FROM OUR INTERIM PASTOR

As you may know, I spent my high school years living in South Florida. A while ago, I was browsing through Zillow and found myself looking at a condo in the area where I lived. One thing led to another and now several times a week I get an email from Zillow inviting me to look at another condo. This may never stop – south Florida has zillions of condos; small ones, huge ones, single story, townhouse – you name it and you can find it there.

Most of the condos I see fall into one of two categories: if they were built before 1970, they are usually no more than three stories, there are no interior corridors, a common laundry room, and the balcony/screened in room faces on a corridor. After 1970, more and more of the condos are in much taller buildings, have interior corridors, personal laundry facilities, and the balconies or screened in rooms do not face a corridor.

It is a lot harder to get to know your neighbors in the newer buildings. You don't meet people while you're doing laundry; you rarely see people walking down the corridors and so on. But in those old buildings, it is almost impossible not to get to know one another. Folks sit out in their screened room, drinking coffee and the neighbors walk by, or you visit in the laundry room, and so on.

That's just one way in which our world has changed over the last fifty or sixty years, but it's an important sign. It's much harder today to create and sustain community, not just in south Florida condos, but all around – including right here in our town. A town without solid community is a place filled with loneliness, and it is never healthy for everyone to live isolated from one another. It's quite possible that the single most important thing in building a good, safe, friendly town is creating, supporting and maintaining a sense of community. Churches have an important part in that work. We are one of the few organizations in a town that talks about goodness, right-ness, justice, help, and love on a regular basis. We are a place where everyone is welcome, where new people are welcomed. At our best, we are one of the prime creators of community in our area.

Social scientists report that organizations which depend on bringing people together are struggling; folks have a diminished interest in participating. Most of the books I've read on this say that people have just lost interest, but now I'm wondering if this isn't also because when we build housing in ways that make it difficult for neighbors to see and talk with one another, we forget how important it is to do so. We used to have, say, four foot wire fences between yards; now, often, we have six foot stockade fencing. Six foot fences slow the deer down, but make it really hard to talk over the fence.

Are there fences in our lives that keep us apart from our neighbors? Are there invisible fences around our church which keep people from stepping in our doors? We know that welcoming new people and making them a part of our church is important for us, but did we realize that having a strong, vibrant church is important for the health of Auburn as well?

Let's think this month about ways in which we can help build community and tear down the walls that divide us.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The last few Sundays, Michele and I have been teaching the Sunday School children some of Jesus' parables. The three that we have been focusing on are: the Parable of the Mustard Seed, the Parable of the Sower and the Parable of the Good Samaritan. A student from my class asked, "Why does Jesus teach through parables, when he is already preaching about the same thing in the temples and in the streets?"

I love it when the students ask good questions!!! To be honest, I do not have a fancy theological education. I must research and learn each week, before every class I lead. But I have seen and experienced, the work of God in real life. The lessons that we learn from Jesus are sewn into the fabric of the lives we make for ourselves. As a mother, I have had the privilege (and challenge) to see those same lessons sewn into the lives of my children. So when a student asks me a question such as this one, my answer is based on how I have lived it personally.

Here is my answer: If you think of Jesus as the teacher and all of us his students, you can understand that our job is to learn. Jesus, so many years ago, recognized that his students all learn differently. With different education levels and different neurodevelopment, we learn at a different pace and comprehend things better when a topic is presented differently to us, than our peers. Jesus is the greatest example of a teacher. He made sure that every single person had the opportunity to hear and learn and follow the rules of God. Jesus preached, he broke bread, he told stories with deep meaning and he led by example! He taught the same lessons over and over again, using different vehicles for understanding. The parables that Jesus taught are relevant even today. We should follow Jesus' example and use all the tools, including the parables, at our disposal to teach children about God and what our responsibilities are as Christians.

Having the privilege to teach the children of our community has offered me a bit of awareness that the Holy Spirit lives inside me. I have the guidance of Jesus, the greatest teacher of all time, to reach as many children as is possible.

John 14:26 ESV "But the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, he will teach you all things and bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you."

As we begin to look to next year, we will need one part-time teacher for 2 mornings a week, perfect for someone looking to get back into working or just getting started. College students welcome, we will work with the right candidate. We always have a need for subs as well, no experience necessary.

As the last full month of our school year begins, I wanted to share some of our favorite activities that get the kids up and moving, especially on these cool, rainy, spring days. Building an obstacle course, either indoors or outside, is a lot of fun and simple to do using everyday items. Dancing, just put on any music and get grooving, or play the freeze dance by randomly stopping the music and striking a pose. To practice shape/ letter/number recognition, write numbers/letters or draw shapes on the driveway and hop from one to another and call out the name of what you land on.

Some other less active activities that we love, Playdoh! It is so great for increasing finger/hand strength as well as their imagination. Add some child-safe scissors to the Playdoh and practice cutting. Getting a lot of junk mail? Let your littles help rip it up. Show them how to use their pointer and thumb to grab the top of the paper and tear, such a huge lesson to learn, especially when it comes to opening juice box straws. I love using washable markers on my windows, or sliding glass door; we play tic-tac-toe to practice letter/number formation or just draw pictures, and it's so easy to clean the markers off the glass. And always Read, Read, Read, there is nothing better.

We still have openings for the 2024-25 school year if you know of anyone looking for a great preschool experience, please send them our way.

We will begin collecting linens for our final clothing drive of the school year on May 19. Once again, we can take clothes, shoes, belts, purses, sheets, blankets, curtains, etc., as well as books.
