#### **Extravagant**

The victory of Christ over death is astonishing. Jesus died, and God the Father raised him up. This was not like the resurrection of Lazarus, who died again of old age. Jesus rose to eternal life in glory with the Father. It is an extravagant display of the majesty of the Lord. It takes the breath away.

But that was then, and this is now, you say. What does that have to do with me? Well, the answer is: Everything. God did not raise Jesus from the dead for his own satisfaction, but for us. Christ did not rise for his own glory, but for ours. We are the point of this event - you, me, all of us.

Easter is not about an ugly worm turning into a butterfly, although butterflies are nice. The transformation of the worm is a rebirth of nature, like the first crocus of spring. We expect it. The resurrection of Christ is not natural. It is supernatural. When we are reborn in Christ it is a supernatural change in our lives. We become different from what we were before, in ways this world cannot bring about.

We grow into Christ in two different ways: (1) God gives us the promise of eternal life, beyond this mortal flesh, and (2) Christ comes to dwell within us now, during our time on this mortal earth. He dwells in us as we let him conform the shape of our lives to his.

We are reborn in Christ through the sacrament of holy Baptism. We grow into Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit working God's grace into our flesh and bones and hearts and minds and wills. Like growing in the flesh from a babe-in-arms to a fully mature adult, growth in the spirit is the process of a lifetime. But like the spurt of the infant from crawling to walking or of the child to the sprawling teenager, spiritual growth in our lives has its dramatic turning points. And we thank God for them.

God is an extravagant giver. Whatever we return in gratitude is a small portion of what he already gives to us, day by day. Stewardship is based on that. All that we have belongs to the Lord. Even the tithe we return is but a trifle in comparison. Receive the joy of the Lord this season - God's extravagant gift.

Greetings from the Central Association. As member churches of the United Church of Christ, we are covenant partners with the national denomination, the Massachusetts Conference, and the Central Association of the UCC. This covenant gifts us with blessings and rights, as well as responsibilities to each body. As such, please consider serving at the Association level by accepting a nomination for the Board of Directors or the Committee on Ministry. Participation of laity on these committees is vital to their integrity. The only requirement is membership in a Central Association church.

The Board calls and plans the Association meetings; has a representative preside over Ecclesiastical Councils, Ordinations, and Installations; meets at least five times through the year to hear reports from standing committee, the Conference and WAMS; serves as trustee for Association assets; creates Ad Hoc Working Groups or Task Forces to benefit the Association; and hears appeals from the Committee on Ministry or Fitness Review determinations. The Board meetings are held on Thursday evenings in Worcester. The term for officers is one year, for Board members two years.

The Committee on Ministry oversees all issues of clergy ordination, licensing, and fitness in the Association, as well as the standing of Association churches. The term is three years, and the Committee meets monthly on the third Thursday from 9am-3pm in Worcester. Partial-term slots are available for people who want to try it out before making a longer commitment. It is a big time commitment, but it is also an awesome, committed group of people doing important work. You will learn much about the denomination, the ordination processes, leadership and ministry.

#### SPAGHETTI SUPPER FUNDRAISER



Throughout the month of March we had some very busy days at *Here We Grow* Preschool. Many new faces were seen in the classrooms since we focus on Parent Volunteer Month. This has been a tradition at HWG for many years. The children had moms and dads who helped for a day and a few parents that were brave enough to do a science experiment. Many of our parents spent time in the classroom by reading a story at the end of sessions. It was also nice to have had some grand-parents spending time with us. The staff and children enjoyed having them.

Neal Primeaux spent two days for class and individual pictures of the children. Thank You to the Board of Christian Ed for allowing us the use of a Sunday school room for the individual pictures to be taken.

We held our Open House on March 9 with about sixty visitors. Once again comments were made on how well kept the church was and how bright and cheerful the classrooms are. At this time we have four openings for 4 year olds and six openings for 3 year olds. If you know of anyone looking for a preschool, please send them our way.

Our second fundraiser was done in March. The families of *Here We Grow* sold or ate many candy bars which then gave us a profit of about \$3,900.00. This money is used for the field trips taken during the school year. Our final fundraiser will be held April 5th through April 26th. 

For many years during a week in the summer (typically the 3<sup>rd</sup> full week in July), through the Interfaith Hospitality Network (IHN), the First Congregational Church in Auburn, has hosted homeless families for one week in which the families are moving from church to church throughout the year. During this week, the families live in the Sunday School rooms; are picked up each day and taken off site to attend to their daily functions of school, work or job hunting; and, then come back to a supper served in the Church's 1<sup>st</sup> floor vestry by our volunteer parishioners. This year we may not be able to house these families, as we have no one to take on the duties of Chairperson/s to prepare and orchestrate this week in July with IHN. There are many volunteer assistants; but, without one organizer, this year will be a pass for our Church, and we will be notifying IHN of our decision not to house families this year. #### **BACK TO HAITI**

As you may or may not know, Randy and I will be returning to Haiti this fall (October  $3^{rd} - 12^{th}$ ). We will be traveling with Monadnock Bible Conference again, but this time we will be part of a medical mission that provides free medical care to the people of Haiti. In Haiti you have to pay "up front" for any medical care. The clinics provided by MBC may be the only care these people receive. It is also quite common for collections to be taken from the missions team to provide for surgical procedures that can not be performed by the clinics themselves such as hernias, abscesses and other more in depth treatments. We will also be spending some time with the orphans from Redeemer's Child Orphanage and checking out the progress on the new orphanage we broke ground on last November.

"MBC ministries, are mercy and compassion based but do not diminish or lack the power of the gospel. At MBC we see it as counterintuitive and disingenuous to see a brother or sister in need and say, "Go, I wish you well. Keep warm and well fed" and yet do nothing about it. The Haitians have a proverb; "sak vid pa kanpe" an empty sack doesn't stand up, meaning a hungry person can't do anything. This person is so overwhelmed by their condition that words are seldom heard, but actions are understood. As we meet physical needs (hunger, thirst, naked, sick . . . ) we have the opportunity to speak to spiritual needs in Jesus' name."

As the time for our trip draws closer we **may** take up a collection for some over the counter medications and such, but right now what we really need is our church's help to get there. The Outreach Committee has generously donated \$500 for our trip deposits, but we still need to raise a minimum of another \$2200 (maybe more depending on what the on going crisis in the Mid East does to gas prices and therefore airfare). We are so grateful for your ongoing support and love.

One of our first fundraisers will be selling two cords of wood we have. This is seasoned, dried hard wood ready to go. Please see Randy or me if you're interested.
