Christmas Fund 2011

The generous gifts of UCC congregations and individuals to the Christmas Fund enabled the Pension Boards' Ministerial Assistance program to provide some form of ministerial assistance to approximately 1,600 persons over the past year.

- Christmas "Thank You" gift checks were sent to approximately 900 persons in 2010. Of those who received checks, 20 are over 100 years of age. The 900 gifts totaled \$270,000.



- Monthly pension supplementation is being provided to 434 persons. These gifts total \$103,401 per month. A significant part of the annual total of \$1,234,344 comes from the Christmas Fund.
- Quarterly health premium supplementation is being provided to 267 families, totaling \$160,608 per quarter. All of the funding for health premium supplementation is derived from the Christmas Fund.
- Emergency grants totaling \$38,163.35 were provided to 24 individuals and families from January 1 through July 31, 2011.

Your gifts are needed more than ever to help the growing number of retirees whose low income annuities make it difficult to meet increased living costs. You'll find an offering envelope enclosed in this month's *Tidings*. Please return it to the church, and thank you for your generosity.

The Patch is closed for another year.....Our profits for 2011 were \$5,681.35.

Here is a summary of each of our responsibilities for the fundraiser:

Pumpkin Patch:

- Owns over 1200 acres of land in New Mexico
 - Plants, cultivates and harvests over 1200 acres of pumpkins annually (over 40 million pounds)
 - Has people load hundreds of trucks
 - Deliver pumpkins (at no cost to us) driving over 1.6 million miles during a 30 day period
 - Mark and price our stock
 - Give us (free) stickers, stories, cookbook, coloring pages, stencils, publicity info, videos, etc. to aid us in making a more successful fundraiser
 - Man phones 7 days a week so that we can report our daily sales and talk about any concerns or ideas we may have
 - Use an honor system for over 120 churches to report sales in 48 states

Our Church:

- Request the day and time we like our delivery
 - Unload (fun time for all who form a human assembly line to get the pumpkins, gourds, wee bees, minis, etc. off of the truck and onto pallets and displays)
 - Sit in the beautiful patch and sell
 - Send check for % of profits to Pumpkin Patch

We thank everyone who took part in making this year such a success.

A special thank you to Denise and Judy for all of the extra help, time and encouragement they have given.

We look forward to next year, imagine the number of pumpkins, gourds, etc. we will be unloading (a full truck?)!

We are hoping to have a planning meeting in the spring for ideas, suggestions and so forth to make 2012 even greater in the Patch.

The Normal Way



As we prepare for Christmas with our Advent activities, I hope you are enjoying a time to prepare for the gift given to us at Christmas. I know this time can be hectic, stressful and over scheduled. There are in-laws to visit. Where will we have Christmas? A question which gets even more complex when a divorce enters into the mix. Is it Mom or Dad's turn to have the kids for Christmas?

It is common to say, "Calm down, take it easy." But is that just adding more stress? Not only are you stressed from all the pageants, school activities and family gatherings, but you should also be stressed out that you aren't simplifying your Christmas. So to a busy schedule you have to add "simple" activities like making a snowman, drinking hot chocolate, reading the Christmas story out loud to the family. It can all be too much.

I fear our Christmas trouble is related to a larger trouble in society. I call it "The Perfect Expectation." I see this most often in weddings. Especially in the *Bridezilla* show. Everything has to be perfect. It is the Bride's (or Groom's, or Mother of the Bride's) perfect day. If anything goes wrong, the whole thing is ruined.

There are two problems with that idea. In reality, there is nothing perfect that involves humans. Humans make mistakes. So an insistence on perfection is sure to be disappointing. It is good to try to reach for perfection, but to expect perfection is to be disappointed. Second, a wedding is not that important. *The Marriage* is what is important. The wedding is only the start of the marriage.

Let us compare two marriages of the last year. The Royal Wedding had several errors. The Maid of Honor, I am told, stole the Bride's thunder. Pippa looked better in her dress than Kate. The Groom's family disrespected the Bride's guests by making them go to a less fancy reception than the one the Royal Family hosted, which was considered a huge etiquette breach in America, and a sign of why Americans rejected Royalty and Nobles. But Prince William and Duchess Kate are still married, and every week as I am in the grocery store some magazine assures me that Kate is pregnant.

Now compare the Royal Wedding to the Kardashian Wedding. The same magazines that say Kate is pregnant tell me Kim Kardashian was the perfect bride and had a perfect wedding. So perfect that she made an 8-10 million dollar profit on the event. Unfortunately, Kim filed for divorce after 72 days of wedded life. Now she is called (in the grocery store magazines) a fraud, a money grubber, a fool. Kim is a joke. Her wedding is a joke. People are ridiculing her "perfect" wedding. So, which would you want, the perfect wedding and a failed marriage or a flawed wedding, but a marriage that endures? (so far, as of this writing)

So with Christmas, what is the larger goal? We are honoring our God. We are building family. As you go through December, keep what is important in mind. Do not try to have a perfect Christmas, there is no such thing. (Think of all that went wrong at the first Christmas: having to travel while pregnant to a weird small town, finding no room in the inn. Shepherds and angels disturbing the baby's sleep. Herod wanting to kill the baby. All this is no one's idea of perfect.) Rather than try for a perfect Christmas, maybe set your sights on a memorable one.

Out of all my Christmas trees, the one I most remember is the cat spruce. A cat spruce smells like a used litter box. You do not catch the bad smell until after the tree warms up for a day or two. From that cat spruce, came the tradition of putting up the tree a day or two before we decorate it.

Remember this Advent to love your family, perfect or not.

Adult Selections:

The Golden Ring by John Snyder... An extraordinary remembrance based on truth and shared with the author by his grandmother. On her 9th birthday her parents gave her a beautiful golden ring. It turned out to be a harbinger of outstanding events and discoveries that changed family feelings forever about Christmas.

Christmas Miracles by Brad Steiger and Sherry Hansen Steiger. . . The story of the first Christmas, as told by the Gospels of Matthew and Luke, is based on 5 miracles of faith and love that have been held sacred for over 2000 years and are listed. The book is filled with <u>short</u> stories of larger than life miracles that make Christmas come alive.

The Christmas Barn by C.S. Lewis . . . In 1939 when a snowstorm destroys their home in the Appalachian Mountains, 12 year old Roxie and her family move into a barn and make preparations for a very unusual Christmas celebration. As you read you'll feel you are there with them in the mountains.

For Children:

Dear Santa—please don't come this year - in memory of Michael Clark . . . Who believes in Santa Claus? Even Santa himself has doubts until children open his eyes to the real magic of Christmas. A beautifully illustrated, and told, story that everyone can enjoy.

The Most Important Christmas by James Nelesen . . . Simple, but appealing illustrations that fit the story so well. Emily Morgan's Christmas would be the best in her life if she could be Mary in the Christmas play at school. Such disappointment, when she learns that she's not going to be the star. But, somehow it works out okay when she learns one of the best lessons of what Christmas is all about.

The First Christmas Tree by Hertha Tauli . . . A legend about decorating a Christmas tree when a ragged, little stranger finds shelter with a Black Forest forester's children on Christmas Eve. In gratitude, he tells them a story about a little spruce tree that was showered with stars that brought joy to the Christ Child in Bethlehem. Next morning he was gone, but beside their front door was a little spruce along with stars and bells and a voice telling who their guest had been. The next Christmas the family lights the candles on their first Christmas tree in remembrance of the Christ Child and the little tree of Bethlehem.

May the Christmas message fill your heart with love, joy and peace.

In 2009 First Congregational Church in Auburn assisted in sponsoring, through a Sibley Fund Grant, the start-up funding for Dismas Family Farm, in Oakham, MA. This is a working farm producing crops, animals, and finished wood products, as well as jams, granola and candles. Their year round housing lodges former prisoners that are expected to either work the farm or be employed full-time as they reintegrate back into society. If anyone is interested in supporting this program, Dismas Family Farm has for sale cage-free eggs, available at Isador's Deli in Oxford and soon artichoke coop. Or, another way to support this group is through direct donations such as: Sponsoring one House Dinner \$40; YMCA membership for one Almost Home resident just out of jail \$20; Work boots for a resident starting a new job \$50; New sheets for a resident just out of jail \$30; Bus pass for one resident starting a new job across the City \$40; One month newspaper subscription for an entire Almost Home class of 12 residents \$225.
