My membership classes are low key and not at all formal. Rather it is a chance to talk about how we do church, and how the new members have done, or not done, church in the past.

Last, but not least, we have our new hymnals. Later in this newsletter are details in how to purchase a hymnal in memory or in honor of a loved one. The hymnal, Worship & Rejoice, was a unanimous selection of the Music Committee, the Choir, Heather and me. We anticipate needing close to 300 hymnals at a cost of \$15 each. I hope for half of the hymnals to be purchased in memory of someone specific. The rest will probably be bought with general Memorial funds. I hope we can dedicate the new hymnals on Memorial Sunday, October 28th. The old hymnals will be available for people to take home that day as well; especially those hymnals already dedicated to a loved one.

June is a busy month. Are there any months that aren't busy? May we have good weather this summer and you all have wonderful memories of summer 2012.
