Sunday afternoon the confirmation class and several adults went to Boston to attend the Common Cathedral, a special church for the homeless, after which they helped feed the homeless.

On Monday a toilet over flowed and more volunteers got to work cleaning it up. There were several overlaps of volunteers in the various groups.

All this suggests a vitality and a caring at First Congregational that we sometimes despair of seeing. We should not have had to have as many crises to reveal it. However, it was there and it was exciting to experience the help that was so readily shared. A hearty thanks, not only for all of your labor for the church but for being there and being willing. You made a big difference. Hallelujah!





November is American Diabetes Month, National Alzheimer's Disease Awareness Month, National Hospice Month, Pancreatic and Lung Cancer Awareness Month, National Adoption Month, and National Family Caregivers Month. The third Thursday of November, Nov. 17, is the Great American Smoke-out!

It is flu shot time. Also, a reminder that HANDWASHING is the best way to prevent the spread of germs.

November 19th at 3:00 p.m., I am hosting a Medication Management Program. The Auburn District Nursing Association has a grant to offer this free service to seniors and their caregivers. The goals of the Medication Management Program: (1) promote better understanding of your prescription medications, (2) explain prescription medications' actions, side effects, interactions with foods, alcohol, and other medications, such as over-the-counter preparations, herbals, and vitamins, and (3) provide tips and equipment, such as medication boxes and calendars, to manage your multiple medications safely. The program is about one hour long and is before our next church supper.

I have booked a Certified Babysitting course with Pam Daigneault to be held at the church December 27 and 28. It will run 10:00 a.m.- 2:30p.m. with a 1/2 hour lunch break. You can call Pam at U-Mass Memorial- Memorial Campus at 508-334-5474 to register and find out all the details. The limit is 20, so don't wait.

There is a list in Fellowship Hall to sign if you are CPR certified. Please sign this or speak to me, Rev. Knox, or call the church office. This is a good thing to have posted with our First Aid kits in case of an emergency. There are First Aid kits in the closet with the choir robes, in the kitchen, and the church office. I also have the DME (Durable Medical Equipment) wheelchairs, walkers, canes, crutches, etc. that were donated to be loaned to others in need. There are also some adult briefs that can be taken. Please, help yourself to this equipment, or check with me or the church office if you need anything. God Bless! Happy Thanksgiving!

Library Tidings By Gloria Whitehead

We have so many new books that we're exposing several this month.

<u>Church: Why Bother</u> by renowned author *Philip Yancey* gives his reasoning of the goodness of the organized church and why he returned to same. "The church fails in its mission and makes serious blunders because it is comprised of human beings who will always fall short of glory of God. Anyone who enters the church expecting perfection does not understand the nature of that risk or the nature of humanity. Just as every romantic learns that marriage is the beginning, not the end, of the struggle to make love cook, every Christian must learn that the church is only the beginning."

The following two books carry messages of a real Thanksgiving: <u>All God's Children Got Robes</u> by *Margaret Jeusea*. The author dedicates her book to three doctors: "These three men in their unique robes of white moved in unison according to God's ticking of the clock of time. They moved on the tide of their God given wisdom, knowledge and medical and surgical expertise and turned the ordinary into extraordinary days of fortune".

In spite of her being diagnosed with cancer and her husband's death shortly after, in her darkest hours Margaret knew that someone was "caring for her". This is a well written, heartwarming story of blessed assurance.

Do you need some more?

<u>Chicken Soup for the Unsinkable Soul</u> by *Jack Canfield* and *Mark V. Hansen*. Within are 101 outstanding stories about overcoming emotional hardship losing a loved one, physical challenges, financial obstacles, illness or disease and life challenges. This book exemplified "When the going gets tough, the tough get going."

And then, before you can believe it. Trustees Roof Update

By the time you read this, the new roof on the church should be almost complete! This has been a great accomplishment for our church and we should all be proud of it. Thank you to Bob Murray & Bob Johnson for obtaining the quotes and coordinating this entire project. Also thank you to Cindy & Mike Dube for all of the great fund raising ideas they came up with this past year.



Even though the construction is complete, our funding for this project is not. As of October 18th, we have raised approximately \$41,000 towards the new roof. This means that we need to borrow \$17,000 from invested funds to finish paying off the roofing contractor. The Trustees would like to pay off this loan by the end of 2006 to minimize any long term effects on the church budget.

While we will continue to have fund raising events over the coming year, many people who could not give one time gifts towards the roof have asked about making a year long commitment or pledge towards the roof fund. If anyone is interested in making a "roof pledge", please see Nick Stockhaus as we have special envelopes that can be used for this purpose. Any monies collected over the amount needed to pay back the loan will be put in the capital reserve fund for future building improvements. Again, thank you to all who have helped make this big project a success!


