What Is Shameful?

You may have heard there is a cartoon made originally for girls I enjoy. It is called *My Little Pony: Friendship Is Magic*. It is sweet, girly and about friendship. The characters are pink and yellow and purple and are six young adult ponies making their way in their chosen careers of farmer, daredevil, scholar, party planner, veterinarian, and clothing designer. It is also about fighting dragons, helping your friends, confronting your friends when they act evil and other things a good kid's show should teach.

But what I say, doesn't really matter. I lost a lot of you at "Little Pony." I lost others at "girly." That is fine. There is so much in this world we can not experience it all, we have to make snap decisions as to what we will spend time on.

In an earlier time I might have kept my enjoyment of this girly cartoon a secret. This show, however, has a large group of male fans, who call themselves bronies. (bro ponies). So I am not alone.

I like *Star Trek* but never went to a convention, so I am not a trekker; likewise, with *Star Wars* and *My Little Pony: Friendship Is Magic*. There are brony conventions and brony websites. I just watch the show when it is on and that is about it. People make fun of bronies, after all half the internet is trolls. (A wonderful word, troll. A troll is a big ugly monster that lives under a bridge and it also is about the fishing kind of trawling. A troll tries to get people angry by insulting things people care about, hoping someone will take the bait and insult the troll. Do not feed the trolls.) Bronies react to trolls with "I'm gonna love and tolerate the stuffing out of you." A nice reaction to an internet with too much nastiness, name calling, and hate.

Star Wars and *Star Trek* used to not be cool. Now almost every show and movie reference them in some way. So the geeks and nerds won the culture. Likewise, internet people are unwilling to feel shame for things they love.

I wish young people would better understand that what they put on the internet is forever. Kids have posted videos on the internet of their crimes. Videos that were used to convict them. Other teens post pictures (and a picture is worth a 1000 words) without thinking about what that picture will say to a wide audience. We are not used to our little pictures being seen by others, maybe thousands of others.

Privacy is a rare thing. If there is no privacy, nothing to keep secret and share only with trusted friends, can there be any shame?

We are said to have a natural sense of ethics and morals. We feel shame when we break the natural laws God placed in our hearts. Is the internet, where each group no matter how small or shameful can find a place of safety, going to end shame? I think not, there are still rules; rules strongly enforced on the internet and the internet does use shame and shunning (called banning). Just like our colonial ancestors did.

So what is left to feel shameful for? Being hateful. Trying to hurt others. Being a troll. Being a criminal. Yet time and again, someone is shocked that others object to the picture or video they posted. Even when what they posted is illegal.

Shame is not a bad thing. We can't have a law against all bad behavior. Some bad acts we need to shame people into not doing. Other things we should just let slide.

If you do not like *My Little Pony: Friendship Is Magic* ... I'm gonna love and tolerate the stuffing out of you.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Library Tidings by Gloria Whitehead

The Cross Gardener by Jason R. Wright

The story opens with an orchardist named Wayne being introduced to a 4 year old, orphaned lad. He had been delivered by an EMT whose name was John and with that name, the infant became a member of the apple orchard family. Having previously adopted Tim and Scott, Wayne Bevan now happily became the father of 3 boys. There was a family tradition that squeezing the hand 3 times said, "I love you", and a return of 4 squeezes said, "I love you, too." However, hearts were shocked and heavy when Tim drowned on his high school senior trip. In a familiar high clearing in the orchard where Grandpa Devan had been buried for years, Tim was laid to rest. Scott and 9 year old John dug a small hole for the apple wood cross, painted white, that marked the spot.

During harvest time, Father tried to teach the migrant workers English. Among about 30 people, mainly from Mexico and Spain, were Mateo and Jose Miguél, Father's 2 most trusted men who drove the orchard truck. One evening as Father was doing his "apple math" a sheriff's deputy stopped by to see if the truck was missing. It became evident that it had been in an accident when it was found in the woods. The apples had been delivered, but both men were dead before anyone could get to them.

The driver had fallen asleep at the wheel and drove into a bridge abutment. Sorely distressed, Father paid to have their bodies flown home to Mexico. After Church, on the following Sunday, 4 of the family members went to the crash site where they planted 2 apple wood, painted white crosses by the side of the road.

John had met Emma Jean in school and their relationship built beyond marriage, the birth of Lou Lou and later Father had died. He, too, had the treasured white cross ritual. Emma Jean had once referred to the white picket fence she and John had constructed with TLC as a whole series of white crosses.

A yearly highlight for this Bevan family of 3 was the annual Shenandoah County Fair. "Only 1 cotton candy, Lou Lou," Emma Jean had announced. Being pregnant with their excitedly awaited son, Daddy John was in charge of rides this year. The list had about been completed as animals had their visit, when Emma Jean agreed that they could take the long way home for Lou Lou. As Emma Jean's head rested against the window, Lou Lou was fighting sleep in the back seat while snuggling the pink bunny when THA-BOOM! The deer's impact was harder and the sound louder than could be imagined. The van fishtailed. The deer fell in a heap. Lou Lou managed to get to the deer after she opened the automatic door. John was coping at best with a complicated and crucial situation. The shock was too great for a dear, baby boy and when John gave Emma Jean a 3 times squeeze, she replied with 1. Such tragedy left scars and more significant white crosses.

The scene has been set. The dialogues can be slightly excessive at times, but it's almost like a prelude to high points and keeping a reader attentive. When he is consumed with grief, a total stranger appears to John at one of the grave sites. Yes, *The Cross Gardener* becomes the author's messenger of the many lessons and forms of coping with the vicissitudes of life — of the strength and foundation of FAITH. Such it is that John, Lou Lou and the rest of the Bevan family also began to celebrate life again.

Adams Square Church Members Transform a Building into a Legacy

The Adams Square Congregational Church closed its doors on January 16, 2011 after a long and fruitful ministry in the Burncoat neighborhood of Worcester. Like most churches which close, despite being a loving and faithful congregation, the dwindling membership became too small to effectively continue. A lasting legacy is left in the hearts of all those who were touched by the church's ministries over the years.

The congregation also left a lasting financial legacy. In addition to gifts to local Worcester churches, Adams Square Congregational Church gave \$50,000 to the Massachusetts Conference. \$10,000 was directed to help victims of Hurricane Irene. The other \$40,000 was unrestricted. The Board of Directors of the Mass. Conference voted to place the unrestricted portion of the gift into the Sustaining Pastoral Excellence Endowment Fund. In this way, the legacy of Adams Square Congregational Church will live on through vital congregations who benefit from the Pastoral Excellence Program by having well trained, well resourced and well supported pastors.
