Let us pray for all the people suffering from all these evil things, and may we, the good people, commit ourselves to doing good to help others.

May God bless those who suffer. God who sent His own Son to suffer, knows the pain that is often part of human life. May God's loving presence be felt in the time of tragedy. God knows suffering, God goes with us through the valley of death, and has a table ready for us when we pass out of the darkest part of the valley.

May God bless us all and be with us in triumph and tragedy, Amen.

THANK YOU to everyone who has helped with this year's pumpkin patch. The pumpkin patch total as of the end of the day October 23rd = \$17,220.75. Of that amount 67% goes to support the Navajo Reservation in New Mexico. From Christian support and with diligent coverage, First Congregational's volunteers (to date) have earned our church 33% profit from numerous public sales. With 8 more days until the close of our patch, there is hope and faith that sales will continue to bless us. Thank you for the generous support.

SPECIAL THANKS TO DEBBIE MAHLERT, LINDA MAHLERT, SHEILA SKOG, JUDI TAFT and SUE MACPHEE for all they did in organizing this fundraiser.

Our thanks to the Auburn community for supporting our fundraiser and supporting the Navajo Indian Reservation in Farmington, NM where the pumpkins are grown on 1,200 acres or approximately 2 square miles of pumpkins. During the harvest months of September and October over 700 Native Americans are employed as well as a full time off-season NM staff that is comprised entirely of Native Americans. This has a positive and lasting impact on a region with 42% unemployment.





Historically, forebears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa, Arickara, and Hockak in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, and northern Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis, MN. These churches and their pastors are supported by CAIM. CAIM is also an invaluable resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations in the U.S.


