



At our last board meeting, the Board of Directors voted to change the school colors from purple and white to blue and white. We are now selling blue and white t-shirts and sweat-shirts.

Library Tidings

In straightening out some of the books in the Children's Library, I came upon *Thank You God* by Bill and Bernard Martin. The illustrations were confirmed by copyright in 1952. Some of the writings are a bit "sweeter" than those of the present, but the foreword—simple and direct—on how we can teach our children to pray, is perfect for younger children. The variety of prayers are the same.

Library Among a very wide selection of books on prayer, here are a few others.

Prayers for the Very Young Child by Donald S. Roberts - a series of mostly four line prayers that present the basic Christian concepts in images, thoughts and rhymes which are in the easy-to-read category as well.

Prayers for a Child by Rachel Field (paperback) - goes back to 1941 and 3 more printings to 1972, great illustrations.

There are two high chair devotions - *God Cares for Me* and *God Made My World* by Marilyn J. Woody, which include finger plays.

Small Prayers for Small Children by Paul A. Schreivogel has bold print, a WIDE variety of subjects you might never think about, fascinating pictures, and is an "attention getter."

Why Do I Pray? by Jean H. Richards asks this question over and over and gives many answers.

The Little Book of Prayers selected by Caroline Walsh is a small treasure of inspiration reflecting different moods, some old favorites and incredible illustrations—for all ages.

Prayer for the Twenty-First Century by John Marsden. This Australian designer's books are colored by his passion for justice and peace and his horror for cruelty, and so is this prayer and its universal message—older children and adults.

A composition of fine art and famous authors, *A Child's Book of Prayer* compiled by Lorenz Books is a treasure for the mind and the eyes—again, older children and adults.

April is the month to celebrate reading and libraries. Do check yours to see all the wonderful gifts you have given.

Note: Books referenced will be on display after Easter.

P.S. Two great new books! *Dear John* by Nicholas Sparks—given by Avis Britton and *The Great Deluge* (Hurricane Katrina, New Orleans, and the Mississippi Gulf Coast) by Douglas Brinkley—given by the other half of the Britton team, Ben. Thanks to both of you.

Easter Sunrise

The Farmer's Almanac shows that sunrise on Easter morning will be at 6:28 a.m. in the Northern states for 45° north latitude 15° west longitude. However, an adjustment needs to be made for Auburn, which is 71.5° west longitude. Four minutes are subtracted for each degree east of the standard.

So, sunrise in Auburn will

be at 6:14 a.m. (14 minutes earlier than the standard).

The Sunrise Service will be in Hillside Cemetery (near the cemetery office) at 6:30 a.m. on Easter morning, April 8, 2007. 
