Christmas Fund 2012

The generous gifts of UCC congregations and individuals to the Christmas Fund enabled the Pension Boards' Ministerial Assistance program to provide some form of ministerial assistance to approximately 1,600 persons over the past year.

- Christmas "Thank You" gift checks were sent to approximately 900 persons in 2011. Of those who received checks, 20 are over 100 years of age. The oldest person is 107. The 900 gifts totaled \$270,000.



- Monthly pension supplementation is being provided to 373 persons. These gifts total \$102,899 per month. A significant part of the annual total of \$1,255,885 comes from the Christmas Fund.
- Quarterly health premium supplementation is being provided to 250 families, totaling \$146,840 per quarter. All of the funding for health premium supplementation is derived from the Christmas Fund.
- Emergency grants totaling \$27,177 were provided to 22 individuals and families from January 1st through June 30, 2012.

Your gifts are needed more than ever to help the growing number of retirees whose low income annuities make it difficult to meet increased living costs. You'll find an offering envelope enclosed in this month's *Tidings*. Please return it to the church, and **thank you** for your generosity.

The "Pumpkin Patch" is closed for 2012. It was a very successful year (\$8,000) and we hope, fun for all who took part. As you may have heard, our percentage earned for the Church exceeds all past years!

It takes many, many people to get through the season, and we look forward to next year (don't we???).

We are hoping to meet next September to work on any ideas, suggestions, and planning to make 2013 even more successful than 2012.

Saint Nicholas



Now I am told that Santa Claus gets his name from Saint Nicholas, so I want to tell some stories I heard about Saint Nicholas. He was born to a rich family in Turkey. As a boy, his mother and father died. While still a young man, he heard of a father who thought he was too poor to put on a wedding for his daughters. The father's plan was to sell all three girls into slavery. Weddings are expensive, so rather than worry about a wedding for any of them, he would just get rid of all of his daughters.

Nicholas heard of the plan, and since in those days there were no social workers or foster parents, all Nicholas could do was give the girls money and hope that was enough to get them married and away from their evil father.

That night Nicholas crept up to the house. Now it was normal at the end of the day to hang your stockings by the fire to dry. Nicholas tossed the bag of money up into the chimney and it fell to the fireplace and landed in the oldest girl's sock. So that girl got her money for her wedding. Likewise when the day came that the middle girl was ready for her wedding, Nicholas threw money up into the chimney and it landed in that girl's stocking, and she used that money to plan her wedding.

Well, the father was upset that all this money was coming into his house to pay for weddings and he was getting none of it. So he let it be known that he was ready to sell his youngest daughter into slavery. So when Nicholas came to the house to throw the last bag of marriage money into the house, the father was hiding. As Nicholas made his pitch into the chimney, the father leapt out and tackled him.

Saint Nicholas made the father promise to keep this story secret (which obviously the father did not do because I heard the story and am now telling it to you). So that is how Nicholas became the patron saint of young women (girls) who aren't married yet, but want to be married.

Later, when Nicholas was named bishop (which is like being the head pastor of a city) he became patron saint of boys, and all children, when he healed three boys who had been attacked by an evil butcher. So he became the patron saint of boys as well as girls. So now he is the patron saint of all children.

Then the story goes that some sailors were on the sea when a storm brewed up and threatened to sink their boat. The sailors needed to get to a port where they would be protected from the storm. At that moment a man appeared on deck and told the sailors how to get to the nearest port. When the sailors got to port they wanted to go to church and thank God for their safety. When they got to church, there, in front preaching, was the very man who had appeared on the deck of the ship... Saint Nicholas. So Nicholas is the protector of sailors as well.

He's a busy man, and now I hear he travels around the world helping bring happiness to good boys and girls. We have saints, not to worship, for we should only worship God. Saints set an example. We are to be like Saint Nick and help boys and girls who need help.

From the Stewardship Committee:



With plans well on the way for the next winter holiday, the children have gone from Thanksgiving songs to singing songs for our winter holiday programs. I am writing to introduce you to Worcester Fellowship, an outdoor church reaching homeless and at-risk adults. We meet on Worcester Common each Sunday at 1pm, serving lunch and providing worship outdoors every Sunday.

Our outreach is aimed at being in ministry with people traditionally classified as "chronically homeless"; while they are often in housing they move into and out of homelessness regularly. Our existing support systems do little to get at the self-judgment and unworthiness many in this population feel. The lack of hope and lack of confidence that they deserve a better life work to keep these individuals in the cycle of poverty.

Worcester Fellowship is committed to ending isolation by providing spiritual care and by nurturing community. Using worship, bible study, leadership meetings, worship planning meetings, book groups and more, we help to create a sense of a community of support. By preaching a non-judging message of God's love for all of God's children we share the good news of the gospel.

We are hoping that your congregation would like to be involved at Worcester Fellowship and these are some of the ways you can help.

- provide 80 lunches (see our calendar on our web site for available dates)
- visit with your choir or youth group or mission team. Bring your voices, socks or bring nothing (but do let us know the date you'd like to come in advance see our calendar on our web site)
- sponsor one of our programs: host a social event or mission activity at your church and invite us to take part with you in fellowship

Sponsor one of our programs financially:

Book group on Mondays - 2 hours at \$25 per hour = \$50 per week x 52 weeks = \$2600 per year or \$217 per month Books for book group - \$100 per month Mediation group - 2 hours x \$25 per hour x 12 weeks = \$600 Leadership meetings - 3 hours x \$25 hourly x 12 months = \$900 Leadership food for meetings is \$70 per month x 12 months = \$840 per year Bible study is 2 hours x \$25 per hour = \$50 per week x 52 weeks = \$2600 per year or \$217 per month Worship is 3 hours x \$25per hour = \$50 per week x 52 weeks = \$2600 per year or \$217 per month Worship is 3 hours x \$25per hour = \$75 per week = \$3900 per year or \$325 per month (twice that to have two paid ministers = \$7,800 per year or \$650 monthly) Funerals, weddings, hospital visits, 3 hours x \$25 per hour = per month \$75 or \$900 per year Visits to indoor churches, sermon preparation, 26 per year, 5 hours each x \$25 hourly = \$3250 per year or \$270 per month

Leadership retreats - 8 hours x \$25 per hour = \$200 each x 4 (quarterly) = \$800 per year Leadership retreat food - \$150 each month x4 (quarterly) = \$600 per year Visiting social service agencies - 6 hours per month x \$25 hourly = \$1800 per year or \$150 monthly

Worcester Fellowship is the place to tell your story in full; even it takes weeks or months to find the trust and courage to share. Worcester Fellowship is a church family. Thank you for your consideration to support our ministry for the homeless and at-risk of Worcester.

Your thoughtfulness and generosity has meant so much to me. I feel truly blessed. Visitors are always welcome ...and... my supply of "K" cups is an open invitation to join me for coffee!


