What Are Your Childhood Memories of Thanksgiving?

I can remember waking to the aroma of turkey in the oven. Even now when I am the cook I like to put the turkey in early and go back to bed so I can wake to the mouth-watering aroma. It is a reminder not to fill up on cereal because the feast is coming soon.

Thanksgiving was just family, mostly my mom, brother and I. After the meal I would go out to play. My favorite Thanksgiving was the one when we got 6 inches of snow. I made a fort and snow angels, but no sledding because all our sled runs ended at the lake and the lake was not frozen yet.

I enjoyed the quiet Thanksgiving of just the three of us. I have more memories of Thanksgiving as an adult. The joy of cooking the feast for people you love. At the age of 23, I cooked my first Thanksgiving in Germany for fellow single lieutenants. I have cooked a turkey, if not the full meal, every year since. It was the most fun, the more people we had. One year I had 5 foster boys, aged 20, 18, 15, 10, and 9, plus Jenny and me. That was a loud Thanksgiving.

Our tradition with the boys was to eat turkey and the fixings for early lunch. Maybe as early as 11:00. Then walk to the movie theater to see an appropriate movie for the holiday. If I got my way, it was an animated movie. My teenage boys would protest seeing a kid's film, but I think they secretly enjoyed a chance to be a kid a little longer. Then after the movie was leftovers of turkey and the first taste of dessert.

The older the boy, the more work he had in preparing the meal. The youngest set the table, while older boys/men mashed potatoes, helped carry serving dishes to the table, etc. But the turkey was my responsibility. I enjoy being in the kitchen on Thanksgiving, even if I despise the kitchen on other days. A loud, crazy Thanksgiving kitchen and table is the most fun.

The Passover includes a requirement to invite others to your house. It reads, "Each man is to take a lamb for his family, one for each household. If any household is too small for a whole lamb, they must share one with their nearest neighbor, having taken into account the number of people there are. You are to determine the amount of lamb needed in accordance with what each person will eat."

It is a nice tradition to invite singletons to Thanksgiving. It mirrors the Lord's command to share the Passover with the neighbors. It is also nice to have a smaller Thanksgiving of just close family. I thank the Stockhauses for again inviting me to their festivities.



Library Tidings by Gloria Whitehead

While thumbing through category #4 (biographies) in the adult library, a book cover bearing the words *Memories of a Persian Childhood* caught my eye. The book's title, *The Blindfold Horse*, gave no clue so that led to the inside flap where first words read, "Iran, land of the nightingale and the rose," and continued, "burst into the American consciousness a decade ago when the Ayatollah's revolution held all the country hostage. Since then Islam has conjured up images of veiled women and angry men, yet we knew little of the civilization that was swept away in 1979, and even less about the Persian traditions and culture that preceded the rise of the Shah and the petrodollar."

That did it! A check on when the book was published revealed 1988 by Beacon Press and written by Shusha Guppy. Wow, the library card revealed that 3/2/93 was the <u>only</u> time someone had borrowed the book. There never could have been a previously discarded card, for the book is in prime condition. But there could be interesting information and history about a geographical area that's been prime in the world news again now and WHAT A GEM! What great providence to have come upon such a treasure in our library. The writing style of Shusha is superlative and, as encompassing in important detail and beauty, it is extraordinary in the depth of humanity. You find yourself turning pages faster than you can believe. The historical information is great — even if you're not a buff — and the accuracy probably equal to a document in most cases.

I should have mentioned earlier that at the very end of the book there is an excellent glossary of Persian words. Don't miss it. The changes in the structure in Persian lifestyle cause one to reflect on our country's current instability. Shusha Guppy's father was recognized as the foremost philosopher of Persia and one of a long line of reknown and influential citizens. But it's the day-to-day activity related in *The Blindfold Horse* that is so moving that I hope to borrow it again.
