So that is why for our first twenty years, we eat, sleep, play and enjoy ourselves. For the next forty years, we slave in the sun to support our family. For the next ten years, we do monkey tricks to entertain the grandchildren. And for the last ten years, we sit on the front porch and bark at everyone.

Life has now been explained to you.

There is no need to thank me for this valuable information. I'm doing it as a public service. If you are looking for me, I will be on the front porch.

Now I do not know about the last ten years being spent on the porch barking. That just seems mean . . . but it did remind me of the changes in our lives. We want the world to stay the same. We often fear change and yet change happens none the less.

The other day Denise saw a group of little *Here We Grow* girls in the courtyard running up the steps to the choir room. As they got to the top of the stairs, they would scream and run down the stairs. I imagine they giggled as well. They seemed to really enjoy their game. When I hear the *Here We Grow* kids, which is not that often, the staff does a good job of teaching respect, politeness, and indoor voices, but when I hear them at outdoor play it sounds as if they are screaming at the top of their lungs the whole time. I wonder how long does that last?

My clergy group meets at a church in Framingham next to an elementary school. At recess those kids all seem to yell and scream the entire recess. How can the kids do that? Doesn't it hurt their throats?

So when does the screaming end? When is it no longer respectable to play the "run around and scream game?" I somewhat doubt I would be able to get a group of 40 to 50 year olds to play the "run and scream game." I think I might have trouble getting 14 year olds to play the "run and scream game." I think parents try to put an end to the scream part of the "run and scream game" pretty early. A little kid screaming can probably shut down most higher brain activity in parents.

But maybe, like the joke says, when you are a grandparent you get to play the "run and scream game" again.

May you find joy in the run and scream game of life and in other simple pleasures.

Becky had great support for her achievements on the piano, as her mom shared a love of music. Also, Becky could confide in her mom's guidance with the concerns of a teenager. With these cherished attitudes Becky enters into a significant deal with God in exchange for her mother's life.

Finally hospitalized, the hospital rules prevent visitors 12 or under. It's then that *The Sunroom* in the Lancaster General Hospital becomes a significant salvation, and miracles begin to happen.

P.S. I did use a few tissues in the beginning, but it's all beautiful in its sincerity.

Throughout the month of March, we had many busy days at *Here We Grow* Preschool. New faces were seen in the classrooms because of Parent Volunteer Month. This has been a tradition at HWG for many years. The children had moms and dads who helped for a day and a few parents that were brave enough to do science experiments. Many of our parents spent time in the classroom reading to the children at the end of sessions. The staff and children say, "THANK YOU."

Neal Primeaux spent two days for class and individual pictures of the children. Thank you to the Board of Christian Ed for allowing us the use of a Sunday school room for the individual pictures to be taken in.

We held our Open House on March 7 with about 50 visitors. Once again comments were made on how well kept the church was and how bright and cheerful the classrooms are. At this time, we have two openings for the young 4's and openings in the a.m. & p.m. 3 year old classes. If you know of anyone looking for a preschool, please send them our way.

Our second, and final fundraiser, was done in March. The families of *Here We Grow* sold or ate many candy bars which then gave us a profit of about \$3,400. This money is used for the field trips taken during the school year.

Other visitors in March included: Amber Dombroski, a past *Here We Grow* student and future veterinarian, came to school and shared her knowledge about animals with our four year olds. The Tooth Fairy made a visit and spoke with all the children about the importance of healthy eating and daily brushing of our teeth.

Looking towards April, *Here We Grow* will be visited by members from the Massachusetts State Police, Auburn Police, and the Amber Alert Team. They will be fingerprinting all 4 year olds. Information will be stored on a flash drive which will be sent home with the children. Thank you to Carole and Dave Sampson's son-in-law, Joe, who was able to get donated flash drives from where he works.

We will be having Easter parties on April 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> with a visit from the Easter bunny. We will be on vacation April 16-20, hopefully enjoying warm, sunny weather.

- Strawberry Shortcake Booth includes setting a time for picking and getting a group of pickers (easy), a group for hulling, lining up biscuit bakers, and getting supplies to serve shortcake. The day of the yard sale you will need to make coffee and prepare whipped cream, and arrange for people to "man" the booth. (As you can imagine, this position could easily be divided among a few people.)
