Incarnate Love

Reflections from your Interim Pastor, Rev. Mark Seifried For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. His authority shall grow continuously.

The people have spoken and Advent at the church will resound with carols and the rich traditions to which this community has been accustomed for many years. I have prayed a lot to the Mighty Counselor about this issue. I've pleaded my case for recognizing the solemn nature of Advent to those who were open to meeting with me. And the final word has ruled: LOVE. I've relented out of love.

I love this congregation. I love God. I love my vocation and ministry with you. I love the Prince of Peace who I pray will be re-born in all of us every day. Love dominated my motivation to want the congregation to go through the spiritual practices of Advent, too.

I've never combined Advent and Christmas, so this will be a learning experience for me. I will pray and try to be faithful to the congregation and to the Lord, who called me to ministry. We will blend the themes of Advent with the music of Christmas. If you have any helpful ideas, I am open to suggestions.

One of the things I have learned in intentional interim ministry is that I can raise up issues which I see as concerns, but they have to be shared. There has to be "buy in" before any significant change can take root. I also know that I may not always be right. What's right for you may not be right for any other congregation. The best traditions of the church are those which are organic and rooted in local customs.

I question the things you hold dearly for their rationale. That's the crux of the interim time: examining the heart of who you are as people of God and who God is to you. When I began my ministry with you, I asked most groups I met with if there were any traditions that were immovable or immutable. Very few people responded in the affirmative, so I didn't think I would step on any "landmines." I have encountered several. Your Advent -Christmas traditions top the list as most fiery.

So I take that as a gift from you - just to lift up the fact that Advent -Christmas tradition is so dear that some are willing to fight and some are willing to articulate why it's important. The most precious gift has been to hear you witness to your faith. I hope that witnessing and testimony are expanding paths toward which God is calling the church.

As the Advent and Christmas seasons unfold, I pray that the long -expected Jesus will guide us through all that lies ahead and that His authority shall grow continuously in our lives - individually and corporately. I also pray that God's Incarnate Love prevails in our common life and in our individual families.

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The Story of a Snowflake Each One Is Born in Heaven*

Snowflakes are a lot like people; no two are exactly alike. When conditions are right, the snowflakes journey through varying levels of moisture and temperature result in the fantastically intricate structures that so captivate us. Like snowflakes, each one of us is born in heaven, descends to earth, and becomes ever more complex and multi-faceted — ever more *unique* - along the way.

Just as the snowflake's rough and tumble journey up and down through the winter sky dictates the shape it will ultimately take when it finally falls to earth, so the ups and downs each one of us experiences in life determines the character that we, too, will end up with.

Like snowflakes, each of us has many facets, inner aspects of our character. Our life experiences, and how we face them, determines how our characters grow and change. Reverend Isaac Bayley's Acceptance Letter (In 1784, Rev. Isaac Bayley became the church's first pastor.)

To the Church of Christ in Ward and the Inhabitants of S.P. Town



Dearly Beloved, the invitation to which you have given to take the oversight of you in the Lord. I have taken into serious consideration and what answer I should make, whether to accept insufficiency of the important undertaking I have been most ready to answer in the negative, but when I consider your destitute state and condition. The unhappy consequences which appear likely to follow upon your remaining so the earnest desires on many of you that I should tarry, Me think I hear God call to me by you to answer in the affirmative and to say so to Him who I trust has called me to preach the good news of the salvation by His only begotten son. I dare not therefore, I now trusting as I hope to Him who is the great head in influence for assistance accept of your invitation to settle with you in the ministry and now my brethren and friends, I get your prayers to God for me that I may so preach and to conduct as that I may not after I preached to others be myself a castaway, pray Him who walketh amist this golden candlesticks, holding the stars in his right hand that he would hold me and communicate Lights unto one so that I might Shine as a brilliant star in this golden candlestick, pray that I may hold fast the form of sound, words of faith and love that I may an example of the believers in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit and in purity that I may give attendance to read and exhortation to Doctrine and that in such manner as that my profiting may appear to all, pray for one another, pray that we may all so live in Love and Peace as that we may know by happy experience how good it is and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in Unity. I hope I shall not cease to cry to Him who performeth all things for us that he would grant us all grace so to Live as that we may live the Doctrine of God, our savior in all things whilst here on Earth and when time with us all shall be no longer, receive us to Him Self in Glory.

Christmas books from both the Adult and Children's Libraries are in abundance and will fill every "taste" (yes - some recipes) disposition and yearning of the season. Many of the books will be displayed on the table in Fellowship Hall. First time borrowing? Adults - sign card in back of book and leave it in small box on table. Children - sign name, date and book number (found on face page inside, upper right corner. Library deadline for borrowing - end of January. Please return adult books to the upper drawer in the Adult Library stand. Children's books may be returned to their library stand and shelf after crossing out name, etc. Need help? First Christmas - The True and Unfamiliar Story In Words and Pictures by Paul L. Maier

Little is known about the birth of Jesus Christ beyond the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. However, many important aspects came to have bearing through geography, astrology, archeology, history and astronomy as they focus further on the Nativity. So why read a book that was copyright in 1971 - 38 years ago? This is a documentary, not a legend, which explores less known features and facts of those times and, again, before the transformation of today. This outstanding religious author has included a group of interesting photos of the cities of Jerusalem, Bethlehem and Galilee (remember - 1971 - they all looked so peaceful). The "An Incredible Star" chapter devotes 6½ pages to the astronomy of the first Christmas. In hopes of creating an interest in your borrowing this book, the 12 chapters cover the following:

"The Politics: A Caesar's Census"	"The Land: Palestine the Paradox"
"The Courtship: A Galilean Couple"	"The Time: An Undatable Date"
"The Place: A Bethlehem Grotto"	"The Guests: Local Shepherds, Distant Magi"
"The Astronomy: An Incredible Star"	"The Monster: Herod the King"
" The Journeys: Up to Jerusalem, Down to Egypt"	"The Foster Father: Joseph the Carpenter"
"The Mother: Mary the Virgin"	"The Child: Jesus of Nazareth"

Tempted, but not convinced? Read pages 114-115 for some fantasy. Technical? A bit, but an enjoyable, easy read, that's only 125 pages.

This might be an unusual occasion when you'd like to look at the back few pages of *The Christmas Barn* first. It's there that you'll meet the family of Roxie Dockery who would buy only things they couldn't grow themselves. Depression days didn't escape Appalachia and the town of Murphy in North Carolina - year 1931. It's 20 miles to the Post Office so mail is usually picked up only once a week. It's evident that TV's weren't available at the writing of *The Christmas Barn*, but its authenticity is affirmed as its author, C.L. Davis, is the son of Roxie Dockery. All story characters are "real" and within the book you'll find pictures (taken by tourists) of Grandpa and Grandma and their 6 children, a 7th later. Though selected mostly for children in their teens, this book can be enjoyed by all ages. There's a simply beautiful survival message brought to light when a terrible accident harms Roxie's family and destroys their home just before Christmas. The print is next to large. The message - it's what you make of what you have that counts the most.

The Christmas Barn was given by Judy Dufault who has made extensive gifts for years to the Children's Library in honor of her grandchildren.

Prequel to the Pageant

In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God and the Word was God ... and the Word became flesh and dwelt among us ... (John 1:1, 14a)

Prequel. Two movies this year, X-Men Origins: Wolverine and Star Trek, share that literary genre. Even Arthur Conan Doyle's Hound of the Baskervilles is a late-written prequel to explain to his Sherlock Holmes fans how that violinplaying intellectual became a detective. People love prequels! Prequels explain how already beloved characters came to be who they are. Like the first chapter of John!

When the Gospel of John was written, Jesus' Bethlehem birth was well known through Matthew and Luke's versions. John didn't repeat those stories ... John wrote a *prequel* about the amazing mysterious Word speaking the intimacies of creation, sending a love letter to humanity through Israel's history, and then becoming flesh to live among us. Of course, there would have been no prequel without Jesus' teachings and healings, sacrificial death and glorious resurrection. Prequels always explain the "before" once the "after" has made a difference.

Someday our story will be told as a *prequel*. People will write, film or sing the church of our current generation because its faithfulness explains the Good News church they know. What happens in our communities – what we say and how we give, our care for one another, uncompromising advocacy in justice issues, and mission among the mangers of the world – is more significant than we can guess! Our budgets will be recognized as blessings and the year-in year-out worship, a whispering of God's Word. So, "beam us up, angels," it's time to live the story whose sequel is always light shining in the darkness.
