As many of you know, I took a 9 week sabbatical this Summer. This marked the start of my 11th year as your pastor.

This was the first time I had so much time off since I was in middle school. Also, up north, I had no internet and spotty cell service. It made me think of the old days.

I well remember drinking from the water hose as a kid. Drinking from the hose had rules. If the hose had a nozzle, you had to let the water run awhile because water in the hose got very hot from the summer sun. You did not aim the hose at your face, rather you stood to the side, put your mouth into the stream of water, got a mouthful, and then moved away from the water stream to swallow and breathe. Then you went in for another drink.

I think the rules for water hose drinking are useful in other parts of life. Now none of us need another thing to do. Rather, I hope you take this as an invitation to do less.

We should not live in fear of missing out. We are just one person, just one family. We are going to miss things. There is too much news. Too many posts to possibly see, and react to all of them. So don't try.

Take time out from the feeds. Let things cool off. Don't post a reaction immediately. Maybe log off well before bedtime or not log on until lunch. It used to be only brain surgeons needed to be in contact at all hours of the day and night. Now everyone has their phone on at all times. Always being available is a drain on our energy and bad for our well being.

Being back home with cable TV, internet access, and cell coverage I have felt overwhelmed by the amount of information coming my way. Instead of sipping from

a garden hose, I feel like I am getting blasted by a firehose in the face. There is so much “news.” So many emails to catch up on. Facebook notifications. Photos to comment on, photos too perfect because they are more Photoshop art than a true photograph.

All this stuff is supposed to make us better, more informed, more connected people. But it is often too much. This stuff takes our time and puts our attention far away, and we ignore the near and the intimate.

A week after one hurricane, a new hurricane is hitting New Orleans. The local news outlets are covering it like it is going to hit us, but it is a thousand miles away. The hurricane in New Orleans does not deserve our attention the way the previous one did.

It used to be that I knew my local and state officials more than the national ones, not anymore. The far away intrudes on the local. But local is often more important.

The trouble is that there is too much, and not enough time for it all. We can do so much. We can learn about anything. Who hasn't gone online for one thing and ended up spending hours instead? There are so many good things and not enough time to enjoy them all.

It is hard to shut off the flood of info coming at us. But, like drinking from the hose, we have to pull our head out of the stream to swallow and breathe. If we don't take a break every once in awhile, we lose time to think. Humans need quiet time, time to consider and gather energy to DO something about the bad things coming at us.

I pray you got to relax and recharge.

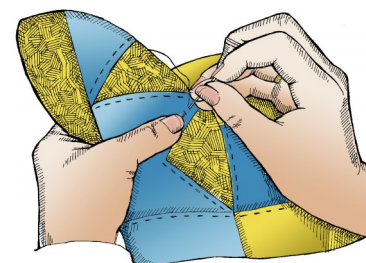

The frame comes attached to a pot of soil. Dress the frame with your choice of shirts, stuff a head with hay, and attach some "hair".

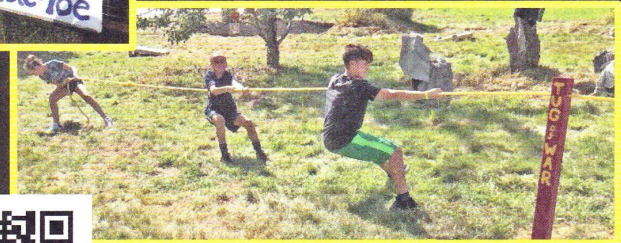
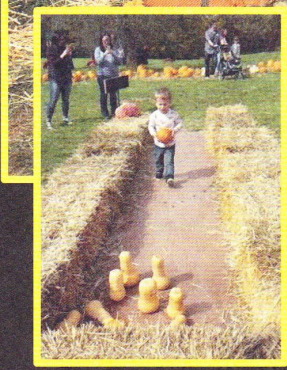

## FROM THE OUTREACH COMMITTEE

Happy September, here's hoping that maybe now we can catch a break from the heat and humidity of an unusual summer and enjoy some more enjoyable, seasonal weather!

Via phone and e-mail, Outreach had one meeting this summer and chose to donate to three different organizations. A \$250. donation was made to the Joy of Music Program, a nonprofit community music school in Worcester. This was given in memory of 18 year-old Charlie Fosberry. Charlie was the grandson of our organist, Paulette LaBarre. Like his grandmother, Charlie was a talented musician who lost his battle to leukemia in May. The Director, Wendy Ardizzone, states in her thank-you note, "...through your special gift you are helping us pass along the joy Charlie found in music to so many others, including students needing financial assistance."

When the Surfside Condo collapsed in June, we contacted Church World Service to see if they would be doing anything to help support the families waiting to hear the fate of their loved ones. Although they were not, they were kind enough to look into what the needs might be and recommended we donate to Mercy Chefs, a faith based, non-profit disaster relief organization. Their mission statement being, "**Just Go Feed People.**" They provide professionally prepared, restaurant-quality meals to victims, volunteers and first responders in natural disasters and national emergencies. Check out [mercychefs.com](http://mercychefs.com) to learn more about their work. A donation of \$500. was sent.

Our final donation of \$500. was given to Royal Families Camp. This is a one week camp for foster children run by volunteers from Liberty Church in Shrewsbury. They have expanded their program to include a once monthly Royal Family Club throughout the school year serving the same children with the same dedicated volunteers. Each child is paired with the same adult throughout both camp and club. "This gives them the consistency of a caring adult and, more importantly, instills in them that God truly does have a plan for their lives, they are loved, and they have a purpose." States Liz Belanger, who along with her husband, Ron, are the Camp Directors.

With just under half of our annual budget remaining, we will be meeting soon to discuss how to finish out the remainder of the year.

As always we are open to suggestions of where our church's money should go. If you know of someone or someplace that could use some support, please notify a member of our committee. We represent our congregation and welcome your input.

**Donald G. Post**, co-owner of the Hillcrest Farm and The Farmer's Daughter Garden Center, passed away peacefully on Sunday, June 20, while surrounded by his family. He was 89.

He leaves his son, Robert Post, and wife, Margaret; daughter, Cynthia Bertrand, and husband, Gary; daughter-in-law, Laurel (Johnson) Post; 6 grandchildren and 4 great-grandchildren and many nieces, nephews and extended family.

Don was predeceased by his brother, Claude Post, Jr., and his wife, Eleanor. His son, Gary Post, passed in 2019. Sylvia Cutting Post, the love of his life and wife of 53 years, passed in 2006.

Don was born in 1931, in Butler, New Jersey, the son of Claude Post, Sr. and Mary (Brautigam) Post. He was raised in New Jersey, working in his father's electronics store and was a successful student athlete, excelling at track and field, including running the Boston Marathon. Don was involved in scouting while in high school, and achieved the highest rank of Eagle Scout. He received a full scholarship to attend Worcester Polytechnic Institute, graduating with a degree in mechanical engineering, where he was a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, and subsequently attended Harvard Business School. While attending WPI, his fraternity brother, Charles Cutting, introduced Don to his sister, Sylvia. They were married at the Cutting family's dairy farm in Auburn in 1953.

Don spent nearly two decades leading Hillcrest Dairy's operations in Worcester. He subsequently had a successful career working as a sales and marketing executive for Sweetheart Plastics and Foster Grant.

After "retiring," he and Sylvia founded the Farmer's Daughter with their daughter, Cynthia, by initially selling produce grown on their farm. In the ensuing 40 years, he and his family grew the Farmer's Daughter to become a cherished and successful garden center and seasonal Christmas tree business. Don was known by his customers and employees for his warm welcomes, gregarious personality, dedication to his family business, and his passion for helping people enjoy the beauty of Mother Nature, staying actively involved until his passing.

Don participated in several community organizations serving as the President of the Rotary Clubs of Worcester and Auburn, where he made many enduring friendships, and as the President of the Mohegan Council of the Boy Scouts of America. He served the town of Auburn as a Planning Board member and as a Town Meeting member. He has been a member of several professional organizations including Massachusetts Flower Growers Association, Massachusetts Nursery and Landscape Association, and Perennial Plant Association. He was also a member of our church.

Don enjoyed traveling, reading and was a fan of Boston sports teams. He was fortunate to have spent over 40 years visiting his home-away-from-home on the north shore of Kauai. His business was his passion, but his true love was his family. A funeral service was held at our church on June 26th, 2021 with burial at Hillside Cemetery.
