FROM THE INTERIM PASTOR:

"... I don't know exactly what a prayer is. I do know how to pay attention, how to fall down into the grass, how to kneel down in the grass, how to be idle and blessed, how to stroll through the fields, which is what I have been doing all day. Toll me, what also should I have dono?

Tell me, what else should I have done? Doesn't everything die at last, and too soon? Tell me, what is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?" + Mary Oliver

Mary Oliver's poem, *The Summer Day*, is enormously popular. I've copied the last half of it here, because it speaks of a life lived with *intention*... and intention is what I want to share with us today. Oliver suggests that it is better to have some sense of where you are going, and why, in your life, better than just repetitively doing whatever we've been doing, over and over and over again. If "everything dies at the last, and too soon..." let's not waste the time God has given us.

The New Testament is filled with references to something new. There's new wine, and new tombs, new teachings, new cloth, new wineskins, new tongues, new garments, new covenants, new ideas, new things, new creation, new self, new moons, new ways, new births, new commandments, new names, new songs, a new Jerusalem, new heaven, a new earth. From the Gospel of Matthew right through to the Revelation of St. John, the New Testament is shot through with newness. For us, today, this is a call to examine what God's call for us is in this new year. This isn't newness for the sake of newness, but the newness that grows out of a recognition that what fit yesterday so well, is perhaps not exactly what meets today's needs.

On Christmas, my family gathered, and we were joined by my nephew's mentor, the man who taught him his profession and guided his career. I've known this man for probably thirty years – he's always been a man of strong opinions, wicked humor, a presence in any room. But today he's aged, he's been ill, and now my nephew, instead of being led by him, helps him get out of a chair, pays attention when he tries to maintain a conversation... their long-time relationship is new again, as it has evolved to new circumstances.

What shall we do with this new year given to us by God? How shall we live it out? What does our world need from us this year? What skills and gifts do we have to offer? Or imagine it this way: what things are we good at and which of them might we share with our community? How can we make Auburn stronger, help it continue to grow as a loving place to live?

Let's live 2024 with intention and purpose.

Here I whisper the words again, "Oh yes, my Lord, let it be!"
