Library Tidings by Gloria Whitehead

The Thirsty Village - This is a book that carries a poignant message which can extend through endless time. Though written for children of around 8 or 9 years old, I found myself eager to complete reading its substance from cover to cover in one sitting one night. The story centers around two boys living in Lebanon in neighboring villages. Jirjis' village is mostly Christian, as is he, and Ahmed's is mainly Muslim, as is he. Water is a constant source of ugly contention between the two areas as only <u>one</u> well is their source of supply.

Summer camp, where incidentally English is also taught, brings the two boys together and a sincere friendship develops. With the differences in religious faiths, the boys parents voice disapproval. Determination by Jirjis and Ahmed not to split, and the fate of several exciting episodes including a lost lamb, a blind girl found in a pit, and an encounter with a wolf serve to increase the bond of friendship and respect for each other's way of worship. Further, as a result of one of the episodes, Jirjis and Ahmed receive a sum of money. Instead of spending it on themselves, they elect to have it solve the problem mentioned in the first paragraph of this review. (Peek if you've forgotten.)

As you've read this review, we'd love to have someone, or two, or more of you read the book and then write a line or so on how you feel this book, *The Thirsty Village*, fits into the current picture in that locale of the world or these times. That would be absolutely stupendous and we'll print it in an upcoming *Tidings*. Remember, it's a child's book - SIMPLICITY IS THE KEY.

P.S. It's written in large print and will be in the Adult Library for borrowing.

Even if you're a full time nurse, if you've looked at Debbie Pranaitis' schedule, chances are you'd think twice before taking on being a parish nurse also. On the other hand, if you did check with Debbie, you'd find her heart and soul are there. On the turnstile book rack in the Adult Library there is a book titled *Parish Nursing* by Verna Benner Carson and Harold G. Koenig. It's never been borrowed. It's subtitle reads, *Stories of Service and Care*, and its topics are so varied they appeal to the lay reader and the professional. The value of merging health and body and soul is brought to focus in stories from parishes all over the nation.

Wouldn't it be an amazing gift if someone was inspired to pursue the roll of a parish nurse? Maybe not you, but glance at the book sometime. Skipping some of the detail, you'll find it an eye opener and inspiration. It's in category #3.

Reflections from your Interim Pastor, The Rev. Mark Seifried

"While they were talking and discussing together, Jesus himself drew near ..." Luke 24:14

Alleluia! Christ is risen! I pray that the blessings of His resurrection are as real for you today as they were for those to whom He first appeared in resurrected form.

Easter has always been more significant for those who gather together to discuss the resurrection's magnitude. I say this because the biblical record makes it pretty clear that the resurrected Christ only appeared to two or more people who were remembering and discussing his life, death and resurrection together. This shouldn't surprise us. When Jesus was still alive, he promised that wherever two or more are gathered together in his name, he would be with them.

Recently, we began gathering at the church for Spirit Suppers on the first and third Tuesdays of the month. I believe that this model is close to what the church that Jesus founded looked and felt like: friends and strangers gathered together to discuss life, and to do so through the lens of faith. They most often did so while sharing a meal. While Jesus was alive, they spoke of the work they did together. After his execution, they tried to make sense of it all and to plan their future together so that the ministry would continue, albeit in a different form. (That was the first of thousands of reformations that the Christian church experienced!)

Many people talk about a longing for a religious experience. Christians specifically desire an encounter with Christ. If you are one such person, be mindful that it can happen, but it will only happen when you gather together with other Christians, probably in an informal setting, perhaps while sharing a meal, talking about life, and our relationship to Jesus Christ.

If you are to experience the new life Christ offers, you can only do it together with other Christians. If the church is to experience the resurrection, we might anticipate that it will be a time when we are vulnerable enough to talk about our faith and our doubts together. With humility and faithful companionship, let us pray for our participation in the resurrection. A good place to start might be our informal gatherings at the church where we expect an encounter with each other and with the risen Christ.

Lord, walk this way again so that we may, together, share a personal encounter with You. The church is praying for renewal – in Your name. Amen.

From the Central Association

Greetings from the Central Association. As member churches of the United Church of Christ, we are covenant partners with the national denomination, the Massachusetts Conference, and the Central Association of the UCC. This covenant gifts us with blessings and rights, as well as responsibilities to each body.

There is a need for lay participation at the Association level. Below is a sampling of openings:

The Committee on Ministry - this Committee oversees all issues of clergy ordination, licensing, and fitness in the Association. Like any human group, clergy can develop their own biases about these issues, and input from lay people is absolutely crucial. The term is three years, and the Committee meets monthly on the third Thursday from 9am-3pm. Partial-term slots are available for people who want to try it out before making a longer commitment. It is a big time commitment, but it is also an awesome, committed group of people doing important work. You will learn much about the denomination, the ordination processes, leadership and ministry. You must be a member of an Association church in order to serve.

The Board of Directors – a 2-year commitment, fourth Thursday at 7 pm Sept-Nov and Feb-June. Duties include planning the two Association meetings, nominating, participation in ordinations and other special events, and oversight of other committees.

The Nurture and Fellowship Committee that meets as needed to plan the retired clergy luncheon, the administrative assistant's luncheon, and fellowship events for clergy.

You asked for it!

As requested, here are the recipes from the March 20 church supper, à la Chef Mark. We actually didn't use any recipes, but eyeballed everything, so you may need to play with the recipes a bit to get the desired results. Cooking is an art, not a science! Thanks to all who helped cook, serve, clean up and eat!

Lemon Vinaigrette Salad Dressing

I cup Extra-Virgin Olive Oil I/3 cup lemon juice (fresh is best, but bottled works) I Tablespoon Kosher Salt I teaspoon ground black pepper I teaspoon sweet basil ½ teaspoon dill weed

Mix all ingredients together. Let sit for at least 2 hours if using dried herbs so they can re-hydrate and the flavors infuse the dressing. Drizzle over green salad or toss in the salad. This makes a quick and easy marinade for chicken or fish, too. May be stored in the refrigerator for several weeks.

Roasted Pork Loin with Dijon-Garlic Glaze

A 3 to 5 pound boneless pork loin, fat trimmed to $\frac{1}{2}$ inch or less.

| ¼ cup Dijon mustard | I tsp. Fennel seed |
|--------------------------------------|-------------------------------|
| 2 Tablespoons chopped garlic | 1/2 tsp. Rubbed sage |
| 2 Tablespoons cider vinegar | 1/2 tsp. Cracked black pepper |
| I Tablespoon plus I tsp. Kosher salt | |

Rub the pork with I Tablespoon Kosher salt. Mix all the remaining ingredients together and massage into the loin. Let the meat temper for about an hour before roasting in a 375° oven. Roast uncovered for 2 hours or until internal temperature is 180°. Let rest for 15 minutes. Slice in $\frac{1}{2}$ inch slices and serve hot ... or eat leftovers cold on sandwiches with a slice of red onion, leaf of lettuce and slathering of Dijon mustard.

For the **Smashed Potatoes**, we boiled peeled and pared potatoes in salted water until soft. Mash and stir in milk and margarine or butter at a ratio of about 5 parts milk to one part butter.

For the **<u>Steamed Asparagus</u>**, we plunged trimmed asparagus spears into simmering salted water for about 5 minutes. Remove from water and toss with melted margarine. Sprinkle with toasted sesame seeds before serving.

Blueberry Bread Pudding

6 cups of potato, egg, sourdough, or Italian bread cubed or torn into $1-\frac{1}{2}$ inch pieces.

2 cups blueberries (or other seasonal berries) ... frozen is fine

6 eggs

- l cup sugar
- I-1/2 cups milk
- I cup half and half
- 2 tsp. Vanilla extract
- I tsp. Ground Cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp. Ground nutmeg
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup softened margarine or butter

Preheat oven to 375°. In a large bowl combine cubed bread and berries. In another bowl mix well all ingredients except butter until frothy. Fill a baking pan or individual soufflé cups with bread/berry mixture. Pour egg mixture over the bread and berries. Then dot with butter. If using soufflé dishes, bake in 1 inch hot water bath. Otherwise, bake as is for 35 minutes. This can be prepared a day in advance of service. Top each serving with 2 ounces of Bourbon Crème sauce (recipe follows) or vanilla ice cream.

Bourbon Crème Sauce

2 cups milk (if you want a richer sauce, use some heavy cream)
1/3 cup Bourbon whiskey
2 tablespoon cornstarch
¼ cup granulated sugar

Mix all ingredients together. Heat in a double boiler until sauce thickens. For those who want the alcohol cooked out, omit the double boiler and cook in a saucepan until the mixture simmers for 5 minutes. You'll need to strain it if you use this method as it tends to get lumpy and stick to the pan.

From the Church Historians ...

The following is an excerpt from a ledger that was stored in the Town Hall basement. It outlines step-by-step decisions made by our men in building our meetinghouse and forming our town.

George DuHamel & Paula Lubin Church Historians

1778 Worcester, Ss. To Mr. James Hart Jr. Constable for the Town of Ward

Greeting. In the name of the gover't. & people of the State of Massachusetts Bay, these are to will & require you forthwith to warn or notify the Inhabitants of the S'd Town Qualified as the Law directs to vote in Town affairs to meet & assemble at the meeting house in S'd Town on Wednesday the Twenty Eighth of this Instant October at one of the clock in the afternoon, then & there to Act on the following Articles. Viz.

- 1. To choose a moderator for S'd meeting.
- 2. To see what the Town will do respecting Jacob Fellows whom the Town of Oxford are about to Cast on the Charge of this Town & act any matter respecting that affair as they may then expedient in that case.
- 3. To hear the request of Jim Carter & others respecting building more pews in the Meeting House & act & determine anything on that matter as they may think proper.
- 4. To approve & impower people inbehalf of the Town to take proper title of the meetinghouse & Burying Lotts & act on it as they may think proper.
- 5. To hear the report of the Committee respecting the disposal of Pews.

Hereof fail not & make due return of your doings hereon at or before the hour of meeting.

Given under our hands & seal at Ward this Twenty Second Day of October 1778.

Worcester Ss. Ward October 28, 1778

In obedience to this Warrant I have warned all the Inhabitants of S'd Town that are Qualified to vote in Town affairs to meet at time & place by posting up a copy at the usual place.

James Hart Jr., Constable

The Town of Ward being meet pursuant to the foregoing warning, proceeded.
