# "April Showers Bring May Flowers"

As a child I remember my mom saying, "April showers bring May flowers," as I looked out the screen door at the rain falling. It meant another day that I had to play inside. In the days before video games playing inside was the worst. My mom did not want me making loud engine or explosion sounds. I was not to run around and bump into things. Playing indoor was to be quiet play. Quiet, fun play is not possible.

When it rained, my mom liked it quiet. I think the rain helped her sleep. For some reason the sounds of the Indy 500 or WWII did not help her sleep.

The saying, "April showers bring May flowers," was supposed to teach me that the bad thing today would bring benefits later. For a young boy, is May flowers really a benefit? If the saying was April showers bring April mud which your mother will not yell at you for playing in, that would have been a benefit.

Most of my childhood play involved getting wet, muddy, or dirty. I played in the sandbox, which was really a dirt patch where grass would not grow. I played in the little streams formed by snow melt. I played in bigger streams using big rocks to form dams or racing stick boats.

Playing in the snow was done a lot. I played outside until part of my body got numb. I would guess as much time was spent putting on snowsuits, gloves and hats as was spent actually playing in the snow. What is it about the sound of a snowsuit zipper that made me immediately need to use the bathroom?

Another thing April showers would bring is high water. Often the Androscoggin River would flood; houses near the river would be damaged or swept away. Roads would be blocked and we would have to take long detours around the flooded areas.

One of the blessings we received this spring was that there was no flooding. The record snow melted slow and steady, so the rivers never leapt their banks. We often do not see the blessings God gives us. I imagine a lot of emergency managers were planning for floods that, thank God, have not come.

I imagine playing in the rain involved, in my mother's mind, 60 pounds of mud brought in the house by a 40 pound kid. It involved wet *everything*, ruined clothes, and the sniffles. Playing in the rain would be cold, and clammy, and wet. But, I still wanted to do it. Until I was an adult. Many things we did or wanted to do as children, we forgot or abandoned as adults. "When I was a child, I spake as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child: but when I became a man, I put away childish things."

So when I hear the rain fall on the roof, from time-to-time I think of that young boy who wanted so bad to play in the mud and hated naps ... and I lay down and take a nap.

May we all enjoy May flowers.


