## The Christmas Fund 2013

The generous gifts of UCC congregations and individuals to the Christmas Fund enabled the Pension Boards' Ministerial Assistance program to provide some form of ministerial assistance to approximately 900 persons during the past year.

- **Christmas "Thank You" gift checks** were sent to 500 retired UCC clergy/lay church employees. This special gift at Christmas time reminds these Veterans of the Cross that they have not been forgotten.
- **Monthly pension supplementation** for 395 lower-income retired UCC clergy/lay employees. Our retired clergy/lay employees relied on this income supplementation for basic needs such as food, utilities, living and/or medical expenses.
- **Quarterly health premium supplementation** for 228 lower-income retired UCC clergy/lay employees. These funds subsidized premiums for the UCC Medicare Supplement Health Plan with Rx so that individuals could afford and receive quality health care.
- **Emergency grants** for 45 active or retired UCC clergy/lay employees. Grants assist in covering unexpected costs such as: large medical expenses or home damage resulting from natural disasters.



WHAT SHALL WE GIVE HIM?

Your gifts are needed more than ever to help the growing number of retirees whose low income annuities make it difficult to meet increased living costs. Offering envelopes are enclosed in mailed versions of the *Tidings* and may be found in the church pews on Sundays in December. **Thank you** for your generosity.

As you have noticed, the “Pumpkin Patch” is closed for another year. When the truck arrived we unloaded 42,000 pounds of pumpkins. Of that, 2203 were large (bulk) pumpkins. The rest were smaller sizes and gourds. The average weight of a pumpkin was 19 pounds. We only had less than 120 left.

Total sales were over \$21,000.00. We gave \$1,000.00 to “Keeping Auburn Warm” (please see acknowledgement on page 5) and with our share, hot dog sales, and the change people gave us — our \$7,000.00 went into the Church’s General Fund.



We want to thank all of the people who manned the “patch.” Without you, we could not do this fundraiser. A special thanks to Denise. She went over and above for us. She and Judy were out there selling when we had no one to be there. They kept everyone up-to-date on the progress and schedule.

Once again, Bob Murray made sure we had the equipment we needed. Be sure to ask him about his “pig farm” adventures.

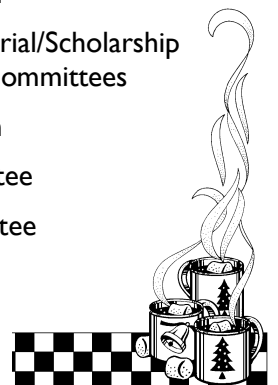

**FROM THE PASTOR . . .**

## Saint Barbara

When I was in the Army, around this time we would be getting ready for Saint Barbara Day (traditionally December 4). A big banquet where all the Artillery Officers and Senior NCO's (Sergeants) would gather with their spouses. The women would go all out and the soldiers would wear their dress blues. (Tuxedos were made for the 1900 wedding of one of Queen Victoria's daughters to the German Kaiser. They were made to look like dress uniforms because civilian men were jealous of how good dress uniforms look.)

Saint Barbara Day celebrations were all out affairs, formal dinners with all the pomp an ancient fellowship could bring to the event. They could also sometimes be quite rowdy. I heard tell one feast had a motorcycle enter the Saint Barbara's Day banquet hall, after driving through the lobby of the hotel up an elevator and into the banquet hall. The budget for damages was quite high that year.

Saint Barbara is the Patron Saint of artillerymen, engineers, minors and anyone else who deals with explosives. Now the stories of saints vary. The one I like the best follows. (SPOILER ALERT: Like many saint stories what follows can be gruesome)

In the 200's AD the Church was growing, but also facing bloody persecution by the Roman government. In this time Barbara was born, the daughter of a rich pagan named Dioscorus. She was carefully guarded by her father who kept her locked up in a tower in order to preserve her from the outside world. Having secretly become a Christian, she rejected an offer of marriage that she received through him.

He commanded that a private bath-house be erected for her use near her dwelling, and during his absence, Barbara had three windows put in it, as a symbol of the Holy Trinity, instead of the two originally intended. When her father returned, she acknowledged herself to be a Christian. Her father called on the Roman Governor, a persecutor of Christians, to come to Barbara's tower. Dioscorus took Barbara to the roof of her tower and beheaded her with a sword he wielded himself. The Governor was there to witness the act, Dioscorus thinking this would advance his career. As he lifted his sword, a lightning bolt struck, killing the father and governor and leveling the tower that had been both Barbara's home and prison.

Now that is a story a young artilleryman can enjoy. There is nothing we artillerymen like better than blowing stuff up, especially if the explosion ends tyranny and spreads freedom.

Maybe on Wednesday, December 4th, think upon Barbara and those like her who were punished simply for following the Lord. Or, think of all the soldiers (and Marines) feasting that night to celebrate their comradery with a woman from long ago.

### Library Tidings by Gloria Whitehead

It was months ago that Wayne Prouty mentioned to me that he had just read an outstanding book we might like for the church library. Heavy sales made it unavailable at the time and my delinquency was salvaged when Connie included it with another book order. It's in LARGE PRINT and is a true story.

Slipping into the pages of *An Invisible Thread* there are 2 briefs. The first is to all the children, like Maurice, whose lives are harder than we can imagine. Never lose hope that you can break the cycle and change your life. And never stop dreaming because the power of dreams can lift you. The 2nd is an Ancient Chinese Proverb. An invisible thread connects to those who are destined to meet, regardless of time, place and circumstances. The thread may stretch or tangle, but it will never break.

With that introduction let's slip into a busy sidewalk in a Manhattan business area. Can you picture an 11-year-old kid stopping our busy sales executive and author, Laura L. Schroff, to ask for spare change, but she passes on. Perhaps it was his sad eyes or that he said he was hungry that causes her to turn back and instead of giving him a quarter took him to lunch – the beginning of other simple rituals. There were weekly Monday meetings which involved going to Laura's apartment to study, make cookies, and eventually when Laura moved to White Plains, Maurice found a job as a messenger boy. Laura also would make sandwiches for school and the main request was that they be in a brown paper bag like the other kids. There are countless substitutions caused by poverty that create basic needs which Laura will supply, however, a bike on his 15th birthday was an unbridled surprise and joy to him. Trust has always been a virtue that was emphasized in their relationship. When someone asked to try his bike out he was reluctant, but then yielded to persuasion, but the bike never came back.

A dedicated friendship evolves between Laura and Maurice and in turn the vivid contrasts of the wholeness of life imposed by substance abuse is truthfully revealed. First hand experience and love as a prime feature is given in the closing pages. To be exposed to the brutal facts and have an evaluation of superior value is a gift. So, look in the Adult Library for *An Invisible Thread* by Laura L. Schroff and co-author, Alex Tresniowski.
