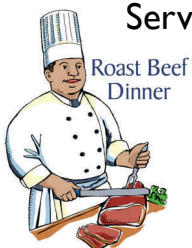

A thousand thanks to committee member Jean McPherson who obtained boxes in which we'll be packing Adult Library books beginning Saturday, June 7, 2008. All bookcases and other pertinent library furnishings will be removed from the sanctuary soon afterward.

How to Enjoy Adult Library books during the Sanctuary Renovation (save for referral)

The Children's Library, at the end of the downstairs hallway, will be open every Sunday during the summer. Some shelving space on the outside wall of the room will be reserved for Adult Library books. Church services will be held in the vestry so both facilities are on the same floor.

Meanwhile, a few revisions and guidelines since the April *Tidings*:

While still available in the sanctuary, individuals may borrow up to 15 books at one time for the summer or until the library is back in place (want more?, speak to a librarian). "Transport" bags are in the bottom drawer of the library stand. They're for you to use.

Any books borrowed before renovations begin may be returned afterward in the Children's Library. A designated area will be marked for returns OR, if the library is closed, returns can be put in the bag on the Children's Library door.

Adult books borrowed from those in the Children's Library will be signed out in the same way as always. The card holder will be close by.

1773-1786

A few years ago I read and copied a ledger that was stored in the town hall basement. I don't believe this book has been read in the last two hundred years. It is a complete record of the step-by-step decisions made by our men in building our meetinghouse and forming our town. I will be sharing some of the interesting excerpts from these writings with you below and in subsequent *Tidings*.

In Council June 19, 1773 ordered that Gershom, Israel Stevens, David Bancroft, Jonathan Stone, Daniel Boyden, Jacob Stephens, Thomas Drury, Thomas Drury, Jr., Henry Gale, William Bancroft, James Nichols, Davins Boyden, James Hart, Thomas Baird, James Hart, Jr., Thomas Baird, Jr., Oliver Curtis, Comfort Rice, Elizabeth Boyden, Phoebe Bancroft, John Boyden, Daniel Bancroft, Charles Hart, and Peter Boyden of Worcester, Benjamin Carter, Charles Richardson, Timothy Carter, Phinehas Rice, Benjamin Carter, Jr., Rachel Buck, Daniel Roper, Gershom Bigelow, Gershom Bigelow, Jr., Peter Hardy, Daniel Cummings, Charles Richardson, Jr., of Sutton, Peter Jeneson, Ruth Stone, Jesse Stone, James Pratt, Abraham Fitts, Alexander Nichols, David Gleason of Oxford, John Crowl, Jr., Andrew Crowl, Jonathan Phillips, John Hart, Thomas Scott, William Young, Jonathan Stone of Leicester be and hereby are with their families and estates, erected into a precinct and shall enjoy all the power and privileges which other precincts in this province by law enjoy - and it is further ordered that all other persons (with their families and estates) living in the Towns of Worcester, Leicester, Oxford, not further than three miles as the roads are now trod, from the place herein after fixed for building the meetinghouse upon, together with all such others in Sutton that live not further than one mile and a half from said place, who shall signify their desire to belong to said precinct by lodging their names in the Secretary's office within nine months from this date, be and hereby are Incorporated and made a part of the precinct aforesaid - ordered that the spot for erecting the meetinghouse upon be at the following place (viz) at an oak stump with stones upon it, standing on the westerly side of the County Road leading from Worcester to Oxford, near the center of two acres of land which Thomas Drury, conveyed to Jonathan Stone, Daniel Boyden and David Bancroft, the said two acres of land lieth in a gore of land that was annexed to the Town of Worcester.

The excerpt below was taken from a 2007 article by Richard Sparrow

The majority of those who prepared for ministry in the Evangelical and Reformed Church and the Congregational Christian Churches in 1957 were raised in their denominations, went to denominationally-related seminaries and graduated in three years with little or no debt. Most were young, male, understood the history, theology, and polity of their denomination, and were expecting to serve in parish ministry. Of the few women who attended, most were planning to serve as Christian educators. Also of significance, the churches from which the students came and the congregations they were called to serve were knowledgeable of and committed to the mission and ministry of their denominations.

Within two generations, now most of our seminarians come from denominational backgrounds other than the United Church of Christ, with a number having little church orientation. There are more women than men and more seeking second rather than first careers. Many students attend theological and graduate schools outside of the seven seminaries of the United Church of Christ, commute from their homes, are enrolled in degree programs that may well take them eight years, and graduate with indebtedness as high as \$40,000. All represent a diversity of culture that reflects the multi-racial, multi-cultural landscape of the UCC today. Many are seeking to further or deepen their understanding of theology, rather than pursue a call to a form of authorized ministry. Those who do serve in the parish setting will be serving churches that have less knowledge of and commitment to the United Church of Christ than was true of their predecessors in ministry two generations earlier.
