

SCHOOL PHILOSOPHY

"Here We Grow!" Preschool offers a program that is designed around the preschoolers' total well-being, keeping in mind that each child is an individual. A child's enthusiasm for knowledge and new experiences is never-ending. Our goal is to enable each child to develop a happy and healthy attitude toward themselves, others, and school.

Children will have the opportunity to grow and learn in each area of development which include physical, social, emotional, and intellectual development. Children will learn to develop and generate original ideas through exploration and experimentation with materials. Our school offers a nurturing environment with small class sizes and a qualified, experienced staff of teachers.

We offer a safe place to learn, a place where children can be both independent and be able to function as a member of a group. Experiences will be offered to stimulate growth through a variety of age-appropriate, hands-on activities in the areas of language arts, small and large motor development, science, arts and crafts, music, social studies, and mathematics.

Most important: when your child leaves "Here We Grow!" he/she will leave with a greater sense of self-esteem and confidence, the love of school and learning, and a feeling of being accepted for who they are.

popular translation of the Bible.



Glistening snow will soon be replaced by colorful spring flowers. It's been a year when winter lasted too long, so dust off a lawn chair, find a sheltered spot where the warm sun is brilliant and begin reading that book that you borrowed from the Church Library. Drumming up business? We are! Can you believe that there was a year when 2,910 books from the Adult Library were circulated? Or when the Children's Library loaned 2,250 books in a 9 month period? We had supplementary reading lists related to the curriculum for teachers, had meetings with R.E. occasionally and the Children's Library featured books related to the curriculum.

With a number of additional pluses, this was a banner time. Conversely, without effort, I can count 9 major changes in our lifestyle that have taken place since then, but none eliminates the benefits of reading to a little child. None displaces the value of encouraging children to read.

Soon, on a Sunday morning, you're going to find children's books randomly scattered on the pews. Thumb through any within (or out of) your reach to see the beautiful illustrations and the variety of texts - not all are religious. You're welcome to take home any that interest you. There'll be a sign out sheet on the Adult Library stand and when returning, just put the book in the top drawer of the same stand.

This Weeks Book Review:

Why Do People Pray by Jean H. Richards - ages 6 & 7 - The text asks the question then gives the answer as though the child had thought it out by himself.

<u>Mama, If You Had a Wish by Jeanne Moderitt</u> - ages 1-5 - A picture book that warmly expresses unconditional love that is reassuring at bedtime.

<u>A Calf is Born</u> by Kiyonori Kaizuki - ages 6 & 7 - Richly dramatic oil paintings capture the winter night of a miraculous event and a young calf's first day.

<u>The China Route</u> by John S. Major - ages 8 & 9 - The amazing story of the astounding 7,000 mile trade route, of centuries past, of this precious silk cloth.

Why People are Different Colors by Symeon Shimia - ages 8 & up - Helps to explain the biological characteristics of different races etc. Interesting.

Now I lay the Down to Wonder by Bernice Hogan - ages 3-5 - Prayers that are simple expressions of wonder and delight in everyday things.

<u>Jesus & The Big Picnic and Other Stories</u> *retold by Tim Dowley* - Ages 8-10 - Bible stories with detailed illustrations and references to the location of the stories in the Bible.

April is Cancer Control Month, National Occupational Therapy Month,
Counseling Awareness Month, National Autism Awareness Month, National
Youth Sports Safety Month, Women's Eye Health and Safety Month, National Donate Life Month,
Sports Eye Safety Month, Foot Health Awareness Month, National Facial Protection Month, and
National Child Abuse Prevention Month. April 2nd is YMCA Healthy Kids Day, April 7th is World
Health Day, April 13th is Kick Butts Day- Campaign for Tobacco- Free Kids, April 4-10 is National
Public Health Week, April 17-23 is National Volunteer Week, and April 24-30
is National Infant Immunization Week.

I would like to inform people about MESOTHELIOMA an ASBESTOS related cancer. It is showing up now in former sailors who served their country aboard ships in the World War II, Korean, and Vietnam War eras. It is also found in people that worked as electricians, plumbers, and any other occupation that dealt with asbestos covered pipes. One other occupation that I'm aware of is, those that worked with brake linings. I have web sites and information about getting compensation for this illness. This cancer is in the lining of the lungs and isn't curable. There is new treatment that the FDA has approved to slow the spread of the cancer and give a better quality of life. It is best if the cancer is caught at the onset of symptoms ie: shortness of breath, chest pain and/or persistent cough. These symptoms may be caused by other conditions and only a doctor can make a definite diagnosis!

Wednesday May 11th at 6:30 p.m., I have a speaker coming from Fairlawn Hospital to talk about "Feet First" This relates to diving into pools, water safety, and they will also talk about bike helmets. This is a free program and I hope that we will have a good attendance. Please spread the word. I have invited scout troops and "Here We Grow" families, but everyone is welcome. The program is about 45 min- 1 hour long, so it won't be too late for young school-aged children.



I would like to remind people that I have bath seats, walkers, canes, wheel chairs, and other Durable Medical Equipment (DME) that is for your use. Rev. Knox told me that he thinks the walkers are multiplying in the closet. Please, if you know of anyone that needs to borrow this equipment, call me or the church office. I don't even need to know before you take something. I would just like to know that some of it is being used! Have a Happy, Healthy Month.

We have all been hearing the news regarding Terri Schiavo. This could happen to any one of us or our loved ones. We have Health Care Proxy paperwork at the church and we would be happy to help you with this matter. You can find papers on the health table in Fellowship Hall. If you want to take care of this issue—it can be done any morning Mon– Thurs in the church office. You can bring your witness/es with you or Tammy and Rev. Knox can witness for you. Please don't let your family go through the pain that Terri's family is going through. It isn't necessary and it is painful. Please make your wishes known to your family.

Also if you or anyone you know is a notary public, please let me know. I recently was asked by a parishioner and I don't know of any in the church.
