### LIBRARY TIDINGS

Perhaps you're inclined to feel political strength is the prime issue of many who govern us, instead of the spectrum of vital issues which affect the future, long and short range, of our nation. Could Lent appeal to you as an appropriate 40 days to do a bit of introspection and to find a source of strengthening your faith and prayers? You can begin in the library.

In the past, books for Lenten reading have been on display in Fellowship Hall. A list of more of the same with a brief description of the contents of each follows and the library table displays a few books which relate to the Bible Study of the Life of Jesus which Pastor Ken will conduct.

How to Hear from God by Joyce Meyer - Learn to know His voice and make the right decisions. God won't force us to do His will, but He will do everything He can to encourage us to say yes to His way.

Christ's Passion - the Power and Promise by D. James Kennedy with Jerry Newcombe includes colorful, eyewitness accounts from Pontius Pilate, Caiaphas, Thomas and Longinus, the Roman Centurion, to bring a human perspective to the events of the week that changed the world. The author who, among other services to the church has been president of an international Christian broadcasting system, takes you past Calvary to the empty tomb, as he gathers compelling arguments for the claim that Christ is risen indeed. Carole Murray gifted this book.

God Came Near by Max Lucado - is new to our library. You want to follow Christ but at times you lose sight of Him at a personal level. You may rely on all sorts of religious leaders, writers and individuals who are inspired, but you're looking for more than a second-hand faith. How can you have this closer look fulfilled?

The Jesus Style by Gayle D. Erwin - Pastor Ken recognized this book that was featured on the coffee table last Sunday, and commented that it was easy to read and good. The first printed page in the book reads, "Ronald N. Haynes Publishers, Inc. is committed to publishing significant work with new ideas and re-publishing time-tested work that can change the world in the name of Jesus Christ."

"If you who have picked up this book are a Christian you have experienced the joy and challenge that Jesus brings to life. If you are not a Christian, read on—you may see why so many people throughout the ages have entered the family of the forgiven and found there both peace and purpose through Jesus Christ."

# **SANCTUARY NEWS**

The board of Trustees is pleased to announce that we are planning to under take a major renovation of the sanctuary. Our new roof is on the building and is good for another fifty years. Now we can concentrate on the interior. It has been more than twenty-five years since the sanctuary has been refurbished. The past roof leaks, peeling paint and worn carpet are signs of a tired interior.

We are all committed and enthusiastic about this project; however, we will need the help and support of the congregation in order to proceed. We believe that the repairs of the cracked walls and ceiling should be done correctly and for the long term. This will require a substantial investment in the future of our church, one that will be rewardingly visible to all upon completion.

Our plans include complete plasterboard of the church interior; this would include the choir room, narthex and sanctuary. Even the paneling would be covered with plasterboard and after plastering, all would be painted.

To facilitate all this work in the sanctuary, the pews would be removed to Fellowship Hall where they will be restained and repainted. New carpet will be installed in the sanctuary before the pews are returned.

In order to pay for this renovation, we are soliciting a three-year commitment from our church family to raise sufficient funds that will allow us to start the process. The Prudential Committee feels that we could start the work the summer after a third of the money is received. The remaining two - thirds could be borrowed from our long term invested funds provided that we have commitments to repay the borrowed funds within the two following years.

The target cost to accommodate all these renovations is expensive. Preliminary estimates run about \$100,000. We were able to raise \$60,000 for the new roof and we are praying that we can have the same dedication and enthusiasm for this sanctuary project.

Individual responses to this financial commitment will be held in confidence in the same manner as church pledges are handled. Lori Stockhaus has agreed to be the focal point for responses and annual reporting.

# **Divine Timing**

Although our choral anthems do not have to correlate with the church's liturgical calendar, there have been many instances where the anthem spoke exactly to the sermon, as well as other occurrences obviously guided by the Spirit. I'd like to share them here.

Last year, not having the finances for new choir robes, we tried to purchase 12 used robes from another church, but were turned down. Shortly thereafter, more new people joined the choir; now we needed 16 robes, an even bigger expense! The funds, however, miraculously appeared—Divine Timing!

Cindy Dube arrived back from the mission trip requesting Here I Am, Lord to be sung as a hymn for their special service on January 28th. One month prior, I'd completed the planning of anthems through May, scheduling Here I Am, Lord for January 28th—Divine Timing!

Last fall, I received inspiration regarding fundraising for the music ministry—tied in with honoring loved ones. I'd just put the "Music Memorial" idea together the very night we found out the music fund finished in a deficit for 2006. We immediately received 3 donations towards the music fund—Divine Timing!

The first person to donate for the memorial did so because I'd unknowingly scheduled her family's favorite anthem to be sung directly before her mother's birthday—Diving Timing!

By 2006, the choir room piano was too old to stay in tune making it impossible to rehearse with as the singers could not match the pitch. Out of the blue, Connie Hodgkins called Rev. Knox regarding the donation of her husband's Yamaha piano. (George Hodgkins was minister here at one time and also a musician.) During our phone conversation she told me "Although we have several children it could go to, I feel strongly this is what George would want." Once again—Diving Timing!

## Of Note:


"The Passion Story" will be presented on March 18th, the fourth Sunday of Lent. Five anthems will take us through Gethsemane:
