On October 8th Rich and Jean McPherson will be celebrating their wedding anniversary - Happy Anniversary!





#### Walking Together

When we began the Urban Ministry in Worcester three years ago, we could not have imagined the growth in numbers and support which we have experienced. Over the past year, thanks to the support of your parish and others, we have increased both the hours and the programming at Walking Together, our storefront at 799 Main Street in Worcester, as well as continuing the ministry of presence which is central to our mission in the city.

Walking Together is now open each morning from about 8:30 to noon, offering coffee and snacks and conversation and support to all who come by. We serve between 35 and 50 people each morning, some coming in to grab a cup of coffee, some to charge a cell phone or get in out of the rain, and others to talk about their lives.

We offer help in getting into detox, give information about programs and services available in the community, and create a safe space for people to rest and connect in the midst of their day. Some people come in each day, others stop by once or twice a week. Most we know by name. Many share their gifts with us, whether by sweeping the floor, filling a coffee carafe, or sharing their experience, strength and hope with others.

The storefront is well used by the wider community as well. We have regular AA and NA groups, as well as a single fathers' support group, ESL classes, an exercise class and a job skills class. Many of those who stop by each morning are part of one or more of the other groups who use the building.

This summer we offered a Wednesday afternoon parent/child activity time. The first week we had one mom come with her child. The next week we had two moms and two kids. Week three had three moms and four kids! We plan to offer similar drop-in time during school vacations this year, and hope to have something next summer as well. We had supplies for jewelry making and knitting and crocheting for the mothers, and shared books and blocks and music with the kids. Each child left with a small toy—bubbles, sidewalk chalk, or the ever-present Play-doh!

Play-doh remains a feature of Laundry Love as well. On the second Thursday of each month we offer free laundry, a simple meal of pizza and juice and water, and activities for kids. We serve between 50 and 60 households each month. We show up with detergent, dryer sheets and trash bags (for instant laundry bags), as well as six party-sized pizzas, paper plates and napkins, cases of water bottles and juice boxes. The volunteers who help with the kid area bring Play-doh, Legos, books and craft supplies.

One of the wonderful things about Laundry Love is the way different groups have collaborated with us over the past year. In the Spring we had student nurses joining us to offer "baby boxes" which provide a safe space for a newborn to sleep. They also did wellness checks with some of the pregnant moms. We also have regular visitors from the Worcester Parenting Alliance who bring books to give to each child. And volunteers from ACTS bring clothing and other items to share with our guests.

We gather for prayer each night at Laundry Love. The circle stretches all around the laundromat at the end of the night. We pray in thanksgiving for the time we share and the community gathered, offer prayers for those in need, and mark occasions and offer prayers on behalf of those in the circle.

Maundy Thursday fell on a Laundry Love night this year. We offered foot washing during the evening, and we were blessed to have a massage therapist join us as well. After we washed people's feet, she gave them a foot massage. One woman, who lives in a truck with her husband who has dementia, told us that it was the first time in years that someone had taken care of her. At the end of the evening we celebrated communion at one of the folding tables, thanking God for the gift of community and service.

This year we have been blessed by volunteers from several different parishes and communities. We had an intern this summer through the chaplain's office at Holy Cross College, and we now have an Episcopal deacon assigned to Walking Together. The Rev. Deacon Julie Butcher joins us at the storefront once a week, and joins me at the parishes where I preach each weekend. She brings a compassionate heart and gentle spirit to our time together.

I continue to be grateful for the gift which you offered from the Sibley fund. I hope that many of you will come join us for a morning at the storefront or an evening at the laundromat.

Fenby, a longtime area minister died peacefully on Sunday, September 24, 2017 at Saint Francis Home, Worcester. He was 85. Bob was born and raised in Quincy, son of the late George and Edna (Ellis) Fenby.

He graduated from Quincy High School, New England College, Henniker, NH and the Hartford Theological Seminary, Hartford, CT and attended Pastor's School at Furman University, Greenville, SC. A proud veteran of the US Navy, Bob was stationed in Newport, RI. and served as the assistant to the Chief Chaplain for 3 years.


Bob first served the Dane Street Congregational Church in Beverly. He was then called to the Hadwen Park Congregational Church in Worcester, where he was pastor for 34 years, before retiring in 1998. Following retirement, Bob began a new ministry with Bethel Lutheran Church in Auburn through an agreement with the Congregational and Lutheran Churches in Massachusetts. He served that congregation for 12 years until his retirement in 2010. He was a member of the Auburn Clergy Association, served on several committees with the Massachusetts Council of the United Church of Christ and was past president of Worcester Council of Churches. Bob also served on numerous community boards and organizations including Auburn Youth and Family Services Board of Directors, the chairman of the Worcester and Auburn

CROP Walks and chairman of the Auburn Walk for Hunger. He was a proud member of the Joel H. Prouty Lodge of Masons in Auburn, where he was chaplain for many years, and a master counselor of DeMolay. He was a recipient of several awards including the John E. and Ethel E. Riley Outstanding Citizen Award as well as the Children's Friend Award from the Auburn Youth and Family Services and the God and Country Award from the Boy Scouts of America.

He leaves his loving wife of 61 years, Leona F. (Ciardelli) Fenby; his daughter, Pamela A. Lazerick and her husband, John, and their two children, Zachary Robert and Gabriel John Lazerick.

Relatives and friends are invited to Bob's life celebration and memorial service on Friday, September 29 at 11 a.m. at the Bethel Lutheran Church, 90 Bryn Mawr Avenue, Auburn. Burial with military honors will be held privately.

During the month of September, the children became familiar with their teachers, new friends and new surroundings. They had a tour of the entire building and met Denise and Pastor Brian.

Each child received homework the second week of school. Continuing with one of our traditions, the children created a picture page of their families and added it to their classroom family album. It is one of the ways we become familiar with the many different types of families attending HWG. It is also a great way for the children to open up to someone, just by talking about their families.

We had a great parent turnout for Parent Orientation which was held a week before school started. Many questions were asked and answered with the hope that all fears were put to rest. For the  $8^{th}$  year in a row we offered a "Meet the Teachers" time before the actual first day of class. Again, we had a good turnout.

Starting the first day of school all the children are taught our prayer that we say before our snack and lunch times. Many of the children teach their families the same prayer at home. I would like to share the prayer with you as we fondly remember Gloria Whitehead who found this prayer for us.
