May - the Month that asks Permission

"April showers bring May flowers." So what do May showers bring? As I write this, we are in a drought. I lived in many a drought in South Dakota. I read that the British are going to ban garden hoses this summer. Five water districts have already instituted a ban. Someone caught washing a car or watering a lawn will be fined 1000 pounds sterling or about \$1,700. That is a serious fine. So May showers in England mean being able to run water through a garden hose without a big fine.



In South Dakota May showers can mean a good crop or it can mean not getting the crop in. There is a lot of talk about factory farms and industrial farming. But farmers still rely on the weather. Rain after the seed is in the ground, can help it germinate. But some years the rains came before the fields dried out from snow melt, and large areas were underwater or too muddy to plant. Even industrial farming still depends on what nature provides. Some farmers went bankrupt, lost their land and had to move. So for farmers a drought can mean losing everything and having to give up your chosen career. Farmers in the Dakotas and Nebraska have a very high suicide rate. So May showers not arriving can be fatal.

Historically a drought meant people moved and people died. It still means that in some places. The Horn of Africa is suffering through another drought, a drought to rival the one in the 1980's that inspired *We Are the World, Band Aid* and *Live Aid.* These were massive efforts to save millions of lives and three decades later we might need another massive effort to save lives once more.

So what will a drought in our area mean? Will it affect our lives? Will it change our lives forever? Will it only be a momentary annoyance? Can it be a goad to get people for whom drought is not a killer, to help those for whom it is? As they say, "I cried because I had no shoes. Then I met a man who had no feet."

And lastly, "Suicide is a permanent reaction (it is not a solution, just as Ozzy taught us in song) to what is a temporary problem."

A clinical psychologist, ordained Methodist minister and associate publisher of *Zion's Herald* (an independent religious journal published by the *Boston Wesleyan Journal*) is Andrew J. Weaver. His co-editor, Donald E. Messer, has also authored many books and is a Methodist minister. Further, he is President Emeritus and Henry White Warren Professor of Practical Theology at Iliff School of Theology in Denver.

Chances are that you will be totally surprised at how friendship nurtured and sustained by the power of prayer and the mercy of God has blessed all of our lives. At last, the book's title is, *Connected Spirits*, and it is filled with a broad selection of friendship stories. Some could influence your life and its quality. Among older people, 80% of their closest friends are from their church congregation. For <u>quick</u> clues to <u>quick</u> inspiration, the following is only half of the list of titles:

Doreen Oughton, and I serve on the nominating committee of the Central Association Board of Directors. As member churches of the United Church of Christ, we are covenant partners with the national denomination, the Massachusetts Conference, and the Central Association of the UCC. This covenant gifts us with blessings and rights, as well as responsibilities to each body. I am writing to ask you to consider serving in the Association by accepting a nomination for the Board of Directors or the Committee on Ministry. Participation of laity on these committees is vital to their integrity. The only requirement is membership in a Central Association church.

The Board calls and plans the Association meetings; has a representative preside over Ecclesiastical Councils, Ordinations, and Installations; meets at least five times through the year to hear reports from standing committees, the Conference and WAMS; serves as trustee for Association assets; creates Ad Hoc Working Groups or Task Forces to benefit the Association; and hears appeals from the Committee on Ministry or Fitness Review determinations. The Board meetings are held on the third Thursday, mid-late afternoon, in Worcester. The term for Board members is two years.

The Committee on Ministry oversees all issues of clergy ordination, licensing, and fitness in the Association, as well as the standing of Association churches. The term is three years, and the Committee meets monthly on the third Thursday from 9am-2:30 pm in Worcester. One- and two-year slots are available for people who want to try it out before making a longer commitment.
