## When Christmas is not Christmas

It is barely a week before Thanksgiving, and already the "seasonal" aisles at the local drugstore are filled with Christmas candy, cards, stuffed animals and Santas. The "seasonal" aisle is a ubiquitous place, aptly named, in which the wares du jour are hawked. The merchandise on parade moves relentlessly, without interruption, from Halloween to Christmas to Valentine's Day, to Mothers' Day to... etc. As they say, it is "seasonal."

We love to give gifts at Christmas, and we like to receive them. But we of the Church must confess, first of all, that culture Christmas and the Church's Christmas are not the same. The dates are not even the same. Culture Christmas, or Commercial Christmas, we might call it, ends on December 24 when the last lights go down at the shopping mall and the cash registers clang closed for the final time. Just when culture Christmas finishes, Christmas in the Church begins, and we have the next 12 days to celebrate the Real McCoy.

During the time when culture Christmas roars on with its relentless jangle, we have another and different spiritual time to celebrate: The Season of Advent - a time of quiet, not noise; a time of reflection, not frenzy; a time to remember, not forget where we put the shopping list; a time to savor the sweet anticipation, not curse the endless tasks demanding to be done.

For some, perhaps for too many, Advent is a time of sorrow, not joy. The remembering brings sadness and the anticipation is dread, not hope. Looking forward means seeing a bleak and empty darkness instead of the abundant promise of God.

I remember an old man on a cane who used to negotiate the stairs slowly in a church I once served as he came up from the A.A. meeting in the lower hall. I would ask, "How are you?" "Splendid," he would say, and then he would add, "If I can open my eyes in the morning, it is a wonderful day; if I can't, then I have nothing more to worry about..." He was not a member of the church. I never knew his name. But I sensed that he had fought the battle of faith more often than many of us, and had won the battle more often than most.

I pray an Advent season of peace and promise for each and all. The foundation of that Promise is the Incarnate Christ, both a mystery and a gift beyond compare.



If you weren't able to pick up one of the giving cards, this is the information that we added to the backside of each card. Drop off deadline for items is December 5th

The Goddard Elementary School informational website page states: "The Goddard School of Science and Technology is a large urban school situated in the Main South section of Worcester....Our demographic data tells us that 98% of our families are living below the poverty line. Eighty one percent of our families are minority. Of the 656 students who attend Goddard 530 are second language learners. Many of our families have never had schooling due to the conditions of their homelands. They seek not only refuge from a life of strife but also one of America's greatest promises, free public education for all."

The gift(s) you have chosen to purchase aren't the kind of Christmas present that's familiar to us; however, even though our gifts aren't jackets this year we, the Outreach Committee, ask that you please understand how your gift will bring comfort and balance when needed. The decision for these requests comes from a school representative that cares very much for these young children.

Results are in from the 'Walk for Hunger' to support Auburn Youth & Family Services and their heavily used food bank. The First Congregational Church brought in a total of \$625.50 and the combined total of all churches was \$5,060.31.
