#### **Library Tidings** by Gloria Whitehead

Are you wishing that you could make Christmas a little more special this year? Perhaps you feel that Christ hasn't been all He should be in your family's Christmas. Would you like to create a new Christmas tradition for those you love? A mixture of children's and adult books, you're certain to be inspired in some way by reading one of this month's suggested books. Ninety-two is the maximum number of pages, and one doesn't even have words!

A Certain Small Shepherd by Rebecca Caudell. An unhappy, mute, little boy in Appalachia bursts with joy when a teacher gives him the part of a shepherd to play in the Christmas Pageant. It's Christmas Eve –Oh, no–there is a terrible blizzard - the program is canceled! Delight turns into despair until Jamie's imaginative and loving nature finds a special use for his seemingly useless crook and shepherd's robe. This is a beautiful story. Once read, it will be remembered by adults and children every Christmas season.

The Spirit of Christmas by Henry van Dyke is a collection of writings that express the true meaning of Christmas. The Christmas Angel opens with the most powerful angel trying to figure out how to deal with evil on earth and the misery that people inflict on each other. It takes the lowest angel to reveal the news of a miracle that's about to happen. There's also a short sermon on Keeping Christmas, two Christmas Prayers – one for the home and the second for lonely folks, and a little essay entitled Christmas Giving and Christmas Living.

### Quintillius-the Star that Shone by William B. Thielking

Pastor Thielking was walking home with his daughter one evening. The sky was an unusual blue and the star was brilliant. Holly asked, "Stars can't really talk, can they, Daddy?" "Well, I suppose that depends on what you mean," he answered, while thinking of the psalmists' words, "The heavens declare the Glory of God." As thoughts expanded and days passed, the Pastor found that he had the answer to a Christmas Eve service that would be meaningful and a little different.

### The Boy of the Bells by Carly Simon

A young boy named Ben lived in a small village in the far north with his grandfather and his sister, Miranda, who hadn't been able to speak for a year. No one could explain why not. On Christmas Eve grandfather asks Ben to climb the tower to ring the bell each hour as the villagers slumber in the sleepy town. Suddenly, Ben wonders, if he rang twelve o'clock at eleven, he might be able to talk with Santa and he might be able to help Miranda. You'll discover the answer as you turn through beautifully illustrated pages.

### What Did You Lose, Santa? by Berthe Amoss

NO WORDS–just characters–little, whimsical Mr. and Mrs. Claus, and they're in a dither. Pick up the book to find out what they're about.

### On That Night by Elizabeth Yates

It's a Christmas Eve Candlelight service almost like First Congregational Church in Auburn. Most find it a night of hope, but for a little girl, a thief, a harried woman, a widow, and a blind man—this night is one that fulfills one of the legends of Christmas Eve that on that night lost things are found again.

### Christmas Is for Giving by Bettina Peterson

Upon hearing about Francis of Assisi and the first Christmas crib, eight year old Toby decides to make one for his parents. He and Pam, his younger sister, after much struggling, finish the crib and put it under the Christmas tree where, to his total surprise, Toby finds something that he thought was impossible.

### FROM THE CHURCH HISTORIANS

Taken from the Dedication of Chancel and Chancel Furnishings, Sunday, October 2, 1949.

### "Symbols"

Ever since Christianity began with the Life, Death, and Resurrection of our Lord, Christian worshippers have embodied in the worship fitting symbols of these great events related to our Lord. In past renovations of our church, we have followed the practice of the earliest Christians in adopting some of these symbols, not as a form, nor for adoration, but as aids to the worship of God and his Son, Jesus Christ. It is our attempt to acquaint our congregation with the religious meaning and symbolism of our current chancel and its furnishings.

Part II - The Chancel

In the earliest Christian times, even in the catacombs, the Christians placed their altar, our communion table, in the East and faced the East in their worship, because the life, the death and the resurrection of our Lord took place in the East. The East symbolizes the dawn of the eternal Light into the world.

Facing East, the worshipper had on his right the South, the enlightened world of the Mediterranean, where laid the Christian churches, and from which came the great heritage of the Church, the Holy Scriptures. The south side was, therefore, called the Epistle side, where is placed the lectern from which the Scriptures are read. On the left of the worshipper lay the North or the heathen world of Europe, to which the Christian Church was commanded to preach the Gospel of Christ.

Since the Scriptures are the "Word of God," the minister stands within the chancel for reading. But since the sermon expresses the words or ideas of man in expounding the Gospel, the pulpit is extended beyond the chancel and the minister stands outside the rail.

The choir stalls are in the chancel because the choir are ministers of music. They are placed parallel to the center aisle, rather than facing the congregation because theirs is to inspire and encourage the Christian pilgrim on his way to God, and not to entertain an audience. They lead us up to God in worship.
