Everything Is Relative

I just grilled out for the first time this year. The weatherman said the high temperature was 48°F. I thought it was lovely weather. The sun was shining; there was a breeze, so I wore a hoodie. Rewind 6 months and I was putting away the grill because the high was only 48°F. I was looking for a new parka and preparing for more cold weather. Later, I was standing outside with one of our snowbirds and some people who had been here all winter. The snow bird was shivering and commenting on the cold while the rest of us said how nice and warm it was.

So is 48 degrees cold or warm? It is all relative. The answer is how we feel, and how we feel is not totally in our control. Those who feel warm are out and about, dethatching lawns, raking leaves and debris, walking dogs. Those who feel it is cold are inside with layers on shivering.

Crime is down. Down from the levels of the 70's and 80's when I was growing up. It was dangerous to be a kid in the 70's, but I felt safe and explored my world with great independence. Now crime is rare. Do we feel safer? Objective stats say we are safer from crime than at anytime in my life. Yet children today do not have the freedom I had to meander around the town and into the woods. It is too dangerous for kids to be out and about. We might feel fear ourselves to be out in public. Why don't we feel safer? Is it that places that once seemed safe, like malls and schools now look like targets? Are kids safer now or then? It is all relative.

The answer is how we feel and how we feel is not totally in our control. We can say we are safer all the time, but if we do not FEEL safer than we will not act like we are safe. We will be less trusting, more standoffish, less neighborly.

What we do is relative to how we feel. Do you feel God's love? Do you feel part of God's family? Do you feel blessed? If so, how does that change what you do? If you don't feel God's love, if you do not feel a part of God's family, it does not mean you do not have it. It means for some reason right now you are not feeling it.

I pray you feel blessed. I pray you feel loved. I pray if you do not feel blessed and loved those feelings will come upon you soon.

Peggy Hayes, 59, of Auburn, passed away quietly in her sleep at home on Sunday, March 23, 2014. Peggy was the daughter of the late James D. and Margaret M. (McKie) Hayes. She is survived by her brother, James D. Hayes, II of Auburn.



Peggy was born in Marlboro and moved with her family to Auburn. In September of 1961 Peggy was a member of the first class of eleven students to attend the newly opened Our Lady of Mercy School for Exceptional Children in Worcester. This began what was to become an uninterrupted involvement between Peggy and the institution, now known as Mercy Centre, which lasted for over 50 years. In June of 2011 Peggy was recognized at the 50 Year Anniversary Celebration of Mercy Centre with the Certificate of Excellence for her 50 years of "Service and Dedication" to Mercy Centre. In March of 2003 Peggy was honored by the Emerald Club of Worcester County at their annual St. Patrick's Day Dinner when she was named the recipient of the Special Service Award for her work ethic and dedication. In addition, on March 31, 2003 Peggy was given the Key to the City of Worcester by then Mayor Timothy Murray, for her commitment to Mercy Centre and for exemplifying "the heart and spirit of Worcester."

Active in the off-site job program at Mercy Centre, Peggy could be seen working at local businesses including: Wrightline, Anna Maria College, The Food Pantry of Worcester and Sposato's Florists to name a few. Peggy was a familiar face within the disabled community of Greater Worcester through her involvement in activities such as the Special Olympics, bowling and basketball leagues, square dances, and other social events and activities.

Peggy was a member of our Church and was laid to rest beside her beloved parents in a private service at Hillside Cemetery in Auburn.

Donald R. Temple, 62, of Jefferson, died peacefully at home on Tuesday, March 25, 2014, under the loving care of his family. Born in Clinton on February 22, 1952, Don was the son of Raymond F. and Janet (Elliott) Temple and lived in Sterling before he and his wife moved to Jefferson in 1978.

Don graduated from Wachusett Regional High School in 1970 and enlisted in the United States Army in 1972 where he proudly served his country during the Vietnam Era. Don worked at Harrington Richardson in Gardner, as a meat cutter at the Appletown Market, and continued his career later at St. Gobain where he worked for 25 years. He was an active member of the Hiram O. Taylor American Legion Post #189 in Sterling where he served several terms as Commander. He was also a Past Commander of District Four, Worcester County Council and Past Vice Commander and Sergeant at Arms of the Department of Massachusetts American Legion, and a member of the 40/8. He loved his hometown of Sterling where he continued the family's tradition of organizing and participating in the annual Memorial Day and Veterans' Day Parades, serving as Parade Marshall for many years. Don also enjoyed baseball and was a coach and umpire for Sterling Little League.

Besides his beloved wife of 35 years, Jeanette (Woodcock) Temple, Don leaves his two daughters, Margaret Temple and Gretchen Temple; two granddaughters, Carrina and Camrynn Carnrike; three brothers, Robert, Earl, and James Temple; three sisters, Barbara DeStefano, Marjorie Johnson and Beverly Temple; and several nieces and nephews. Don will be remembered for his quiet and unassuming nature and as a devoted husband, father and grandfather. He will be greatly missed by his family and friends.

A funeral service was held here at our Church on March 31. A private burial service was held at Oakhill Cemetery in Sterling.
