White Christmas

With the little heard acapella prelude:

“The sun is shining, the grass is green,
the orange and palm trees sway.
There's never been such a day
in Beverly Hills, L.A.

But it's December the twenty fourth,
and I am longing to be up north.

I'm dreaming of a white Christmas,
just like the ones I used to know.

Where the treetops glisten and children listen
to hear sleigh bells in the snow.”

Is there a more beloved Christmas song than *White Christmas*? Bing Crosby's version of the song is still the best selling single of all time. It is said *White Christmas*, in all versions, has sold over 100 million singles. This, for a song first recorded in 1941, but still each year a new singer records the song. I am sure part of its initial popularity was due to all the men fighting in World War II, in far away deserts and tropical islands, wanting to be home.

Another reason for its popularity is *White Christmas* is also a secular song; it does not mention Jesus. It doesn't name Santa, though it does speak of sleigh bells. This makes the song popular to the people who do not celebrate the Christ part of Christmas. I know there is a war on Christmas and as Christians we are supposed to be against the secularization of Christmas. But for me, the secular song *White Christmas*, while not mentioning Jesus, somehow has a spirit of the holy to it.

Irving Berlin, the writer of the song, was born in Russia and came to America to escape the Russian persecution of the Jews. So America's most popular Christmas song was written by a Jewish immigrant. How American is that? VERY, the answer is VERY American.

But not everyone loves that song. During World War II, the 101st was surrounded at Bastogne. The commanding officer heard the news that they were surrounded as *White Christmas* played on Armed Forces Radio. So, to his dying day, General McAuliffe never again listened to that song as it reminded him of those hard days, when some feared the war was lost.

That is the power of song; it brings up memories. I hear a beloved song and I can be transported back in time. Songs carry memories.

The only thing that connects stronger to memory is smell. Can you still smell your Grandma's kitchen? I know I can. Her kitchen was filled with the smell of baking bread and frying ham on a wood stove. I hope the songs and smells of the season bring sweet memories, and may all your Christmases be white.

YOUTH ON A MISSION

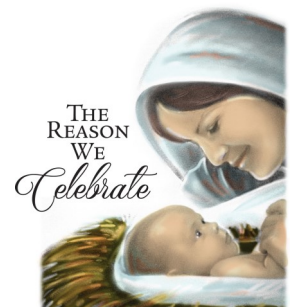

On behalf of my entire family, I wanted to extend my sincere appreciation to the church for the wonderful memorial window that was installed in memory of my dad. My mother and we could not think of a more appropriate gesture. For all the years of his ministry among you, he would look out that window on his way out of his office every night — many thousands of times. Every time I drive by, I can see his image in that window, and that is a precious gift.

The engravings of the Maine loon, and the steam engine that flank his name were two of his favorite things to talk about. I can't tell you how many times he would stop to wonder at those birds at Boyden Lake and explain to us all how they lived. The call of the loon, and the sight of them — vigilant in watching from a distance — brings each of us comfort that dad is similarly looking out for us.

The train was a lifelong passion of his, stemming from his grandfather's role as a fireman on the Boston & Maine railroad. He loved the memories that those massive steel horses would bring to him of his childhood.

Many people may wonder what the connection of those two items are to Reverend Knox, and I have been asked to write a more detailed explanation for the historical archives to explain that to future generations. However, anyone who knew him for a short while soon found the topic of conversation running to the loon or the train, and noticed the sparkle in his eye when that happened.

Thank you so much for the wonderful tribute to a man who loved this church so much, and felt gifted to be able to minister among you.

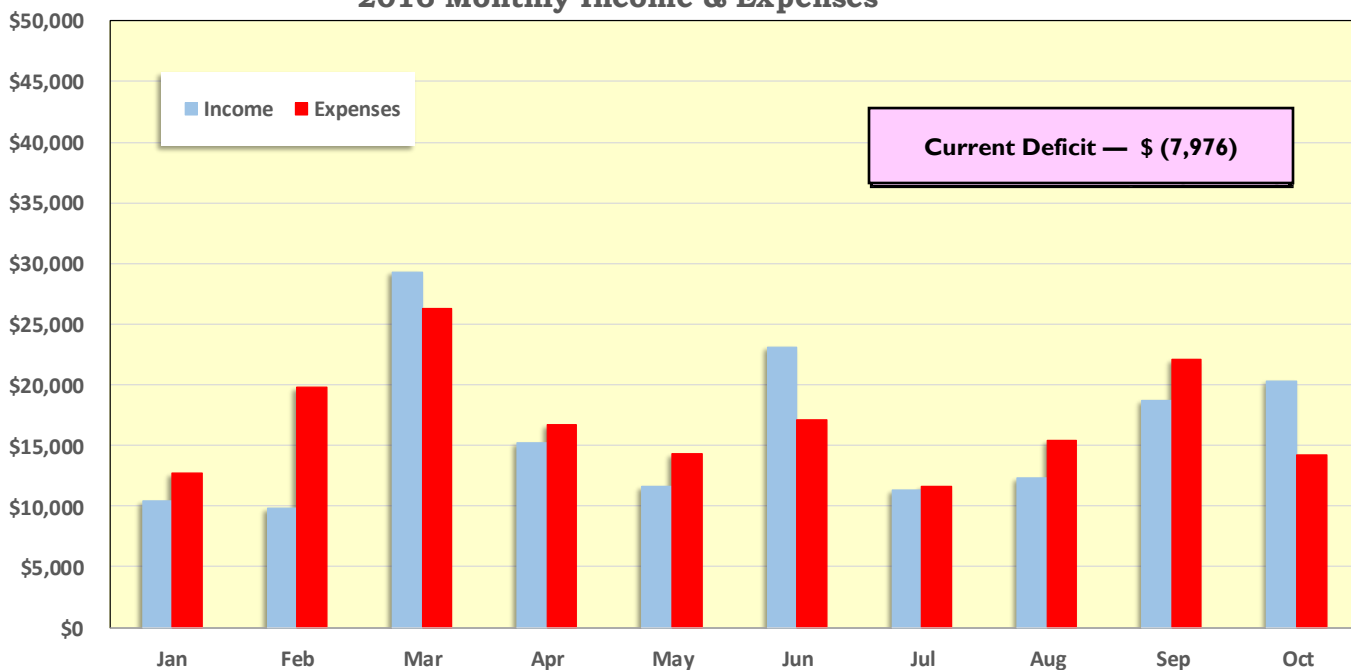
