Speaking of Life

Reflections from Rev. Mark Seifried, your Interim Pastor

*This is the disciple who is testifying to these things and that has written them,
and we know that his testimony is true.*

*But there are also many other things that Jesus did; if every one of them were written down,
I suppose that the world itself could not contain the books that would be written.*

John 21:24-25 (NRSV)

The citation above contains the last words from John's gospel. After the various post-resurrection appearances of Jesus, John puts himself and the reader into the story ... into the Good News. He knows that Jesus was still roaming the Earth when he finished his writing. He knew that, if his words endured for centuries, as they have, that Jesus would still be alive and well in the world. He could never assert the resurrection any other way.

Jesus was alive and is alive and will be alive tomorrow ... or will He?

Throughout much of the world death is believed to come in three stages. The first death occurs when the body's heart stops pumping. The second death occurs when there is nothing left of the body but dry bones. This stage usually comes a year following the first death. Many cultures move the bones from a coffin to an ossuary at this time. The third and final stage of death is supposed to occur when the deceased's name is spoken for the last time. While I believe in the resurrection of Christ and have faith that each of us participates in that resurrection, I also see the truth and wisdom to this three -stage understanding of death.

As we ponder the resurrection during the season of Easter, let's ponder it personally. Many of you dedicate flowers and anthems and other things on behalf of your loved ones who are deceased. And so they continue to live in our collective memories ... they are very much alive in our common life – praise be!

What about your faith? What about the Christ who still makes his presence known and talks with some of us? (Even you perhaps, if you're looking and listening!) Does your faith live if you never mention it? Does your Savior live if you never mention His name? Does your church live if you never mention Her name? Who is responsible for that life? Who is participating in the resurrection? How will those who have never heard the Good News believe the testimony of John and Matthew and Mark and Luke if they don't first hear your testimony?

Our life is the Good News that could fill many volumes. Your testimony bears witness to our faith. The life of our church depends on your stories. Your invitations to participate in the good news that are shared with others help the faith of others grow.

My Easter prayer for you, for our faith, for our church, for Auburn and communities beyond ...and for our Savior is that you can love the life you've been given so much that you speak of the wonders, the love and the salvation you have witnessed ... by name ... to all that would hear. We're all counting on you for our very lives. We're all participating in the resurrection. Let us speak the resurrection into life and let us speak Christ into the world.

Library Tidings

There are just three weeks left in Lent. Just as the Advent Calendar kept us aware of the days before Christmas, so Palm Sunday indicates that in one more week the resurrection of Jesus will be celebrated in most Christian Churches. Pastor Mark nudged us to re-acquaint ourselves with just who we are, and in what ways we can better serve our land, its people, and ultimately, God. This spurred us to think about children and books that are in their library that “speak” of Christ’s challenge through the period which became known as Lent.

Who Is Jesus by Kathleen Long Bostrom is listed for ages 0-5 and is currently in a Sunday School classroom. The topic of death is presented in a very simple form and the whole book is written and illustrated in a delightful style. *Who Is God* and a couple of other books by this author are just as appealing.

Jesus Is Risen, retold by LaVonne Neff is suggested for ages 4-9 depending on the reading level of a youngster. It’s the life of Christ and covers Palm Sunday through the Resurrection and the print is fairly large.

A Child’s Book of Prayer, a Lorenz Book, is a book of art in itself. However, it’s also an anthology with verse that is centuries old and a source of exquisite plus quiet entertainment for all ages. We recommend that everyone, at some time, glance through this book. It will be on the table in the adult library.

Mary Alice Jones has written Bible stories for many years and among those for older children is *His Name Was Jesus*. Its style is a bit different. For example, on page 199, paragraph 3 it reads, “The women recognized them as Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus, the Pharisee, two men of influence who, some said, were secretly followers of Jesus. (They were standing in front of the tomb). ‘What cowards they were!’ Mary Magdalene said. The conversation goes on and it’s agreed among the group that God could have saved Him. ‘It is past our understanding, Salome,’ someone replies. The trumpet announces the beginning of the Sabbath and they hurry home.” The presentation somewhat involves the reader in the story.

Jesus the Carpenter’s Son by Sophia L. Faks is also a more detailed explanation as to the plotting and chapter 20 reads, “The End Becomes the Beginning.”

Adults could find both books informative. It’s still early enough to be moved by Lent into the jubilation of Easter.

May yours be blessed.

Stewardship Message

Pay It Alleluia!

After the religious authorities had assembled with the elders, they devised a plan to give a large sum of money to the soldiers telling them, “You must say, ‘His disciples came by night and stole him away while we were asleep.’” (Matthew 28:12-13)

“It’s just my job – I don’t have to like it.”

“I don’t care where it comes from – it’s for a good cause.”

“This church can’t afford to be picky about its portfolio.”

The tradition that Matthew’s gospel was written by someone busy in April ... well, a tax collector, gains credence by his two financial notes for Holy Week. Matthew remembers the price of Judas’ betrayal was thirty pieces of silver and that the soldiers were paid to stifle what they saw of the resurrection and spread the body-snatching rumor.

We regularly reflect on the ethics of spending money. We consider personal and church budgets. We choose “green” in home, community and congregation. We give offerings, make pledges, invest in projects. As these serious days of Lent shift to Holy Week, it is also important to examine prayerfully how we earn, receive, accept and benefit from money. Money is neither good nor evil in itself, but there are transactions that hide the holy or risk the resurrection.

Easter is priceless, certain and can never be “bought off” as these lyrics to *Christ the Lord is Risen Today* claim!

Seek we now where Christ has led, Al-le-lu-ia!

Stewardship un-li-mi-ted, Al-le-lu-ia!

Ours the faith, the peace, the joy, Al-le-lu-ia!

Gifts that nothing can destroy, Al-le-lu-ia!

Lift our hearts and raise our voices, Al-le-lu-ia!

Hope has opened up our choices, Al-le-lu-ia!

As we work, invest, and pray, Al-le-lu-ia!

April is Alcohol Awareness Month, Counseling Awareness Month, Foot Health Awareness Month, National Autism Awareness Month, National Cancer Control Month, National Child Abuse Prevention Month, National Donate Life Month, National Youth Sports Safety Month, and Occupational Therapy Month. April 6-12 is National Public Health Week, April 7th is World Health Day, the 18th is National Healthy Kids Day and the 25th is World Meningitis Day.

Now that spring is here, there are three things that need to be attended to:

1. Sunscreen to prevent burns and future skin cancer.
2. Bike helmets to prevent head injuries.
3. Tick bites. Check yourself, children and pets after being outside. If you find a tick on someone's skin: using fine-tipped tweezers, grasp the head of the tick close to the skin. Firmly and steadily pull the tick straight out of the skin. Do not twist or rock the tick back and forth while removing it. Put the tick in alcohol to kill it, then wash your hands and the site of the bite with soap and water. Swab the bite with alcohol. Call the doctor if: the tick may have been on the skin for more than 24 hours, part of the tick remains in the skin after attempted removal, the child develops a rash especially a red - ringed bull's eye rash, if the area looks infected, or if the child develops any symptoms like fever, headache, fatigue, chills, stiff neck or back, or muscle aches.

From the Nominating Committee

As the newest member of the Nominating Committee, particularly after having served 3 years prior as a Deacon, I am often asked to explain the responsibilities associated with the Diaconate. Given the 4 vacancies that currently exist, there seems to be a feeling the commitment of time has little flexibility and the responsibility is overwhelming.

Members of the Diaconate do hold a very responsible position. Members meet once a month in order to coordinate any of the specifics needed within the liturgical schedule with the Minister, to assist the Minister in whatever way possible, and to discuss the upcoming month, specifically any and all worship activities. Outreach for those members of the congregation who are homebound or disabled is yet another function.

Collectively there is a commitment as is outlined in the Constitution and Bylaws but there is also the flexibility associated with a genuine collaborative effort of ALL the Deacons. There will always be personal commitments and time constraints. Members consistently help one another and fill in for one another in order to meet all of the required duties.

Although it is important to recognize the responsibility, it is also important to understand what an impact giving has on you as an individual. To give is to receive back in so many ways . . . a simple thank you, an expression of gratitude, or an understanding hug are often expressions far more meaningful than words can convey.

This ministry is very special beginning with the sanctity and peacefulness of this Church as the altar is readied for services each week. The preparation of the Baptismal Font allows us to reflect on our Christian beliefs as we stand ready to assist the Minister with the Baptism ceremony. It is the weekly contact with the congregation, the welcome to a visitor, or an inquiry made when you become aware of family illness or crisis that brings meaning to serving as a Deacon. There is an expression, "Once a Deacon always a Deacon." This IS absolutely true. A Deacon simply does what needs to be done prior, during, and after each service.

A Deacon who was instrumental in making me feel welcome as a newcomer to this Church community was Ben Britton. Ben epitomizes an unwavering strong faith foundation combined with experience, kindness and an astute knowledge of all the duties and responsibilities having served many terms as a member of the Diaconate. When Ben stepped down as an "official Deacon," he remained vigilant to anything needing to be done - be it the lighting of candles, escorting a newcomer, or simply a handshake expressing a genuine welcome.

When I served as the weekly greeter, Ben would often stand with me, knowing I would otherwise be alone. We would chat and greet together. If there was anything needing an answer, Ben was always available and, yes, very much "on duty."
