On behalf of the residents, staff and board of Dismas House of Massachusetts, I would like to express our deepest gratitude for your recent donation of \$7,000 to help launch the new Dismas Family Farm, and I would like to thank you for taking the time to visit our new program in Oakham.

At Dismas, we strive to provide lasting opportunities for employment, housing and community to promote healthy reintegration at Dismas House on Richards Street and at the Father John Brooks House, a permanent, supportive housing program for Dismas graduates and their families. By Another Road Reflections from your Interim Pastor, Rev. Mark Seifried

And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road. – excerpted from Matthew 2:1-12

During Epiphany, the season in the church that begins twelve days after Christmas and extends to Lent, we are reminded of the Magi who were prompted to follow a star to a distant land to witness the extraordinary birth of Christ. There is much we miss from this story if we listen only to tradition. First is that the magi were not three kings as our carols and traditions claim, but rather scholars versed in medicine, philosophy, astronomy, astrology, divination, and magic. They spent their lives studying and passing information along to others. These sophisticated men would have been like MIT scholars visiting Pigeon Forge, Tennessee. They would have seemed out of place in the hick town of Bethlehem.

In his poem "Journey of the Magi," T. S. Eliot powerfully renders one of the magi's ponderings many years after the journey to Bethlehem. He remembers the frigid cold, obstinate camels, hostile cities, dirty villages with high prices, and finally finding the place not a moment too soon. The question still resonating in his mind is:

> [W]ere we led all that way for Birth or Death? At the thought, he comments: There was a Birth certainly...[but] this Birth was Hard and bitter agony for us, like Death, our death. We returned to our places ... But no longer at ease here, in the old dispensation, With an alien people clutching their gods. ...I should be glad of another death.

He was no longer at ease in the world. The journey to Bethlehem, both interior and exterior, changes everything-- alters his world view and his belief system so profoundly that this "man of the world" feels like an alien in his own home. Still, the grace-filled transformation leads him to say he would be glad of another such "death."

So it goes in the life of Christ. As Dr. Pat Saxon says, "When we go traveling with God, we are asked to shed the cumbersome baggage we have accumulated, shed false selves and old attachments to get closer and closer to the Divine Essence within. This letting go often feels like a death of sorts until the new identity, the new creation in Christ is more firmly established." Indeed, as Christians, if we are truly at home in Christ, we perceive a world filled with false gods – a world we find contemptible at times . . . although, sadly, we must embrace some of its absurd dispensation if we are to survive.

Even as we yearn for new life in our world, in our community and in our church, let us embrace the death of our false selves and old attachments, in the arms of our God . . . losing our life to find it! With the help of God ALL THINGS are possible. New life is even probable when we are willing to embrace that sort of death.

With February easily recognized as his birthday, I thought it might be interesting for some of you to know about *Lincoln's Mothers*. It's a story of Nancy and Sally Lincoln. Don't flinch. You know how influential mothers can be. As a matter of fact, "All that I am," said Lincoln, "I owe to my angel mother." "Which mother?" he was once asked. "Both," he replied.

Apparently <u>Tom</u> Lincoln had made a very appropriate choice in his first wife, Nancy Hanks. Their lifestyle necessitated moving from state or farm to farm with difficulty. It was a very hard life, but they seemed happily bonded. Tom and Nancy had fallen in love at a tender age and had three children: Sarah (Sally) Bush, named after a close family friend, Abraham, and Thomas, who did not survive infancy. Each night Nancy would read the Bible and encourage Abraham to learn, recognizing that his potential exceeded farming. However, life was such a strain on Nancy that she died when Abe was 9.

Sally Bush and Tom Lincoln were married a year later and, in contrast, Sally was unable to read or write. However, she so encouraged her stepson to his full potential that he continued to achieve right up to be President.

Filled with inspiration, dedication, and love, this is an inspiring story.
