# FROM THE PASTOR

Dear church family,

My carved pumpkin from the pumpkin patch is turning to mush, with a fascinating science experiment of cobweb-like mold on the inside. Fortunately, I have a farmer friend who is delighted to share this pumpkin mush with her goats and pig, and two more beautiful pumpkins just begging to be carved in time for Halloween.

We are entering the season of Allhallowtide, when autumn sheds glorious colors and leaves us with barren branches, when we remember our loved ones who have passed, and the veil is thin between this world and the next. I relish these weeks before the holiday momentum really accelerates, a time intended to reflect upon the necessary autumn within each of us; we are always changing, shedding who we were and become something new, shaped by loss and faith's tug to emerge again.

Our Remembrance Sunday (November 10<sup>th</sup> this year) is a sacred way for us to mourn together, allow the reading of names and the lighting of candles to be a healing balm. Further, there will be an opportunity to deeply explore these themes through conversation in a workshop I will be offering, "The Spirituality of Dying" on Thursday, November 7<sup>th</sup> at 6:00pm.

Before we focus on remembrances, we have our Stewardship campaign and a glorious Consecration Sunday planned, the day when we ritualize our giving through remembering the story of the Joash Chest and its inspiration for our generous offerings before God and one another. King Joash commands that a chest be made and placed at the gates of the holy temple, for offerings to be received.

#### "Then all the leaders and all the people rejoiced, brought their contributions, and put them into the chest until all had given." (2 Chronicles 24:10)

Through their joy, their giving was so generous, that the chest was overflowing every day and the funds were used to completely repair and staff the house of God. I have never participated in a worship with an actual Joash Chest, and I love the embodiment of this biblical story for our context now. Let's truly embrace this timeless story and give with rejoicing and rejoice with our giving!

We are giving to not only sustain our vibrant congregation in this moment, but to preserve and boldly imagine its future. As we invest deeper into our faith and church family, there are three themes that I would like us to discern and deepen:

**Welcome** – How can we be a church with a wide, allembracing welcome within our sanctuary and throughout our town, region and world? **Safety** – How can we be a church that is genuinely safe, a true sanctuary that is comfortable and restful, protected and protective?

**Imagination** – Do we dare imagine where God leads us? Can we envision our congregation in one year, five years, ten years, fifty? Let us boldly imagine our church as a relevant beacon of hope for the duration....and live into the dream.

In the meantime, I pray for our necessary autumn to be a blaze of colors as we transform into whatever is next.... living into the mystery with trust. We have work to do, FCC of Auburn, and God has great plans for us.




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## HURRICANE RELIEF:

## FROM OUR DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

This past Sunday, we wrapped up the life of Moses in our Sunday School classrooms. The children did a great job listening, asking questions, and understanding the important role that Moses has in the Bible. There are many questions surrounding the life of Moses and many miracles surrounding him as well. As a little baby, Moses survived the mass murder of many baby boys. He was raised by Egyptian royalty and then proceeded to lead the Israelites to freedom while receiving from God, and then providing, the first rules or 10 Commandments to his freed people. Through him, we see many miracles of God, including, but not limited to, the 10 plagues of Egypt and parting of the Red Sea. Moses also is the one that brought the Jews toward their promised land. These are a few things that Moses DID... but what can we learn from Moses?

We learn a lot from Moses! Without getting too deep and turning my *Tidings* into a Biblical journal, here are just a few things we can take with us after learning the life of Moses. Humility. Moses was humble and even unsure if he could do the things that God told him to do. This teaches us that we do not have to be perfect for the Lord to work His miracles through us. In fact, it should be noted that God often works through the weakest and meekest of us all! Moses was both a leader and servant. He was a servant to God and a leader of the Israelites. Fear and obedience. Moses feared God and was therefore obedient. He understood, he experienced the great power of God (Yahweh) and fell quickly into an obedient role. Did you know that the life of Moses is important not only to Christians, but to all Abrahamic religions including Judaism and Islam? Yes, I would certainly say that Moses had quite the impact on all of us!


