

Church member, Pearl B. Morrill, who died in 2012 at age 106, left us a wonderful gift. For those of you who did not know her, Pearl was a very independent woman who lived alone until she was 103. She had been deaf from the age of 20 but did not consider it a handicap, and would tell Pastor Brian he should be visiting the elderly, not her. Pearl was an avid doll collector, and received the Boston Post Cane in 2007 from the Town of Auburn, honoring the oldest living person in town. Through her generosity she has bequeathed \$20,000 outright to the church, and after numerous bequests to other churches and charities, she left the remainder of her estate as a testamentary trust to benefit "The Elderly of the First Congregational Church in Auburn." At this time we have been informed the residual of her estate will be around \$500,000. We have received an initial distribution of \$375,000 for the trust; a final distribution will be made when the estate is finalized. The executor of her estate continues to identify additional assets which will be part of the trust.

Her original will appointed the current minister of our church as sole trustee for administering and disbursing the trust. Since any minister could not, and should not, be assigned this responsibility in addition to the full time responsibilities as minister, we have been working for over a year to set up an alternative trust that would also address numerous other concerns we had. In order to do this we had to hire an attorney to deal with the Attorney General's office, the Probate Court, as well as the executor who wrote her will. Atty. Laurie Raphaelson has done an excellent job representing our interests to get a trust document approved by the Probate Court that we feel we can work with instead of the initial terms of the will.

A process has been established by the trust document to review and disposition requests for the use of the Pearl B. Morrill Trust funds. There is a form to request and justify expenditures that can be initiated by individuals or committees of the church. The expenditure must benefit "The Elderly of the First Congregational Church in Auburn," which can be an individual or elderly members as a group. The form is approved or disapproved by the Trustees of the Pearl B. Morrill Trust who are the Minister and the Deacons. Pastor Brian is also authorized to approve emergency expenditures up to \$500. The form will be available in the church office, or you can contact the Minister or a Deacon to help with the process.

The Prudential Committee of the Church has been authorized to invest the funds to help assure a continuation of her trust in the future.

It was Pearl's desire to assist the elderly of our church when they need any help. We now have the resources and procedures in place to do this in her memory.



Sadly, this is the last Library *Tidings* submission we received from Gloria Whitehead before she went on to receive her eternal reward on December 28th. She leaves a void in the lives of us who were blessed to have known her. Her cheerful countenance will be dearly missed. In tribute to Gloria . . . read a book (preferably one obtained from the church library) and may Gloria's love of books and day-brightening demeanor be contagious.

Gloria (Stephan) Whitehead, a well-loved resident of the Overlook Community of Charlton and former longtime Auburn resident, died suddenly on Sun., December 28, 2014 in Harrington Hospital, Southbridge.

She was predeceased by her beloved husband, Richard D. Whitehead, in 1998. Gloria leaves her daughters, Linda Whitehead and her husband, Gary Quitslund, and Constance (Connie) Whitehead Hanks and her husband, Ronald Hanks, along with three granddaughters, Emily L. Hanks, Kelsea A. Hanks, and Signe L. Quitslund. She also leaves many cousins, friends and loved-ones.

Gloria was born in Worcester, MA. She was the daughter of William and Caroline (Mueller) Stephan. She graduated from North High in Worcester (1946) and Boston University (1950) in the school of Practical Arts and Letters where she was a member of its Scarlet Key Honor Society. Gloria was in the Filene's Executive Training Squad and later worked alongside her father at Stephan Barber's Supply, Co.

Gloria was a 60-year member of our Church, where she was active on many committees, particularly the Children's Library. She served as Chaplain in the Worcester County Nile which worked to support Shriner's Hospital for Children. She was actively involved in the Camp Fire organization and was Director of their day camps at Marion's Camp in Sutton and Shore Park in Worcester. Gloria loved to garden and was a lifetime member of the Worcester Horticultural Society/Tower Hill Botanic Garden.

Relatives and friends are invited to attend visiting hours on Friday, January 2, 2015 from 4-7 PM in the Britton-Wallace Funeral Home, 91 Central Street in Auburn. Burial in Hope Cemetery in Worcester will be held on Saturday, January 3 at 9:30 am prior to the memorial service which will take place at 11:00 am at the First Congregational Church of Auburn, 128 Central Street.
