It's time for a diversion from what's mainly chosen to make up the news from home and abroad. The days are longer, the sun is stronger and your energy has expired from winning your personal home improvement contest. The constant upward creep of gas prices has you frugally planning your trips on the road sooo...name what's an all 'round good bargain these days! As a matter of fact, one that can take you traveling, one that can tell you how to improve your personality and, in turn, the world. And reduce you to tears or laughter AND more for free? Of course—it's a book. So here are two recent additions to your library.

<u>Illegal Tender</u>-various commentaries classify this book by David Tripp as a classic thriller, illuminating a first rate adventure story. It wasn't until 1944 that it was discovered that a few had escaped FDR's government recall of all the gold and the meltdown in 1937. There's more. <u>Dark Tide</u>-by Stephen Pulea, The Great Molasses Flood of 1919. Can you imagine a 15' high wave of molasses that at its onset traveled at 35 mph. It took lives and homes. The book contains an authentic piece of Boston's history.

UCC Congregations Share a cup of Justice

The UCC Coffee Project began in the spring of 2004. The UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries partnered with Equal Exchange, a fair trade organization that offers fairly traded gourmet coffee direct form small-scale farmer co-ops in Latin America, Africa and Asia. Now over 500 UCC congregations are buying coffee, tea, cocoa and chocolate allowing a better price to the coffee grower. In addition, for every case of coffee, tea, cocoa, or chocolate purchased by participating congregations, Equal Exchange makes a contribution to UCC Justice and Witness Ministries to provide additional support to coffee growing communities, investing in farm improvements, training and their standard of living.

The Outreach committee has recently purchased Equal Exchange coffee and will be serving it at coffee hour. There will be an information table set up in Fellowship Hall if you are interested in ordering a case. If you are looking for a smaller quantity, Shaw's in Auburn also sells Equal Exchange 1 lb. Bags of 4 different kinds of coffee. The Outreach committee also has \$2 chocolate bars for sale. Outreach is just trying to spread the word about Fair Trade throughout our community. The U.S. represents 20% of the world's total coffee market!

"Rockets That Fire You Up" Goddard Rocket Art Event

Chicago had their cows, Miami had flamingos, now Auburn will have their rockets. As part of our Summer Solstice Celebration, we are sponsoring an art event to celebrate the work of Dr Robert Goddard here in Auburn. Any individual from middle school age and up is invited to participate. Families are also encouraged to work together to create their version of a "rocket that fires you ". A coloring page for younger children will also be available. All rockets entered will be on display at the Celebration and Kid Fest on Saturday June 17th

on the church lawn. At that time, all in attendance will be able to vote for their favorite rocket. Some of the rockets will be featured on a float in the July 4th parade after which all rockets will be returned to the artist. Rockets will be made of 8 inch Sonor tubing with attached feet making it approximately 28" tall. Participants will need to fashion their own "cone" that relates to the theme they have chosen for their rocket. Rockets may be decorated any way you wish. You may choose to have it reflect a hobby or interest of yours, something that "fires you up". It can be finished in any medium that you choose. Some thoughts and suggestions have come forward already such as photos of your favorite places decoupaged, tiled, painted, adorned with recycled materials or any combination of things.
