Sabbath

"Remember the Sabbath day, and keep it holy. Six days you shall labor and do all your work. But the seventh day is a Sabbath to the Lord your God; you shall not do any work—you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns. For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day; therefore the Lord blessed the Sabbath day and consecrated it." (Exodus 20:8-11)

It is a fun conversation starter to question which is the most broken commandment. Is it, "Thou Shalt not Covet?" There is a whole lot of keeping up with the Joneses going on. Keeping up with the neighbors, wanting what they have, that is pure coveting — seeing what someone else has and wanting it for themselves.

This week my candidate for most broken commandment is keeping the Sabbath. What businesses are closed on Sunday? Or closed Saturday for the Jewish Sabbath? Or Friday for the Muslim Sabbath? Some store clerks are expected to be available 7 days a week to be scheduled to work. This prevents store workers from having two jobs because even if the store only gives them 20 hours a week they expect them to be available 24/7.

Office workers face the same with their cell phones. They answer work calls, texts, and emails late into the night and even answer messages from work on vacation.

One of my favorite scenes from the *Little House* series is the story Pa tells Laura after she is punished for being too rowdy on the Sabbath. The Sabbath for the Ingalls girls involved sitting quietly and hearing the grown-ups read from the Bible. The story of what Pa and his brothers did to earn a licking on Monday for upsetting the Sabbath is amazing. It is contained in *Little House in the Big Woods*. Keeping Sabbath was once a big deal enforced by law. People had to take a quiet day off every week.

When we live our lives without a break we wear down. There is little time left for a Sabbath in the new workplace. This is sad. Sabbath is a spiritual exercise with physical benefits. Studies show people who play, recreate, are recreated into people able to do more and better work after the break. We need time off to be our best at work.

In my contract I am given, "After 5 years service . . . 3-4 months of sabbatical leave." I am planning to take 2 weeks sabbatical followed by 2 weeks of vacation. So I will be gone from July 4 to 31. I had originally planned to do a formal retreat during my sabbatical, but it has been a busy year so instead I will do a Sabbath. I will be quiet, walk in nature, study scripture, and listen for the still, small voice of God. I will be in an area where cell phones rarely work so I will have to be present in nature without the distraction of text, email, or the *Angry Birds* video game.

While I am gone, Debbie Pranaitis will cover emergencies and Pastor Haringa will cover funerals. It will be weird to be gone from church that long. Hopefully, I will come back renewed, reenergized, and a re-created Pastor. May we all have timeout to live a Sabbath.
