WAITING ... and other counter -cultural disciplines

Reflections from your Interim Pastor, Rev. Mark Seifried Wait for the Lord; be strong, and let your heart take courage; wait for the Lord! Psalm 27:14

When I left the restaurant business, I vowed to myself that I would stop wearing a watch on a regular basis. As a manager, I not only had to be concerned with my own timeliness, I had to keep up with my assistant managers and employees' punctuality. I had to keep track of the time it took for a server to greet customers, take their drink orders, return with their drink order, get their bread (actually down South, we served biscuits!) take the food orders and more. Every step of the dining experience had a standard for timing. If we couldn't make those times, we considered ourselves failures. Why? Because people hate to wait.

You know it's true. We all try to beat yellow traffic lights when we can, and then we zip away from the light as soon as we can. God help the person who doesn't see the light change. The wrath of Satan is unleashed with honking horns, swearing and hand signals. We are a culture of instant gratification. We want things now and we hate to wait. People who are otherwise kind turn into tyrants when they have to wait. It's almost as if Americans believe the Constitution has one of the inalienable rights (or are those in the Declaration of Independence?) to be free of delays.

It seems strange for me to be writing about Advent now close to the newsletter deadline of October 22nd (We make deadlines because people wait till the last minute!) before Halloween, and Thanksgiving, but I feel the need. I don't want to wait any longer because the date will be here before we know. I understand that I may have "hurt people" last year by making them wait to sing Christmas carols until Christmas. I'm sorry if that is the case. When I began my ministry at the church I was told that it was a liturgical church that followed the church year that millions of other churches around the globe follow. On that calendar, there are four weeks of Advent. My dictionary of religion says, "Advent is the month of penitential [self-examination] preparation [waiting] before the celebration of the feast of Christmas."

How we wait and prepare matters. If we wait by only marking time, counting down the days, or distracting ourselves with all the glitzy pretties the retailers have to offer, December 25th will come and go, but we will not experience Christmas. In order to experience Christmas, we have to wait actively for it instead of passively allowing it to come. We have to dig deep and understand our impatience. We have to say, "We will not succumb to the cultural sins of instant gratification." Theologian Marjorie Suchocki says that "Advent is an active waiting; we participate in the works of God within ourselves and within our world. While waiting for Advent, we give ourselves up to God's use for goodness."

As Pastor Alison Young wrote, "Actively waiting is one of the most difficult parts of being human. It means fully expecting and hoping for something to happen, but being completely open to what that is and how it looks and when it happens. Actively waiting requires relinquishing control. It requires vulnerability. It requires being open to the struggles that go along with learning more about ourselves – and God. But, learning to actively wait can also be one of the most rewarding parts of being human. Learning to actively wait changes us. It allows us to find joy in the unlikeliest of places. It teaches us more about who we are, and who God is."

So, as the secular world starts singing "Silent Night" on November 1st, we will wait. As Advent comes around and we all squirm because the Advent hymns and themes of the scriptures are designed to make us do just that, we will wait. While the kids complain that they can't open their gifts until Christmas, we will wait. It will take courage and patience, which our culture doesn't value, but we will wait. Perhaps in our waiting, we will find out what some folks did one night long ago in Bethlehem. Christ was worth waiting for! We weren't prepared back then. Will we be this year? I can't wait for Advent!

<u>POST SCRIPT</u>: As always, I love to hear all kinds of feedback. Please come directly to me should any concerns arise and I promise that I will deal directly with them. I cannot operate off hearsay. Otherwise, I'd spend all my time thinking about myself rather than the One who called me to ministry and the ones I serve: you! I do listen and respond to honest, constructive criticism. God knows and most of you know: I need and will accept all the help I can get. I need Advent, too! Come, Lord Jesus come. We wait for your salvation.

LEDGER 1773-1786

A few years ago I read and copied a ledger that was stored in the town hall basement. I don't believe this book has been read in the last two hundred years. It is a complete record of the step-by-step decisions made by our men in building our meetinghouse and forming our town. The following is just one of a series of excerpts from these writings. George DuHamel and Paula Lubin, Church Historians

State of Massachusetts Bay

Worcester, Sa. To Thomas Drury of Ward in the County of Worcester. Yeoman. Greetings.

By virtue of a late Act of the Great and General Court of this State for the greeting & Incorporating out of the Towns of Worcester, Sutton, Oxford & Leicester a new Town by the name of Ward, directing & impowering One Edward Davis Esq., one of the Justices of the Peace for the County aforesaid to issue a Warrant directed to Some principal Inhabitants within the town of Ward aforesaid, requiring him to warn a meeting of the inhabitants of S'd Ward, as set forth in S'd Act.

You are hereby required in the name of the gov't & people of the State of Massachusetts Bay fourthwith to warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Ward aforesaid Qualified to vote in Town Affairs to Assemble at the meeting-house in S'd Ward on Monday the fourth Day of May Next at nine of the clock in the forenoon.

First to choose a Moderator to manage Said meeting.

21y to choose all such officers as the Law requires to manage ye Affairs of S'd Town for ye year ensuing.


And you are hereby required to Obtain of the Town Clerk of S'd Worcester, Sutton, Oxford & Leicester before the time of S'd meeting a copy of the last list of ye valuation of all Real & Personal Estates of ye Inhabitants of S'd Ward in order to determine the Qualifacation of voters of S'd meeting.

Hereof fail not but make due return of this Warrant with your doings thereom unto myself at or before the time mentioned.

Given under my hands and Seal the 13th Day of April 1778.

Worcester, in Obedience to this Warrant, I have warned the Inhabitants as directed in this Warrant and have procured the Lists of Estates as set forth in S'd Warrant.

Neighbors In Need - Another World Is Possible

The Neighbors in Need offering supports the UCC's ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to fund a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects. Through UCCTakeAction.org, our national Justice and Witness Ministries office offers resources, news updates, and action alerts on a broad spectrum of justice issues. Working with members of the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network (a network of thousands of UCC justice and peace advocates), Justice and Witness continues its strong policy advocacy work on issues such as the federal budget, voting rights, immigration, health care, hate crimes, civil liberties, and environmental justice.

Neighbors in Need also supports our American Indian neighbors in the UCC. One-third of the offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM). Historically, forebears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa, Arickara, and Hocak in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, and northern Nebraska.

Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. These churches and their pastors are supported by CAIM. CAIM is also an invaluable resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations in the U.S.

It's fall again and people have been asking for Michele's traditional apple cake recipe that has been in her family for years. So, we are re-printing it for your convenience.

Liard Apple Cake

Preheat oven @ 350 degrees.

Ingredients: 3 Cups Flour ¹/₂ tsp Salt I tsp Baking Soda 2 tsp Cinnamon 3 Cups Unpeeled, Cored, Chopped Apples



- 3 Eggs
- 2 Cups Sugar
- I Cup Oil
- 2 tsp Vanilla

I Cup Chopped Nuts (optional)

Sift dry ingredients into large bowl. Mix in apples & nuts. Beat eggs into sugar, one at a time until fluffy. Add Oil; beat well; add vanilla. Stir mixture into dry ingredients. Blend well. Batter will be stiff.

Pour into 13x9 pan or tube pan. Bake for 40 - 60 minutes until inserted toothpick comes out clean. Enjoy!

Stewardship Message

Remember to Keep It Personal

Then he will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me."(Matthew 25:45)

This kid had a smile the size of Alaska. Probably eight or nine years old, he stood at my door with a rake twice his height. What he didn't have was a leaf bag. Neither did I on this windy Wednesday before Thanksgiving. Besides, my adult children promised that their contribution to the holiday was a day's yard work. The disappointed little boy trudged back up the driveway with drooping shoulders.

The familiar sheep and goats parable reminds us that when we feed one hungry person or make sure someone is clothed, sheltered, visited, healed, given hope, we are caring for Jesus Christ. Like most people, I've done those things through personal involvement or my checkbook. Faith practices of hospitality and justice include Thanksgiving baskets, mittens for the school mitten tree, board games for the correctional facility, phone calls and emails to friends or strangers for the prayer chain, and the sacrificial pledge I make this month to my church with its local mission and connection to so many places through Our Church's Wider Mission. I congratulate my sheeply self.

In this difficult financial year I've also learned a tougher lesson -- letting people support me, notice my occasional "least-ness."

But parables are supposed to pinch. The flip side of this one suggests that every lost opportunity to help one person rebuffs Christ. Sometimes I'm too tired for the phone call. Sometimes I don't want to share my privacy with a relative. Sometimes (at this season) my credit card feels wafer thin. Sometimes I don't spend five dollars for a big Alaska-size smile the day before Thanksgiving. Then I recognize the person walking away with the rake ... and I remember to keep it personal.
