

FROM THE PASTOR

I think November holidays are all about memories. Starting with the day after Halloween, "All Souls Day," when we remember and honor those who have left the mortal coil and gone to their reward. We will be having a Memorial Sunday on November 6 at which we will be remembering the members of First Congregational in Auburn who have died in the past year, with a flower and a candle. We will also have time for people in the service to come forward to light a candle and take a flower in memory of loved ones they know who have passed on. (You are welcome to name them as you light the candle or keep silent as the Spirit moves you.)

Then we have Veterans' Day, a day that first commemorates the End of World War I and has now come to honor all veterans of all wars in many countries. For the last decade I have seen a lot more young people in Veterans' Day observances. In some ways this makes me sad they come because, again, our country is at war and a new generation is facing the dangers, paying the costs and recovering from the damage war does to humans. On the other hand, it makes me happy, because for sometime it was only the World war II, Korea and Vietnam generations to be found honoring veterans. The young generations, including mine, were oblivious to the meaning of their mid November day off.

Lastly, we come to Thanksgiving. There is a movie, *Pieces of April*, where a young woman (Katie Holmes) is trying to explain to an immigrant family what Thanksgiving is about. She starts with, "Well it was the last good time before we started killing the Indians." But that made no sense to the immigrants. So finally she said, "Once, there was this day... this one day when... everyone realized they needed each other." That movie is about an estranged daughter and her family trying to reconnect despite their bad memories. For a story about the First Thanksgiving I recommend, *The Wordy Shipmates*, an amusing retelling of the pilgrims' story from their own writings by the woman who was the voice of the daughter in the Pixar movie *The Incredibles*.

I pray in November you have wonderful memories, new and old, to share.

Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. These churches and their pastors are supported by CAIM. CAIM is also an invaluable resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations in the U.S.

Sunday, November 6th with a **deadline date no later than Sunday, November 13th**. Extra hats and mittens will be pleasantly welcomed by the school if you can't afford to fill a jacket bag.

The Goddard School of Science and Technology is located on 14 Richards Street, in Worcester, MA. This urban public school is situated in the Main South section of Worcester with an enrollment of 586 multi-race students, grades K-6. A large number of the students come from families living below the poverty line. With your support, there will be 23 very thankful youngsters with warm jackets this holiday season.

To the walkers and all gracious givers, thank you for helping make a difference in the community of Auburn; specifically, Auburn Youth and Family Services and Kateri's Kitchen. All donations raised by group supporters for Sunday's 10/23/2011 walk were given to both these worthwhile agencies to fill their food pantries. The First Congregational Church in Auburn turned in a total of \$464.47, most of which was collected in two Celtic player basketball sneakers during church services.

Hope for Housing grocery store cards continue to be available for sale in Fellowship Hall every week. They come in denominations of \$10, \$25, \$50 and \$100, and include: Shaws, Hannafords, Big Y and Stop & Shop. Each card you purchase in this important mission puts another 5% of the card's face value toward the HfH program. A recent email from the HfH committee reads: "...the lines have been out the door at the old CMHA office this week, as increasing numbers of families are searching for housing ... and the worst is still to come. In addition to families crowding shelters and doubled up with other families, an incredible eleven hundred families are put up in motels across the state! This is clearly unacceptable! Thank you for continuing to shorten this line, family by family"

November is American Diabetes Month. This is a time to raise awareness of diabetes prevention and control. In the U.S., 24 million people are living with diabetes and 57 million more are at risk of developing type 2 diabetes. Over time, if not controlled, type 2 diabetes can cause serious health problems like heart disease, stroke, and blindness. You may be at risk for type 2 diabetes if you:

Are overweight Exercise less than 3 times a week Are over 45 years old Have high blood pressure or high cholesterol Have a parent, brother, or sister with diabetes.

November is also Diabetic Eye Disease Month, Foot Health Issues Related to Diabetes Awareness Month, Lung Cancer Awareness Month, National Stomach Cancer Awareness Month, COPD Awareness Month, National Family Caregivers Month, National Healthy Skin Month, National Hospice Palliative Care Month, and Premature Awareness Month. November 6 -12 is Drowsy Driving Prevention Week, the 14th -20th is Get Smart About Antibiotics Week, and the 20th-26th is Gastroesophageal Reflux Disease (GERD) Awareness Week. November 17th is the Great American Smokeout Day and November 19th is National Survivors of Suicide Day.

I have information about the above mentioned on the table in Fellowship Hall. Please help yourself.

Two things were recently brought to my attention that I want to share with you. (1) If you or a loved one have a (DNR) Do Not Resuscitate order signed by a physician, please keep it on your refrigerator. This is where emergency personnel will look if they enter your home. Do not keep it in a file drawer. (2), if you have chest pain or numbness in one of your arms or legs, if you think you're having a heart attack or stroke call 9 -1-1 immediately. Do Not Wait to see if it resolves. There are medicines that can be administered within a few hours that can help you. There is a much better chance if you are treated right away.
