From the Pastor

Cabbage and I walk morning and night just about everyday. Often when we are walking, I try to keep him off a lawn because I see a little sign that says pesticide or herbicide then a picture of a child and a dog with the circle and slash. I wonder, what is the point of a lawn if it is not for dogs and kids to walk and play on it?

This also reminds me of an email that made the rounds years ago. I found this on several sites, but no definitive proof of author.



Imagine the conversation the Creator might have had with St. Francis on the subject of lawns:

- God: Hey St. Francis, you know all about gardens and nature. What in the world is going on down there in the Midwest? What happened to the dandelions, violets, thistle and stuff I started eons ago? I had a perfect "no maintenance" garden plan. Those plants grow in any type of soil, withstand drought and multiply with abandon. The nectar from the long lasting blossoms attracts butterflies, honey bees and flocks of songbirds. I expected to see a vast garden of colors by now. But all I see are these green rectangles.
- St. Francis: It's the tribes that settled there, Lord. The Suburbanites. They started calling your flowers "weeds" and went to great lengths to kill them and replace them with grass.
- God: Grass? But it's so boring. It's not colorful. It doesn't attract butterflies, birds and bees, only grubs and sod worms. It's temperamental with temperatures. Do these Suburbanites really want all that grass growing there?
- St. Francis: Apparently so, Lord. They go to great pains to grow it and keep it green. They begin each spring by fertilizing grass and poisoning any other plant that crops up in the lawn.
- God: The spring rains and warm weather probably make grass grow really fast. That must make the Suburbanites happy.
- St. Francis: Apparently not, Lord. As soon as it grows a little, they cut it... sometimes twice a week.
- God: They cut it? Do they then bail it like hay?
- St. Francis: Not exactly, Lord. Most of them rake it up and put it in bags.
- God: They bag it? Why? Is it a cash crop? Do they sell it?
- St. Francis: No Sir. Just the opposite. They pay to throw it away.
- God: Now let me get this straight. They fertilize grass so when it does grow, they cut it off and pay to throw it away? St. Francis: Yes, Sir.
- God: These Suburbanites must be relieved in the summer when we cut back on the rain and turn up the heat. That surely slows the growth and saves them a lot of work.
- St. Francis: You are not going to believe this Lord. When the grass stops growing so fast, they drag out hoses and pay more money to water it so they can continue to mow it and pay to get rid of it.
- God: What nonsense. At least they kept some of the trees. That was a sheer stroke of genius, if I do say so myself. The trees grow leaves in the spring to provide beauty and shade in the summer. In the autumn they fall to the ground and form a natural blanket to keep moisture in the soil and protect the trees and bushes. Plus, as they rot, the leaves form compost to enhance the soil. It's a natural circle of life.
- St. Francis: You better sit down, Lord. The Suburbanites have drawn a new circle. As soon as the leaves fall, they rake them into great piles and pay to have them hauled away.
- God: No. What do they do to protect the shrub and tree roots in the winter and to keep the soil moist and loose?
- St. Francis: After throwing away the leaves, they go out and buy something which they call mulch. They haul it home and spread it around in place of the leaves.
- God: And where do they get this mulch?
- St. Francis: They cut down trees and grind them up to make the mulch.
- God: Enough. I don't want to think about this anymore. Sister Catherine, you're in charge of the arts. What movie have you scheduled for us tonight?
- Sister Catherine: "Dumb and Dumber," Lord. It's a real stupid movie about.....
- God: Never mind, I think I just heard the whole story from St. Francis.

Also, we will be calling you to bake and make food for our new frozen dinner section.





Auburn Comfort Blankets

Have you heard the news? After a 20-year affiliation with Project Linus, Carole Murray has made the decision to end her ties with the organization. The good news is that our Project Linus blanketeers who meet on Tuesday mornings at the church will continue their good works and good times under the new name: Auburn Comfort Blankets. As a result of a recent vote of the Church Council, Auburn Comfort Blankets is now under the umbrella of the Board of Christian Outreach, although we do not seek financial support from their allotted funds.



The purpose of Auburn Comfort Blankets, or ACB, will be for the local distribution of handmade cloth or yarn blankets (no fleece will be accepted) to those experiencing stress from trauma, illness, or life-changing events. This purpose differs from that of Project Linus only in that we will provide blankets to children and to adults as well. Besides the usual delivery of infant and children's blankets to both UMass and Memorial Hospitals, some of the agencies who are potential recipients of blankets are both men's and women's veterans shelters, women and children's and men's homeless and abuse shelters, and Hospice. Personal requests for blankets from church members and friends who know of a need would also be fulfilled locally.

ACB welcomes offers of help with the making of quilt tops or completed quilts, knitted or crocheted (using patterns with no holes for little fingers to poke through) blankets. Monetary donations for the purchase of batting and quilt-tying supplies may be made through our church. We ask that checks be made out to FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH OF AUBURN with a note on the check for it to be applied to Auburn Comfort Blankets account. This keeps your donation tax-deductible and will appear on your annual statement as noted. Donations of yarn suitable for soft blankets and only 100% cotton fabric would be appreciated. Questions and offers of participation may be directed to Kathy Holt, Sue Campbell or Carol Luther, as well as Carole Murray.

In closing, THANK YOU to Carole Murray for her years of service as Area Coordinator for Project Linus. She has overseen the distribution of nearly 45,000 blankets over the years. That is a lot of comfort, healing, warmth and love that was spread around!

The following families have experienced losses since the last printing of the *Tidings* in late May. Please keep them in your thoughts and prayers as they continue to mourn the loss of their loved ones.

William E. Wallace Jr., 89, passed away on June 25th, 2017, surrounded by his family. Bill grew up in a tenement house on Newbury Street in Boston, MA. As soon as Bill met the age requirement, he joined the army, and was a member of the U.S. Army Military Police. After the war, he followed in his father's footsteps and pursued a career in the funeral business. He graduated from the former Boston School of Anatomy and Embalming in 1950. In 1955, he established the Wallace Funeral Home in Auburn - which he ran until 1988.

He served as a member of the Board of Deacons and Board of Trustees of our Church. He was a volunteer with the American Red Cross. Bill was a member of the Auburn Board of Health, the Hazardous Waste Site Safety Committee and the Town of Auburn Solid Waste Advisory Committee. He was a former Town Meeting Member, Past President of the Auburn District Nursing Association, and Past President and Charter Member of the Auburn Kiwanis Club. He was an incorporator and President of the former Auburn Business Men's Association (now the Auburn Chamber of Commerce). He was a Justice of the Peace and a member of the Massachusetts Justice of the Peace Association and served on its Executive Board. He remained a member of the National Funeral Directors Association as well as the Massachusetts Funeral Directors Association.

He is survived by three sons, William E. Wallace III, Robert J. Wallace Sr., Christopher J. Sommerhoff, one daughter, Karin Graves, as well as nine grandchildren, and several great-grandchildren. He was pre-deceased by his wife of 43 years, Norma H. (Ring) Wallace, and his son, Donald B. Wallace.

A service with military honors was held on Friday June 30, 2017 at Britton-Wallace Funeral Home in Auburn with private burial in Hillside Cemetery, Auburn.

Joyce A. (Mitchell) Aker Wooldridge, 79, of Auburn passed away peacefully of Alzheimer's on Saturday, July 29, 2017 in Evergreen Nursing Home in East Providence, RI. Joyce was born in Brattleboro, Vermont and raised in Auburn, the daughter of the late Herbert I. and Eleanor J. (Brown) Mitchell. Her older brother, Glenn E. 
New Library Program
