Families of God

A wandering Aramean was my ancestor.

Deuteronomy 26:5

When the people of Israel entered into the Promised Land and harvested the very first crops from their new homes, they were called to bring offerings of those crops to give to God and to share with those in their community who needed food. As part of the ritual around those offerings, each giver was to tell a story, a story common to all of them but specific to one family as well. The "wandering Aramean" was Abraham, joined by Sarah and their extended family. The story involves God in relationship to that one family which then extended out to an entire nation, a nation called to be a light to other nations.

In May, we celebrate Mother's Day, also known in UCC circles as the "Festival of the Christian Home." This day is an opportunity to remember that God relates to us not just as a church community or as a world -wide community of the body of Christ, but also to our families individually, no matter what their composition. It continues our ancestors' understanding that God's presence is known in families, and that God calls individuals and their families to order their lives around that presence, that relationship. Just as God's love is incarnate for us most intimately in our families, so we are called to incarnate our relationship with God by how we make family choices, and that includes how we share our resources. What story would you bring to God with your offerings?

Library Tidings by Gloria Whitehead

The Power of Praying Together seemed to be an interesting topic to awaken us to new thoughts and to expand the old. Stormie Omartian, the author, has helped to change the lives of millions of people through her best selling books on prayer. Her former pastor, Jack Hayford, who was instrumental in leading Stormie to her devotion to prayer and then to prayers by others in their lives, enlightens and nourishes the books' contents.

Perhaps fatigue diminished my enthusiasm in the opening pages. A book on prayer, and I was going to forget it. What's wrong? The second try paid off. Included in the topics at the beginning are: What is prayer? What makes prayer work? Daily prayer, time of day,

knees? (why an option not an issue). Sharing with God when your day goes wrong - or right, lay it before Him, finding it difficult to pray and remedies, and a portion of praise and worship of God. Am sure you could add 6 or 7 reasons to add to the list right now, BUT on to the next portion.

Praying Together - thinking of family or services at church, the ill became a narrow portion as it began to explain finding a partner and the initial technique. Forming a circle of 3 or 4 people, exchanging introductions and then, newly acquainted, each beginning to share a prayer request and then praying for each other. As circles expand in size (not too large) or in quantity, there is a bonding in sharing and praying together. At this there are some wonderful stories and explanations of growth of the "praying together."


In the section on The Power of a Praying Church, Pastor Jack explains that people do have to believe that prayer <u>does</u> make a difference. They are emboldened if they can recognize a very real penetration into the invisible realm and they can believe with greater faith. As worship is a form of prayer, so it is there that seeing power begins. The church is the people and not the edifice providing a place to gather (our church recognizes this) and a part of a greater body of Christ.

Rather than give brief explanations of the last two sections of *The Power of Praying Together*, the following is a listing of the subtitles of each.

Uniting in Prayer to Move a Nation If God's People Will Step in the Gap Will Have Eyes to See Will Answer the Call Will Humble Themselves Will Enter the War

What in the World Can I Do? When God Tells You to Pray The Issues Are Big and You Feel Small Our Mission Seems Impossible We Stop Seeing Ourselves as Victims of Circumstances We Learn to Pray Beyond Ourselves

It is hoped that this report and these last two (outstanding) listings have moved you to borrow this book. It was copyright in 2003, but is <u>incredibly timely</u> in these last references.



Rising Tide Reflections from your Interim Pastor, Rev. Mark Seifried

It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness, it was the epoch of belief, it was the epoch of incredulity, it was the season of Light, it was the season of Darkness, it was the spring of hope, it was the winter of despair, we had everything before us, we had nothing before us, we were all going direct to Heaven, we were all going direct the other way. - Charles Dickens in A Tale of Two Cities

When I was training customer service employees, I passed on a saying that I thought summed up well peoples' experience of service: "Perception is reality." You could give two people meals that were prepared identically to one another and one would think it was the best food she had ever consumed and the other might think his was mediocre - at best.

As the citation from Dickens above indicates this dual mindset isn't novel, but it does bear some reflection. Indeed these are the best of times and the worst of times. They are also the only times we have. As a community of faith, we have to decide how we will *be church* in these times.

It seems that we are on the shore, facing a rising tide of change. We have one foot on a stable dock of everything we have known and the other foot is being pulled away by the currents which the tides of change have stirred up. Will we hold our ground and strengthen our grip on the structures of the past or will we drift with cultural trends and majority opinions? Both options seem to be fear-based and stifling to the spiritual freedom which is foundational to our Protestant tradition. True freedom will never be found in structure or in culture.

It seems that the most faithful way for us to proceed is to set out to sea in a boat, which will be powered by the wind of the Holy Spirit who blows across all cultures. On this voyage, our role is not to power the vessel or to set the course, but to listen and obey our captain Jesus.

As Jonathan Campbell said in *The Way of Jesus*, "Only as we continue to move deeper into Jesus with reckless abandon will we experience the reality of the One who holds heaven and earth together. In Jesus, there is peace in the midst of storms outside us and storms that are even harder to navigate: those within us. From resting in Jesus as our Center we also gain courage to share in the sufferings of others, not with detached sympathy, but with a joining in their passion and suffering as Jesus did."

Most of those who know the church from the inside-out realize that this is the last generation of the institutional church as we know it. None of us know what the future church will look like, but we can guess. Our past shows us that the church has thrived when it met the deep seated needs of the society around it. It grew other times, but had times of rapid contraction and reformation when it became more self -absorbed.

After almost 2 years of ministry with you, it seems to me that the Spirit has begun blowing the ship in a certain direction. The church has many gifts to be mission driven: connections through the UCC and throughout the town of Auburn. By building upon and nurturing those relationships as well as those with our mission partners such as Worcester Area Mission Society, Worcester Fellowship and Dismas House, we seem poised to ride the tide.

To some, it may seem contrived to say our power comes from Jesus and we need only obey his command. We may want to feel like we have the power. So let me rephrase that and borrow a phrase from one of the civil rights activists, Willie Barrow, who earned the nickname of "Little Warrior." He said, "If you really want to be powerful, if you really want to be influential, then just serve."

We have everything before us, we have nothing before us. Our service determines the outcome. Our faith determines our perspective. I think this is an exciting time for people of faith, and the church of Jesus Christ. As the tide rises, let us look forward in hope as we set sail. Aboy Captain! Your crew is ready at your beckon call.

From the Church Historians ...

The following is an excerpt from a ledger that was stored in the Town Hall basement. It outlines step-by-step decisions made by our men in building our meetinghouse and forming our town.

George DuHamel & Paula Lubin Church Historians

1778 Worcester, Ss. To Mr. James Hart Jr. Constable for the Town of Ward

Greetings.

In the name of the Government & people of the Massachusetts Bay.

These are to will & require you forthwith to warn and notify the inhabitants of S'd Town Legally qualified to vote in Town affairs to meet & assemble at the meeting house in this town on Monday the Twenty fourth day of August Instant at one of the clock in the afternoon of S'd day, then & there to Act on the following Articles Viz.

- 1. Choose a Moderator for Said meeting.
- 2. To take under consideration and if they think proper concur with the Church in this Town in their choice of Mr. Joseph Reed for their pastor.
- 3. Grant what sum of money they may think proper as an Encouragement to Mr. Reed to Settle in the Gospel Ministery in this Town.
- 4. Grant such sums of money as they may think proper for the Annual support of Mr. Reed during his continuance in the Pastoral Office in this Town and Act anything respecting the foregoing articles which they may think Expendient.

Selectmen

5. To accept a List of Jury men agreeable to the Laws of this State.

Hereof fail not & make return of your doings to us at or before the hour of the meeting.

Given under our hands & seal at Ward this Tenth Day of August A.D. 1778

In obedience to the warrant I have warned the Inhabitants Qualified to vote in Town affairs to meet at time & place by posting up a copy at the usual place.

HELP FOR HAITI

As some of you may or may not know, my Randy and I will be going to Haiti this Fall (November $4^{th} - 12^{th}$) to do our small part towards helping the Haitian people get back on their feet. We will be sponsored by, and working with, the Monadnock Bible Conference. The Monadnock Bible Conference has a ministry division they call Monadnock Bridge Builders. Since 1983 they have been reaching beyond the ministry on the mountain by sending short term work teams to Haiti to provide the good news of Jesus and physical relief to the poor. Monadnock Bible conference also supports Redeemer's Child Orphanage in Port Au Prince.

So far they have sponsored 120 teams with over 2,500 team members. Work projects over the years have included churches, schools, hospitals, clinics and orphanages. The teams also have opportunity to visit mission and relief projects and minister to the Haitian people by personal testimony, preaching, music, children's programs, and drama, depending on the team skills.

Today, over a billion people are living in absolute poverty, *making less than \$370 per year*. Because of this **50%** of their children will die before they reach age 5. Each day 34,000 children die of hunger and preventable diseases (24 every minute). Industrialized countries include only 20% of the World population but consume 80% of the food resources. In comparison, in the United States we spend between \$35 - \$40 billion every year on diets and related expenditures to reduce calorie intake. Many North Americans literally eat themselves to death. (State of the World Need, World Relief Corporation; Perspectives on the World Christian Movement, Third Edition, 1999 Institute of International Studies)

Randy and I had already obtained the paperwork necessary to work with this group and visit the orphanage BEFORE the earthquake hit, we now feel the call is even stronger. We need your help. The trip will cost approximately \$1400 each (\$2800 total) we have been lucky enough to raise about \$800 so far but still have a long way to go. Above and beyond what we raise for the trip itself, we would like to be able to help out the orphanage as well by purchasing supplies they need on an ongoing basis.

If you would like to help please make your check payable to *First Congregational Church of Auburn* and just put **Jen & Randy - Haiti** in the memo. Every little bit helps and we truly appreciate any support we receive.
