## **Guess who’s coming to church?**

Our guest organist for Sunday morning worship on July 12 will be Mark Thallander. Mark is a free-lance organist, an organ editor for the Fred Bock Music Company; Adjunct Professor of Organ, Glendale College; President, The Mark Thallander Foundation; a reviewer of new organ music for *Creator* magazine; and a member of the executive committee of the Los Angeles Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. Mark is probably best known for his long and distinguished ministry at The Crystal Cathedral, the largest congregation affiliated with the Reformed Church in America. He joined the staff in January 1976 as a music associate to Don G. Fontana and assisted Arvella Schuller with *Hour of Power* television scripting, service programming and musical guests. Mark was Coordinator of Church Music Exploration, the national church music and worship conference held through the Robert Schuller Institute for Successful Church Leadership.

Following a horrific automobile accident in August of 2003, which resulted in the amputation of one of his arms, Mark has accepted speaking engagements in churches, schools, colleges, universities, and has been interviewed on radio and television programs, and also for newspapers, books and national periodicals. A book about Mark's accident and recovery, *Champions*, written by the Reverend Gary DeVaul, has been a great source of inspiration to thousands of people. An expanded version of the book, *Champions... Plus*, was released in October 2007.

### *The Way of Jesus*

Reflections from Rev. Mark Seifried, your Interim Pastor

*To consult moral rules such as those contained in the Ten Commandments  
can provide guidance, not to take their place, but to test them.*

*However, pride can make us cling to our understanding of a moral rule.*

*Thus, while moral rules provide capsules of wisdom tested by time,  
we must resist treating them as idols.*

(From "Listening Hearts: Discerning Call in Community" by Farnham, Gill, McLean, and Ward)

Recently a few members of the church reported that they got into a discussion with folks from other churches about the nature and manifestation of God's salvation. They could not agree with the interpretation of scripture that says only Christians are worthy of God's salvation. The specific passage that some Christians cite for this belief comes from John's gospel where Jesus says, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." (John 14:6).

I reckon a literal interpretation of that passage would lead one to believe that only Christians will see God, however, we have to consider the context. Of all the gospels, John's is the most poetic. In fact, John's references for Jesus are all metaphorical. Jesus referred to himself as a shepherd - even though he doesn't have anything to do with sheep. Jesus referred to himself as a vine, living water, the way, truth, etc. He obviously was speaking in metaphor.

So my interpretation of John 14:6 is that the way of Jesus is the way to God. The way of Jesus is love, peace, justice, mercy and forgiveness. If we live that way, we will be with God for eternity, regardless of our religion or the doctrine we subscribe to.

One thing fundamentalists overlook is where Jesus says, "You judge by human standards; judge no one" (John 8:15). He also says to the self-assured, fundamentalist religious authorities, "You know neither me nor my Father" (John 8:19). For me, the bottom line rests on the word "faith." We are a community of faith, not a community of judgment or absolute certainty. It's absurd to profess that anyone knows the mind of God.

We are a people that believes God's revelation is continuous and is not limited to scripture. We are a people with a tradition of questioning authority - even Biblical authority if that authority is used to judge others or limit the wideness of God's mercy in any way. That also is the way of Jesus. We are a church committed to ecumenism and interfaith dialogue because we believe that as we engage other faith expressions, our understanding of God's realm expands. We can do all this and still be a people who follow the way of Jesus.

One of the wonderful things about the Christian Church is its expansiveness. As I wrote in a recent column, the United Church of Christ is a "big tent." We have conservative members and congregations; we have liberal members and congregations; and every mindset in between. The commonality among all UCC congregations is our profession that Jesus is Lord and Savior of the church and her people. Anytime we stray from that belief, we lead toward idolatry. Fundamentalists lean toward bibliolatry and mistake the Bible for Godself.

Let us give thanks for our unique role in Christendom and that we really live our mantra: "No matter who you are or where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here." This, too, is the way of Jesus.

## Stewardship Message

### *Imagine yourself in the story ... almost a meditation*

*Then he said to them “whose head is on this and whose title?... When they heard this, they left him and went away. (Matthew 22: 20, 22)*

The Pharisees and Herodians are gone. All the people trying to trap Jesus left. In fact, all the stresses in your life have temporarily slunk away. Some of those stresses involve money – a debt, a legacy, a job worry. People were never able to challenge Jesus with money problems. He let them go. So can you.

You are in the story with Jesus and his circle of disciples. He told his challengers they should render God, God-things, and render the contemporary world things that belong to it. You do render God prayer, worship, little deeds of justice or compassion – a letter to your senator, work at the soup kitchen, care for someone who is young or old or lonely, your offering. But the denarius, the twenty dollar bill? You want to ask Jesus how you should render your money. There are so many good things. Groceries – good. Something for a child – prom dress, gymnastics lesson, college education – good. A vacation – good. Rent, a car payment ... a new car – good.

Do you think God doesn't care how you use money that doesn't go to church? Wrong. Jesus sits with a denarius, waiting to show every disciple a different face on it – a *this-world* place that is right for *this* coin. Jesus holds out a coin to you (or maybe a bill). What do you see? The face on the coin is not harmful but hopeful. It may be inexpensive or a big investment. It's best for you, those you love, those around you, and some you don't even know.

Holding the coin, think what spending this money means. What other things will it touch? What other people? The face on the coin will be different another day. Close your imaginary hand and ask God to bless it. When you open your hand, the coin will be gone; but the memory will be there.

## LEDGER 1773-1786

### Wednesday the 2 Day of Apreil 1777 meet upon ajoinment.

Voted to give 50 dollars to each man that shall enlist for us into the Continental army. Voted to chuse a committee of 4 with the commission officers to ajest the service befor don in the present war 1. Chose it. Comfort Rice, Samuel Eddy, Cap't. John Crowl. Mr. Peter hardy a committee for the S'd purpose.

Voted to ajoin this meeting unto munday the 14 Day of Apreil Instant at one of the clock in the afternoon. Munday the 14 Day of Apreil 1777 meet upon ajoinment. Voted the Parish will pay 50 Dollars to each man who shall enlist into the Continetal Service agreeable to the present Report of their Committee upon a trew ajestment according to their former vote.

This meeting dissolved.


1ly to chus a moderator for S'd meeting.

3ly to know the minds of the parish what they will do about preaching & to do & act any thing relating their to as they shall think proper.

4ly For the parish to hear the Report of the Committee chosen to Defend the case of Jonas Bancroft & to act any thing Relating their to as they shall think proper. Where of fail not & make a Return to one or more of us on or before the time appointed for S's meeting. Given under our hands & seal this 30 Day of September 1777.

5ly for the parish to Review the report of the Commety that was chose at the annual meeting to settle accounts with the Parish treasurer

### OUTREACH NEWS

The Outreach Committee is working with W.A.M.S. (Worcester Area Mission Society) and the wider ecumenical community in helping the homeless and near homeless. The project is Hope for Housing. WAMS purchases gift cards from Super Stop & Shop, Big Y, Shaws, & Hannaford's markets. 5% is taken off the price right there at the time of purchase and that money helps the homeless and near homeless. Then WAMS has gift cards that the outreach committee will order weekly and pick up, then sell to you, the parishioners, at face value. We are planning on starting this on May 10, Mother's Day. At coffee hour, we will have sign up sheets for the cards to order for the next week and we will have the cards that you ordered from the previous Sunday. The amounts are \$10, \$25, \$50, & \$100. If you don't use the total amount in one trip to the store, the rest stays on the card until your next trip to the store. You don't lose a cent! You pay \$50 for a \$50 card, yet at the same time, you've helped WAMS with their project.

The homeless, and near homeless, are people that are just barely staying afloat or are staying afloat, then they have a set-back like a job loss, or car troubles, and they don't quite have enough money. They just can't seem to get ahead.
