A WORD FROM PASTOR BRIAN

Bombing and Words

What I remember of 9/11/2001 was how beautiful a day it was — clear, blue sky; a nice, warm September day. It was a great day where I was, and blue, clear sky in New York and Washington. It seems too nice a day to be ruined by tragedy. Likewise, the marathon was on a sunny, warm April Day. The whole week was a nice week of April weather.

Immediately after the bombing The Westboro (so called) Baptist church (in my mind really a cult that survives by suing towns where they protest) said that the bombing was God's retribution. A bunch of other people said likewise. I am having a hard time keeping my cool. God has a lot better tools at hand than small pressure cooker bombs. If God wanted to punish us, there are tornadoes and sinkholes, hurricanes and nor'easters. Why are crimes said to be the work of God, but seldom natural disasters? It used to be the other way around. The Israelites thought of the land and weather as a guide to their relationship with God. If they were beset by locusts, then God must be angry with them. If there was a drought, the Israelites must be ignoring their relationship with God.

The beautiful weather makes me think that God was not involved in the evil at the marathon or 9/11. God was surely involved in the people who ran to help. God was involved in the good weather that helped, rather than hindered, the search for the injured and the investigation of who did it.

When a tragedy strikes I think there is often too much talking. Too much talking on TV. Too much guessing out loud. Not enough waiting to know for sure. Not enough praying and listening. Some words are meant to hurt. Hurt us in mind and spirit. Be careful of words. People really want to talk for God. Too often they are really speaking for the devil. I leave you with the words of Psalm 64. The Psalmist knew the power of an evil tongue:

- 1 Hear me, my God, as I voice my complaint; protect my life from the threat of the enemy.
- 2 Hide me from the conspiracy of the wicked, from the plots of evildoers.
- 3 They sharpen their tongues like swords and aim cruel words like deadly arrows.
- 4 They shoot from ambush at the innocent; they shoot suddenly, without fear.
- 5 They encourage each other in evil plans, they talk about hiding their snares; they say, "Who will see it?"
- 6 They plot injustice and say,
 "We have devised a perfect plan!"
 Surely the human mind and heart are cunning.

- 7 But God will shoot them with His arrows; they will suddenly be struck down.
- 8 He will turn their own tongues against them and bring them to ruin; all who see them will shake their heads in scorn.
- All people will fear; they will proclaim the works of God and ponder what He has done.
- 10 The righteous will rejoice in the Lord and take refuge in Him; all the upright in heart will glory in Him!

Library Tidings by Gloria Whitehead

This is the first of two subjects in this month's *Library Tidings*. May the #1 issue be easily solved. The libraries, adult and children's, are missing books. They've "not come home" for several years in too many cases, and the library "Truant Officers" are asking for your "concentrated" help. Just in case you're new and/or unfamiliar, the Adult Library at the rear of the Sanctuary is open almost as often as the church is open. The Children's Library is on the lower level. It's marked as such on its door which is at the end of the long hall that starts at the entrance from the parking lot. It is open on Sundays, on scheduled weekdays for *Here We Grow* preschool, and at various arranged requests. Easy borrowing and return instructions are in both locations, but never hesitate to ask questions. Will you please see if you can find ANY church library books (marked as such inside the cover leaf of the book) at home or anywhere you may have left one? If, by chance, it may be damaged, please return it anyway. Explanations are appreciated. Too many of our "hard covered children" are missing from their shelves and we're hoping and concerned that they come home.

And now, #2 on the list . . .

I Love Spring - doesn't that sound welcome? Clara Juh Lewis continues on in her book for early readers.

"It's a tree in bud and puddles of mud. It's days getting long. It's kites in the sky. It's spring. That's why . . . I love spring."

And then with a rhythm she contrasts it to other seasons. It's best when read aloud.

Next, *And Then It's Spring* - with tricky and humorous illustrations by Erin Stead, you'll be won over to Julie Fogliano's pleasing explanation of how it gets here.

In a thin, small paperback there's a book containing two stories, *The Pearl* and *The Red Pony*. They were written and published by John Steinbeck in 1947 and 1933 respectively. Eighty years ago? The wording and descriptions are awesome throughout both and, but for fixed facts of the period, the two stories could slip into 2013. *The Pearl* is exceptionally large and becomes a source of symbolic dreams until it disappears. It's all taken from a Mexican folktale.

Regarding *The Red Pony*, the strength of the grandfather's personality prevails as his impatient son, his grandson, Jody, and Billy Buck, a hired hand, all fit into a descriptive blend in the California ranch mountain scene. Nature's wonders and creatures of the woodland are a perfect backdrop for a great message.

It's a perfect time to thank Vi Hanks for her gift of *Quiet Times for Mothers* by Julie Graham. This little paper-back, filled with daily readings, provides a chance to turn a day around by spending several minutes with our divine Shepherd.
