Library Tidings by Gloria Whitehead

As the seasons change, we're bringing a couple of changes/additions to the libraries for this month.

In memory of her mother who died recently, Sue Campbell has given *Final Gifts* (#10). The authors, Maggie Callanan and Patricia Kelley, are experienced hospice nurses whose compassion and communications with the dying allows them to reveal their needs, feelings and more. Beautifully written, Sue found this book very helpful.

Light From Heaven (#1) is the last, long anticipated volume of Jan Karon's Mitford Years series.

Blood, Sweat and Tears (#6) by Michele Turk has been given by Marilyn Plue. What is one of the most visible symbols of help? Hint: Its founding in America was in 1881 by a woman who had lived in a town adjacent to Auburn. You're right - The American Red Cross. However, a Swiss businessman by the name of Henry Durant founded the first Red Cross in 1863. His dream was to reduce the suffering of wounded soldiers, specifically during a battle in Solferino, Italy. This book is compiled with outstanding stories from 29 volunteers and staff members from all over the states. It's subtitle is "An Oral History of the American Red Cross."

The 7th and final installment in J.K. Rowling's tale of Harry Potter is in. For the present time, it will be found on the table in the adult library. Word is that many youngsters and oldsters had it read within 24 hours and others have read *Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows* (#1) for a third time.

Beneath the Streets of Boston (#6) - *Building America's First Subway* by Jim McKendry has been given by Pastor Ken. Enhanced by the outstanding artwork of the author, this historically accurate description of BeanTown's first "Big Dig" takes you deep into the burrowed tunnels between Boston Harbor, Beacon Hill, and the Old Statehouse. Miles were dug with picks and shovels that ultimately relieved traffic and took riders to their destinations for a nickel.

The collection of inspirational books (#10) is now split between the low bookshelf under the left, rear window and the bottom 2 shelves to the far right in the bookcase with the display.

The Unselfishness of God (#10) by Hannah Whitall Smith has a new card, but its author lived from 1832-1911. The Christian Secret of a Happy Life is her outstanding work which has been in print for over 100 years, but is not available at this time. However, The Unselfishness of God, which she completed at age 70, is also a winner— a detailed retrospective of her fruitful life and Quaker background. Her style, especially for the times in which it was written, flows with amazing ease.

First Congregational Church

Extract from the Worcester Daily Telegram November 13, 1896

Architect E.T. Chapin of the new Auburn Congregational Church telegraphed last night for church pews for that building.

The Indiana Church Furniture Company of Richmond, Indiana has secured the contract. It is hoped that the pews, two hundred and fifty sittings necessary for the auditorium, will be here by January 1st, at which time it is expected that the church will be completed in every detail.

There will be no cushions used, the seats being the kind known as the curb back and seat style.

Here We Grow Preschool



Here we are, beginning the month of October, which means September is over, and we have made it through the first month of school. I am proud to say that *Here We Grow* only has two openings at this time. That means we have 124 children and the majority of them are no longer crying. It takes a few weeks for the children to get comfortable with their new teachers, friends, and surroundings.

During the month of September the children had a tour of the building to help them understand just how large it is. It also helps them to understand that the building is a church and needs to be respected as such.

For the second year in a row we have asked the children and their parents to create a page of family pictures to go into the classroom family albums. The albums will be in the classrooms so the children can look at them if they are missing someone, or maybe they will share their picture page with their new friends, or maybe it will help children understand that not all families are the same, and that's okay. Whatever the reason for looking through the albums, it will be a great way to share each others families.

Once again this year we decided to have Parent Orientation during the school day. It was held on the first day of school for each session. The turnout was great. Most of our parents attended, and those that didn't have been with HWG for a few years. Since I did all three orientations, I may have forgotten to mention everything each time, but all information is in the family handbook.

During the month of October our plan is to visit the apple orchard, have the police and fire department visit, and celebrate Halloween, but I'll wait until next month to tell you all about that.

From the Choir Room

Thank you to Paul and Audrey Kosky for the generous donation of music. Audrey had been a church organist, and we gratefully accept this donation in her memory.

Anthem highlights for October:

This month the First Church Choir will introduce two new anthems: Let the People of God, October 14th, and I Surrender Lord, October 28th. Let the People is a joyful, powerful anthem. Eight pages of continuous eighth notes in the vocal and piano part make for a rhythmically driven, "stay awake" piece! I Surrender combines text and harmony in an expressive tribute to the worship experience. The text: "Lord in the quiet of this place, I am surrounded by Your grace. I come with heavy heart and soul, I long for You to take control." The moving chorus: "And I Surrender Lord," gently reminds us to leave our burdens in God's hands. This tender and peaceful anthem has been donated by Garry and Mona Mahlert.

Joyful Noyse will sing a new anthem on October 28th, *Victory Chant*. The youth will divide into two groups, one echoing another. We are pleased to have several new children this year, and I'm proud to note that the older kids are very helpful and supportive of the younger ones!

For a change, I thought this newsletter submission should be devoted to the "nuts and bolts" of the Music Ministry: our long term goals, immediate plans, finances, and fundraising efforts.

This year the choir and Music Committee will be focusing on 3 major goals:

- I) The purchase of a baby grand piano
- 2) The recording of a CD
- 3) The updating of the sound system.

These are lofty and financially demanding goals; however, we are well on our way towards achieving the first two.

At last year's meeting between the Trustees, choir, and Music Committee, it was voted on to purchase a baby grand piano as part of the sanctuary renovation. Because there was a fund set up in the 1980's for "instruments" that was never used, the Music Committee (per Bob Luther's okay) was able to vote the fund (\$7,000) be used toward a new piano. Although a new baby grand would normally run up to three times that amount, we are looking to buy used and stay close to the fund range. Structurally, the baby grand makes sense as it is much lower than the upright, allowing the congregation better visibility. Musically, First Congregational will have a quality instrument to service the church for many decades to come. (The Yamaha, recently donated by Connie Hodgkins, will remain in the choir room.)

To fulfill our goal of making a CD, the choir and Music Committee have been actively fundraising. To date, the choir has chaired the yard sale, sold parade tee shirts (with the church logo), held a bake sale and formed the "Anthem Tribute." In exchange for heading up the yard sale, the Trustees gave us 50% of the proceeds towards our budget. We still have many tee shirts available in all sizes, small, medium and large. Adult sizes are \$10, and youth are \$8. The shirts are blue with a white logo on the front left depicting a picture of the church and the words "First Congregational Church of Auburn." If you are interested in purchasing one please see Gordon, Linda or Debbie Mahlert.

Since the bake sale was quite a success, the choir will hold another one November 4th. (Shirts will also be available then!)

The Anthem Tribute was originally started as a way to honor loved ones on an ongoing basis, while also supplementing our budget for new music. Because the choir size doubled, so did the cost of ordering new music. Our budget, however, could not be increased. As a result, we actually ended the year 2006 over budget and in debt! Although our fundraising efforts are going well, we did cancel the organ tuning for this year (at a savings of over \$400) in order to balance our budget, and stay on track with our CD goal. Anthem Tribute music will be on display during coffee hour on October 28th.

The updating of the sound system will NOT be a complete overhaul, but will be an addition to the existing system. At present, we have one cordless mike and two clip -ons. We would like to have four cordless mikes available for two reasons: the Praise Choir and Joyful Noyse. In order to get the full Praise Choir up and running, the sound equipment is a must. The essence of "Praise Music" is the sound system, and therefore NOT optional! Two mikes for the instruments (guitar, etc.) and two for the singers (2 or 3 to a mike) would work. We are planning a half hour of Praise Choir/Praise Band music tentatively scheduled for November 4th during coffee hour. This will give everyone a chance to hear what this music is, and have fun singing together, "full blast" outside the church service. For this to happen, we will need to borrow equipment, which is why the date is tentative.

The mikes will also be used for Joyful Noyse. Children's voices are, by nature, not mature and benefit from amplification. One mike works for two children, at most. As we have several new members this year, 3 mikes spread out would be ideal.

In closing, our Music Ministry is growing and thriving. I envision endless possibilities and bright horizons as we strive to be instruments for God's plan.

October has many issues listed on the National Health Calendar. I will list a few. It is "Talk about Prescriptions" Month, Halloween Safety Month, Healthy Lung Month and National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. It is also Lupus Awareness Month, National Dental Hygiene Month and National Physical Therapy Month. October 1st is National Child Health Day and the 1st to the 5th is Drive Safely to Work Week. (I think these should be ongoing, not for a day or a week). October 7th to the 13th is Fire Prevention Week. The 15th to the19th is

National Health Education Week, and also National School Lunch Week. October 19th is National Mammography Day and the 21st to the 27th is Respiratory Care Week.

I have information out on the health table in Fellowship Hall. I also have a few books about cancer in the Adult Library. These books can be kept. I just want to have them out where they will be seen. Please take them, whether it be for a friend or for yourself, to learn about what someone is going through. I can get more.

It seems that I keep mentioning hand washing! Well, I can't stress it enough! There are " bad germs" out there and the best way to stay free from them is proper hand washing. One of the "bugs" is MRSA (Methicillin Resistant Staphylococcus Aureus). It used to be primarily diagnosed in hospital settings; now they are finding it in the community. It often looks like a spider bite, mainly in skin lesions such as abscesses, boils, pustular lesions (where pus is) and cellulitis. Forty percent of all MRSA infections diagnosed in Emergency Rooms are CA - MRSA (Community Acquired MRSA). Incidence is high in the pediatric population and adolescents that are healthy. Another germ is VRE (Vancomycin Resistant Enterococcus). People used to get Vancomycin to fight other bacteria, now it is resistant to some germs. These germs are difficult to get rid of, they spread. Please be careful and don't forget to wash your hands. Wash for at least 15 seconds, or sing "Happy Birthday" while you wash. I will have handouts about these germs on the table. My information comes from the Center for Disease Control. I'm not trying to scare people, but I want to educate you on the seriousness and prevention of these germs.
