#### FROM THE PASTOR

"May I? May I go out to play?" Unless there was a thunderstorm my mom always said yes to my request. I went outside in blizzards and rainy days as well as sunny, warm days.

Most summer days I saw Mom at breakfast, supper, and bedtime and that was it. Kids were expected to be outside and away from home. I rode my bike up and down the roads of Errol to my friends' houses. Being in the country, my friends were often a mile or more away from my house.

We caught frogs and crayfish in the creeks. At night we went horn-pouting. We built forts in the woods. I was 14 before I played a game with an adult coach or referee. Most of our games were refereed by yelling and occasionally wrestling. Playing baseball only with other kids taught me to negotiate. Was this call worth ending the game over? Or would a do over be ok? Or rock, paper, scissors? Figuring things out for ourselves was what childhood was all about.

All adults had the right and responsibility to look out for all kids. My mom heard what I was doing from other moms and even complete strangers. In South Dakota I had to drive slow because kids were in the yards playing and on the streets biking. Residential streets in the summer were a kid–filled zone.

My childhood was not that different from that of Tom Sawyer or the *Little Rascals*. I also had a clubhouse we built ourselves. Today, childhood is very different. I do not see kids out on their bikes. I seldom see kids out in their yards. It seems childhood is no longer an outside experience. It even hit South Dakota near the end of my time there, and South Dakota in many ways was like living in *Leave it to Beaver* times.

Kids need to be inside now. Kids need to be under an adult's eyes at all times. There are stories of nosy neighbors calling the police over kids playing in their yard while their mom is in the kitchen. Could my mom have imagined such a thing? Would the cops bother to investigate such a common thing back in the 70's?

How did this happen? It can't be the crime rate. There was more crime in the 70's and 80's than there is now. But somehow we fear more for our children, now that crime is rare. Crime is rare, but we fear more and we fear for our children. The world is a scary place. Kids need to be protected.

But listening to our fears is a dangerous thing. Fear can be healthy. But fear can often lead to overreaction and big trouble. The world can be a dangerous place, but kids have to live in the world. They will one day be adults. I like the saying, "We are not raising children. We are raising adults." How will children be adults if they are never given room and time to be on their own as we hope adults will be.

When I got on my mom's nerves, I was sent outside to run and play all the energy out. What do moms do now to get a break from all that childish energy?

If I said I was bored? "Go outside and amuse yourself," was the response. Or I was given a chore to do, so I was at least bored while being useful.

As a kid, most people were thought to be good people. Now we have stranger danger. Kids once needed independence. Now they need protection. Kids used to walk or bike most places. Now they need a car to get where they are going.

We can't even blame parents. If the cops and social services investigate kids playing unsupervised, that is a society wide problem.

For some reason we changed the rules of childhood and parenting without any discussion. We added a lot of fear and stress to parenting. We took childhood away from children. Is this a better way? I think not.


# SPECIAL MAY COMMUNITY SUPPER



**Cluster Meetings for Churches** - In an effort to strengthen the covenant between churches, the association, and the Massachusetts Conference, the Rev. Kelly Gallagher along with the Association Board of Directors started a new initiative. Local churches are invited to attend an area meeting; taking place once a month geographically around the association, with a goal of churches attending <u>one</u> of the meetings each year.

The vision of the Board of Directors is to have at least 2 to 3 church representatives attend these area meetings, as well as the minister if possible. Those in attendance are able to ask the Rev. Kelly Gallagher, Associate Conference Minister, and the Board of Directors questions regarding church issues. Participants are also informed on how the conference and association can help churches with their mission. Below Cindy Ryan describes her experience at a recent Cluster Meeting she attended.

When I volunteered to attend the UCC Cluster Meeting on April 6<sup>th</sup>, I had no expectation of what it would involve. To my surprise, I found it fascinating to hear other area churches' mission statements and goals. (By the way, I found our mission statement to be one of the best!)

Some churches are spending most of their time simply trying to exist. One church has 12 voting members!! One church GAVE THEIR BUILDING AWAY – along with a portion of their \$5 million endowment – so that they could better focus on doing the work that they felt God intended them to do. Some have no minister, some are multi-denominational (I still can't quite figure out how that works, especially when one denomination is not Christian).\*

When each church was asked to give a key word or phrase to describe their church and its purpose, some of the answers were: prayer, connections, growth, community outreach, questioning believer, welcoming, and a flock of shepherds – not sheep.

I have already mentioned that it was fascinating to me – but more important, it was inspirational. I strongly suggest that any of you attend in the future.

\* Pastor's Note: running a church with multiple denominations can be interesting (that is hard) but the most important thing is that the people in the pews get along together. # Pastor Brian had asked me to give an update on the work at Walking Together. I thought that a recent report to the board from Pastor Meredyth would be just the thing. — Steve Hill

It has been busy lately at Walking Together. The combination of wind and cold has made us the shelter of choice for a lot of people. Every morning we offer coffee and snacks to folks walking by. While the number varies from day to day, we can have up to 35 people coming in. Some, like Eric, the kung-fu master, have serious mental illness, others are looking for community. Still others need a place to charge their phones, check their mail, and pick up condoms. Often we talk with our visitors about the work of recovery, and sometimes help them get to detox.

Our ESL classes continue to be a source of joy. Last week we had three things going on at once—we used a laptop to connect Maria to an online class which she needed for her GED preparation. She is a student at Quinsigamond Community College. We worked with other students on prepositions, acting out over, under, between and other concepts. And we had the children of two of the students working on their homework and reading with one of the volunteers. We are blessed with wonderful volunteers. Five people from four different churches are with us regularly.

It is wonderful to see how people in the community are claiming our space. The folks who do the exercise class have put up several pictures on our walls. Members of the 12 step groups leave encouraging slogans on the white board. Our gratitude wall has regular additions.

The 12 step groups continue to grow. Last week we had three newcomers picking up 24 hour chips at the Tuesday night AA meeting. One of the women has come to be with us during the morning drop-in times—it is a safe and welcoming space for her. She was delighted that she could bring her young daughter with her. The play corner is a draw for a lot of folks, both in the morning and during meetings.

This month I was invited to talk to a Holden girl scout troop about the work we do. They were eager to ask questions, and want to do a service project with us. They are going to put together craft kits for Laundry Love, and one of the group leaders took information about our wish list for the center. The Holden schools collect personal care items for non-profits, and she hopes to add us to the list.

The people of Immanuel Lutheran in Holden continue to provide snacks and toiletries for us. They dropped off a car load a couple of weeks ago, and then sent more with me when I spoke to the girl scouts.

I preached at St. Francis Church in Holden this past weekend. Two of our board members joined me for the forum, and helped tell the story of Laundry Love. St. Francis is considering helping with coffee supplies and supporting a month of Laundry Love. I gave out lots of business cards with the donation information. Hope-fully, that will translate into an infusion of funds.

We continue to be a loaves and fishes operation, sharing what we have and receiving gifts in return. When we have extra laundry detergent we bring it to the food bank at Sacred Heart Church, and they, in return, give us juice boxes when they have extras. Some of our larger bottles of toiletries go out to the local sober houses, so the residents can perhaps work a few less hours and make a few more meetings.
