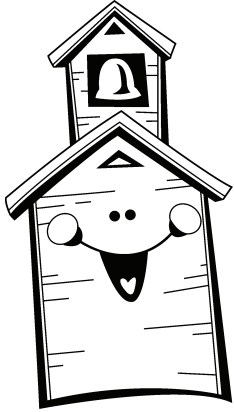

### Library Tidings

A couple of weeks ago, five wonderful ladies put \$25 into my hand for a book for the Children's Library, or the Adult Library would be O.K. as well—"your choice". My mind was blank. Perhaps you remember when Heather mentioned a couple of "heavenly happenings" (h.h.) in her "Musical Notes" in the *Tidings*. So be it. A couple of days after receiving this special gift, a book titled *How To Raise an American* was being discussed on the radio—another h.h., and it covers both children and adults. Myrna Blyth, a best-selling author, former editor-in-chief of the *Ladies Home Journal*, columnist for the *National Review Online*, etc. and Chriss Winston, the first woman to have headed the White House Office of Speechwriting, has been a deputy assistant of labor and heads her own communications consultancy, Corporate Word, together have written *How to Raise an American* with one big purpose. Kids today are bombarded with a lot of negative images in T.V., movies, music, and even in the classroom. In some cases it's cool to bash America and the patriotism gap is widening. To quote Theodore Roosevelt, "We want to make our children feel that the mere fact of being Americans makes them better off . . . This is not to blind us at all to our own shortcomings; we ought steadily to try to correct them; but we have absolutely no grounds to work on if we don't have firm and ardent Americanism at the bottom of everything."

## Prudential Committee

The Prudential Committee suggests that one of the ways you could donate to the Sanctuary Renovation Fund is to transfer stock to the Church's brokerage account. You would get the benefit of a tax deduction for the full value of the stock, plus avoid paying capital gains tax if the stock has appreciated in value since it was acquired.

Another way a donation could be affected (if you are 70 ½ years of age or older) is to transfer funds from an IRA directly to the Church's Sanctuary Fund. You avoid paying income taxes on the gift amount and the church receives the full transferred value. However, the donor cannot claim a charitable contribution.

### Listening Process Leads to Recommendations

Our Work in Progress, our Massachusetts Conference UCC growth initiative, is making progress of its own! A series of listening sessions, designed to help us understand how to nurture local church vitality as well as the covenant among the churches, has been completed with recommendations based on this feedback submitted to our Board of Directors. Approximately 500 people participated in one of 33 listening sessions held around Massachusetts this past January. They were asked to respond to the following questions:

Based on 5 areas of vitality (Worship Attendance, Mission Outreach, Faith Formation, Stewardship & Connection to UCC) where do you want your church to be in 5 years? How can Conference resources be deployed to help your congregation get from where you are to where you expect to be in 5 years? Keeping in mind the resources of the Conference, how has the Conference blessed your ministry in the past? The Listening Steering Committee analyzed findings from these sessions. From there, they formed recommendations on key congregational needs and priorities which the Conference can champion to help our churches grow. They are:

#### Essential Ministry #1: Adult Faith Formation and Action

Our local churches want to grow in Christian faith and in attracting more people to attend worship and join their churches. They seek tools that will help them develop a more meaningful faith journey as well as transform the world in God's name. To this end, they would like the Conference to provide a full range of staff and program resources.

#### Essential Ministry #2: Conference Support in Times of Transition, Change and Conflict

Our local churches depend upon the Conference for expertise, guidance and staff presence at two crucial times: when faith communities face a change in pastoral leadership and when churches are in conflict or crisis. Strong professional support, leadership and resources are required, even more so than at other times.

#### Essential Ministry #3: Lay and Clergy Leadership Development

Our local churches thrive when gifted and spiritual, lay and clergy leaders are in place. The churches are asking the Conference to manage the process of identifying, supporting, training and nurturing those who will lead us in the years ahead. The UCC tradition is that leaders always come out of the pews at the local level. Once they begin that journey, the Conference can become a resource of depth to walk with them along the way.

#### Essential Ministry #4: Fostering Community and Connections Among Our Churches

Many of our churches and their leaders desire more connectedness, communication and collaboration among and between our faith communities. They look to the Conference to be the agent which brings them together, like the hub at the center of a wheel.

A dynamic group of committed UCC lay and clergy members from around the state came together to form the Listening Process Steering Committee. They were able to witness, firsthand, the meaning and resonance of our denomination and the important road God is unfolding ahead for us. In the words of Committee Chair, Rev. John Hudson, "Though at times the work was hard and the outcome unclear, Christ's spirit of community and joy bound us together and gave us all the tools we needed to get the work done. It is an exciting and challenging time to be the United Church of Christ in Massachusetts. Thank God!"

The Committee's findings and recommendations will be used, along with other research and analyses, to create an initial proposal for the direction of the Conference. Both will be presented at the Annual Meeting in June.

### Hymn of the Month

(In honor of Memorial Day) the hymn of the month is *My Country, 'Tis of Thee* written by Samuel Smith, a native Bostonian born in 1808. Samuel attended Harvard and Andover Seminary, developing a lifelong passion for evangelism. He was inspired by the tune *America* (used in Great Britain for *God Save the Queen*) and wrote his own patriotic hymn within half an hour. *My Country* was first sung at Boston's Park Street Congregational Church.

### Parade News

It has a decided gospel feel and is difficult to sing without wanting to clap along!
- Joyful Noyse will also sing with soundtrack for Children's Sunday on May 20th. We *Have Gathered Here* is a Latin American praise song based on Psalm 92:1,2.

Recently, I came across John Wesley's rules of singing reproduced in 1964 and 1988 in the United Methodist hymnals. Some rules are written below:

- I. *Sing All* . . . "Even those tired or poor of voice. Those who refuse to sing withdraw themselves from the communion of those gathered in worship."
- II. *Sing Lustily and with Good Courage*
- III. *Sing in Time*
- IV. *Above all, Sing Spiritually*
