The First Congregational Church has welcomed homeless families for well over a decade.

The family profiles differ each year, but the mission remains strong. When we discuss homelessness we also discuss poverty, disabilities, economy, and a series of circumstances often beyond a family's control. We can all personally cite instances where friends, relatives and family have been in a crisis situation. Relatives can serve as a safety net, but if there are no relatives, a shelter particularly when there are small children, is simply not the answer. Interfaith unites the religious community in an effort to provide a “safe environment” for both adult and child.

Our volunteers will often ask questions based on their own observations as to why a family has fallen into this predicament. They may form their own opinion, right or wrong as that may be. We try not to judge, but rather to gain a sense of understanding. Each family struggles with its own individual situation. Will they ultimately find appropriate housing? We hope they will. We also hope the crisis that brought them to this point in their lives will be resolved.

The Interfaith mission is a simple one; we provide a safe living environment, nourishing meals, a child friendly play area, enough space for some alone time as well as one on one conversation with the families we will welcome.

Nearly fifty volunteers came forward last year serving in various capacities.

Last year, the ecumenical cluster of chaperones and volunteers were represented by members of the North American Martyr's Church, St. Joseph's Church, Greenville Baptist Church in Rochdale, Faith Baptist Church, High Point Christian Church in Thompson, Connecticut, and the First Congregational Church.

Please consider volunteering this year. Overnight chaperones are needed from approximately 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. each evening. Volunteers will also be needed to prepare an evening meal.

A schedule beginning on the 19th of July through the departure date of the 26th of July is in Fellowship Hall.

Thank you for any help you may be able to give these families in crisis.

Self-fulfilling Prophecies

Reflections from your Interim Pastor, Rev. Mark Seifried

Do you know anyone who talks about all the bad luck they have? Do you know someone who claims that they are clumsy? Do you know people who constantly talk about their endless health problems? I bet we all know people like this. The thing is that most of these people help create their own destiny by the stories they tell.

I used to say that I was bad at public speaking. I used to think that I couldn't officiate at a funeral because I would start crying at the thought of death. I used to say I was bad at remembering peoples' names. When I realized that I could do something ... needed to do something ... about all those things in order to be an effective pastor, I stopped focusing on what I couldn't do and started to thank God for what I could do.

I asked God to help me preach with clarity and conviction. I still do that almost every week. The weeks I don't, are the weeks I usually fall flat in the pulpit. I am no longer afraid of public speaking and I actually can be good at it when I call upon God for strength. I addressed my issues around death and God rewarded me with being able to be a comfort and blessing for people in grief, plus I can effectively officiate at funerals. I stopped saying I was bad at remembering peoples' names and started saying, "I love the challenge in remembering so many peoples' names as quickly as I start a new ministry." I'm not claiming perfect recall, but I remember lots of peoples' names I never could have prior to changing my story.

I do believe in self-fulfilling prophecies. People convince themselves that things are a certain way and that's what they see. I have a friend who was convinced his wife was having extra-marital affairs and became obsessed with seeking the evidence. "Today she is wearing perfume. She must be meeting her boyfriend for lunch." "She's been tired every night for the last two weeks. She's giving her boyfriend all her energy and shutting me out." "Next time the phone rings, I'm going to answer it and catch her boyfriend calling her." "She hasn't worn her hair like that for ten years. Now I know it's true."

Forget that she just started a new job. Forget that she just turned fifty years old and is having some identity issues. Forget that you are out of shape and have lost your vigor and sex appeal. This scenario seems strange, but my friend is still convinced that his wife is philandering. He sees signs of it everyday ... even though it couldn't be further from the truth.

Organizations do this sort of thing, too: telling stories that focus all the energy in one place. I have a friend who serves a church of "clergy killers." They had a pastor a while back who had some emotional issues that he never worked through, so he was asked to resign. Ever since then, the church has a reputation that they can't keep clergy ... and the congregation has come to believe it, too. Guess what! They can't hold onto their ministers for more than a year or two. I have another colleague whose congregation believes that they are a blessed, vibrant and growing community of faith. Guess what! They are growing and their ministries are thriving.

This is a process that I will facilitate in which we will talk about times when we have felt close to one another or blessed by God. We take the kernels of all those stories to inventory the many ways Christ has been present to First Congregational Church, UCC in Auburn. We will also dream about ways we can build upon those feelings and experiences to set goals and create a future filled with possibility.

Appreciative Inquiry has changed my life and my worldview. I used to see all the flaws of a congregation and pick out those flaws to try to fix. The truth is that I was highly ineffective. I can't fix anyone. But ... but I can bless everyone. I can help build up the strengths of people and the church as a whole. I can tell positive stories and speak favorably about the church, open my heart and mind and see just how true those stories are. I can help teach you how to create the future you want to see for the church and set specific goals to make those outcomes self-filling. We can help create an environment where our positive, life-giving stories become our destiny.

Join us for Appreciative Inquiry and let's tell stories of when we have felt blessed by and in the church. Join us and let's create the blessed, vital and growing community of faith that God wills us to be. Join us and be prepared to see the world anew.

Come, Holy Spirit, come, and inspire us to be the thriving, faithful, generous and gracious Body of Christ that you know us to be ... that we desire to be.

Guess who's coming to church?

Our guest organist for Sunday morning worship on July 12 will be Mark Thallander. Mark is a free-lance organist, an organ editor for the Fred Bock Music Company; Adjunct Professor of Organ, Glendale College; President, The Mark Thallander Foundation; a reviewer of new organ music for *Creator* magazine; and a member of the executive committee of the Los Angeles Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. Mark is probably best known for his long and distinguished ministry at The Crystal Cathedral, the largest congregation affiliated with the Reformed Church in America. He joined the staff in January 1976 as a music associate to Don G. Fontana and assisted Arvella Schuller with *Hour of Power* television scripting, service programming and musical guests. Mark was Coordinator of Church Music Exploration, the national church music and worship conference held through the Robert Schuller Institute for Successful Church Leadership.

Following a horrific automobile accident in August of 2003, which resulted in the amputation of one of his arms, Mark has accepted speaking engagements in churches, schools, colleges, universities, and has been interviewed on radio and television programs, and also for newspapers, books and national periodicals. A book about Mark's accident and recovery, *Champions*, written by the Reverend Gary DeVaul, has been a great source of inspiration to thousands of people. An expanded version of the book, *Champions... Plus*, was released in October 2007.

Mark will have some of these books as well as some organ and choral music recordings when he is with us in July. We hope you'll be here, along with friends and relatives you invite.

How Much Does Pente-cost?

All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need ... and, day by day, the Lord added to their number those who were being saved. (Acts 2:44-45, 47b)

A mother took her daughter for her first time at a restaurant with table service. There was a placemat with crayons to help her wait. After a successful lunch (both in tastiness and behavior), the server cleared the plates and the mother pulled out her wallet to pay the bill. When this process was explained, the little girl asked, "How come the waitperson gets fifteen percent and God only gets ten?"

Here's a tip -- the fifteen or twenty percent we give to wait staff, hotel housekeepers and cabdrivers is part of the Pentecost revolution. On May 31, we celebrated the holiday that informs our church life for the next half year. Acts 2 tells the story of rushing wind and fiery tongues that rested on 120 men and women so they could share the gospel of Jesus Christ in three ways -- the languages of the world, the water of baptism, and economic support. Word, sacrament and financial interdependence were Spirit -connected. Giving to others is giving to God.

I know a church with a weekly updated cork board of job leads. Another writes in every Sunday bulletin: "As the offering plate is passed, please give money if you have it, please take money if you need it." People do! One church hosts ESL classes after coffee hour, another has a monthly "Resurrection Resumes," where volunteers help people write résumés and do mock job interviews, and a third offers informal internships in the trades.

We are a Pentecost people in a stressful economic time. We all have something to offer one another. Maybe you are out of work. Watch out for the little girl with a big smile. She'll hand you a placemat and crayons, "This is for you while you are waiting!"

1ly to chose Mr. Charles Richardson Modirator for S'd meeting.

2ly Voted to concur with the church in the choes of Mr. Jonathan Allen to Settel with us in the Gospel ministry.

Voted 150 Pounds Settlement to Mr. Allen as Encougement yo Settel with us in the Gospel ministry. Voted to give mr. Allen 60 Pounds salary for the first years insuring this Setteling with us in the Gospel ministry and their continue at 65 Pounds During his ministry with us. Voted to chuse a Committee of 3 to join the Church Committee to present the Call to Mr. Allen. Chose Mr. Daniel Boydon, Mr. Thomas Baird, Mr. Charles Richardson.

Worcester Sa. To William parker Collector. Greetings.

REMEMBER NEW ORLEANS

As most of you know, I have returned from another trip to New Orleans, Louisiana (NOLA). Though many of you have heard me speak of my trips and my fondness for the people and the city, I felt it important to keep you posted.

During April vacation I went down with a group from WAMS, led by Nancy Shantia Wright-Gray. The majority of the members of this group were from Mattapoissett Congregational, with a few people returning from other areas, that I had met on previous trips. I was excited about this trip, but especially excited to return to Andrew H. Wilson Charter School, a school that I had visited twice before. I was excited to see the kids again, who I hoped were still there, see their progress (especially the fourth graders) and show them that people have not forgotten what they have been through.

On Sunday, before our busy week would begin, we went on a "tour." No matter how many times that I have seen the devastation and destruction left by Hurricane Katrina it doesn't get any easier. One of our first stops was at Beecher Church in the Seventh Ward. Although I have been to Beecher several times, I had never been inside the sanctuary. Upon walking in I immediately felt love and determination among the 2x4s, folding chairs, and makeshift altar. Beecher, three and half years after the storm, has still not been able to repair their sanctuary. This has not stopped them. They worship there every week and celebrate the things that they can, like finally having running water and plumbing. I can say with my whole heart that Beecher is one of the most beautiful places that I have ever been. Not because of the "décor," but because of the love and faith that permeates from every square inch of that building and the people who fill it.

On Tuesday (after a day at Carver Elementary) I returned to Wilson. I can say there is no other place on earth that I would have wanted to spend my vacation. I returned to Mr. Z's class, where I had been last April. When I walked in one of the students said "Hey, I remember you." He had been in the first grade last year and was giving it another shot. He immediately came and sat by me and gave me a huge hug. This is one reason why I know that it is so important that we keep going back, not for the hugs, which are wonderful, but so that these children know that people DO come back and we have not forgotten. As my week went on I was blessed with more and more memories that I will forever hold in my heart. There are simply too many to put down. On my last day, before a walk to the park to enjoy some "snowballs," each of the students gave me a card that they had made. One little boy, who had just lost a young cousin in an extreme act of violence, wrote "I am sad because you are leaving. I want you to stay." It was very hard to leave there that day. I know that I will return to NOLA and Andrew Wilson but it didn't make it any easier to leave.

What I want everyone to know about New Orleans is that although it is getting better little by little, IT IS NOT OKAY! People are still struggling to repair their homes and get back to their old neighborhoods. Post traumatic stress is everywhere. We can not forget and let this slip by the wayside. So when you say your prayers tonight please remember the people of New Orleans. I know I do every night!

Going to New Orleans has changed my life. I would be willing to bet that anyone who has been will agree. If anyone would like to speak with me more about the mission trips to New Orleans or would like to go, I am happy to talk with you about it anytime.
