FROM THE PASTOR

Well, just like the rest of the year, Christmas is going to be different. We have to think long and hard about what we are going to do for Christmas and Advent. Things like:

At the church, we have decided to cancel the potluck/ hymn sing/ Christmas baskets. We will make a video of some Christmas carols and post it on YouTube for you to play at your leisure. Instead of Christmas baskets, we will have a "card shower" for our shut-ins. We will have packets of cards put together that you can mail yourself or bring back to church to mail in a package.

We are moving our Christmas Eve Candlelight Communion service to 8PM, earlier in the night due to the curfew. We are also doing a video Christmas pageant this year. We will do an outdoor carol singalong on Christmas Eve at 5PM, if the weather cooperates. If the weather doesn't, we will probably do a car "parade" instead.

We have also been asked if people would post Christmas greetings on our Facebook page so we can see our Church family. We will try to send them out in other ways for those not on Facebook.

All of this means Christmas will be different, but, hopefully, not lonely. This year we will make decisions that are not fun, but Christmas will still be joyful.

God bless you all, as we welcome the Christ child born in a manger.

THE CHRISTMAS FUND 2020

"For Such a Time as This." Esther 4:14

The Christmas Fund has been caring for active and retired clergy and lay employees of the United Church of Christ for over 100 years, providing emergency grants, supplementation of small annuities and health premiums, and Christmas "Thank You" gift checks each December to our lower-income retirees. Over the past nine months, because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the emergency financial needs of many who serve the church have increased dramatically.

We are grateful for the generosity of churches and individuals who contributed to the Christmas Fund in 2019. Your generosity enabled:

- monthly pension supplementation for 350 retired clergy and lay employees (\$1,347,419),
- health premium supplementation for 144 retired clergy and lay employees (\$374,577),
- emergency grants for 69 individuals and families (\$123,727) and
- Christmas "Thank You" gift checks to 521 retired clergy and lay employees (\$260,500).

In such a time as this, the need for the Christmas Fund is more urgent than ever. United Church of Christ congregations and members have blessed the Christmas Fund with their generosity for many years. This year, your care and compassion will be especially appreciated by those servants of the church who are facing a time of need. On their behalf we <u>thank you</u>!

OUTREACH NEWS

The Board of Christian Outreach is looking for donations of <u>men's clothing</u> for CityReach, an overnight urban outreach program. You may recall that our past candidates for confirmation have participated in this program. The program gives young people the opportunity to learn first hand about homelessness.

During the pandemic, CityReach continues to offer clothing to unhoused guests who come to "shop" from among the donated items. They are requesting **men's apparel** <u>only</u> as 80% of the unhoused guests are male and even the women prefer men's clothing. Please bag your donations and indicate date of drop off (post-it notes are provided on the designated tables in fellowship hall). Recording date of drop-off is a precaution during COVID to allow time between bag handling. Items requested include <u>MEN'S</u>:

coats	sweatshirts
socks	blankets/sleeping bags
sweaters	handwarmers
pants	hats/gloves

At our November meeting, we decided to designate \$150 to CityReach to use at thrift stores/Salvation Army to purchase items listed above that aren't brought in through our collection. On December 9th, Pastor Brian, Shannon, Hendrix, and Elsa Hartmann will be delivering the collected items to CityReach in Boston. Therefore, we are asking that all donations be dropped off here at the church by Sunday, December 6th.

We still have some money remaining that we need to allocate before the end of the year. If you have any suggestions of worthy causes we should consider, please let us know.

Happy Holidays from Here We Grow Preschool



The last few weeks have been busy. In some ways it feels like the school year has just begun and, yet, we are entering December. With so many programs around us having difficulties at this time, we are grateful for everyday that we get to be open. We have successfully completed our third month of school. We are thankful the weather has been cooperative, and we are still able to get outside; fresh air is so good for everyone.

Here We Grow was pleased to once again be able to donate a turkey and other items to the church to be delivered to families during the Thanksgiving holiday. We were also happy to be asked to be part of the CityReach clothing drive this year. Over the years, we have found our families to always be willing to help.

We have an ongoing fundraiser happening at this time; HWG is collecting new and used athletic shoes. We will be compensated from \$0.25-\$3.00 per pair of shoes donated. Usable shoes will be sent to underprivileged places and those that are not useable will be recycled into other items, such as playground mulch. There is a donation box in fellowship hall.

During the month of December, *Here We Grow* will work with the Auburn Police Department in the collection of unwrapped toys and items for children ranging from infant to sixteen-years-old. The police department will distribute everything collected to children living in Auburn. Due to the COVID virus we are unable to hold our normal holiday program for the families. So, we got a bit creative and will live stream very short programs to the parents from the individual classrooms. We will look forward to the feedback from our families about this.

The school will be closed from December 23 - January I. Our first day back will be January 4, 2021. The *Here We Grow* staff and families wish all of you a safe and happy holiday season.

Capital Fund Drive for HEAT

As you know, the steam boiler which heated the sanctuary and vestry had to be shut down in March due to its deteriorated and unsafe condition. The hot water boiler was also old, and the Trustees decided to replace both with new high efficiency hot water boilers. The congregation voted on September 13th to use invested funds to get this project started as soon as possible.

To date, we have spent \$149,770 on this project. As was voted upon at the special meeting in September, \$87,000 was approved to borrow, interest-free, from our invested funds. Through a capital campaign, we hope to replenish these funds over the next 3 years, 2021-2023, with support from our parishioners.

She graduated from Auburn High School in 1941 where she was active in tennis, track, basketball, and many clubs, as well as her sorority. May continued that level of activity throughout her life, enjoying skiing, sailing, horseback riding, golf, tennis, racquetball, swimming, writing, as well as yoga, book clubs, classes at Worcester State and Assumption, and travel in the US, Europe, the Caribbean, and Cuba. She was a lifelong member of the First Congregational Church of Auburn, spending many hours as a Sunday school teacher, a trustee, a worker, and chair of the holiday fair. She also helped to redecorate the sanctuary and to bring the Interfaith Hospitality and the Pumpkin Patch to the church. May reached out to connect with everyone she met.

She leaves three daughters, Paula Shugrue (Don), Diane Moore (Paul), and Andrea Pichette (Skip/ Art). Her children, 5 grandchildren, and 6 great-grandchildren were loved unconditionally by May and will continue to be inspired by her love for all their lives.

The family will gather for a celebration of May's life as COVID allows. In her honor, please do a good deed.


