FROM THE PASTOR

Is Columbus Day popular here in Massachusetts? In South Dakota, Columbus Day is more often called Native American Day. In both states most people do not think about the reason for the holiday. Is that an old man complaint? "In my day we knew the history behind our holiday, but kids today..." Did we ever care about the reason for the holiday more than celebrating the holiday?

Columbus Day does not celebrate Columbus' birthday; it commemorates the day he "discovered" America. Soon he discovered Natives of America and took some back to Europe as slaves. The Native Americans commemorate this day as the start of the war of extermination; Europeans fought against Natives. Native American Day is a day of loss.

Christopher Columbus went on a dangerous journey. He opened up new lands to Europeans. The continent changed radically over the next 500 years. Was that change good or bad? It was good for me, my family, and my ancestors. I know Lakota (Sioux) who do not see the last 500 years as good for them. Ancestors died, tribes were destroyed, the old ways were lost.

Thinking about the destruction that Columbus brought is something we try to avoid. It is unpleasant. We prefer the Columbus of, "In 1492, Columbus sailed the ocean blue." That is if we even think of anything more than, "Yayyy! a 3 day weekend."

This month we are having a fall fair on Columbus Day weekend. It is the return of an old event. There are jewelry groups and craft groups meeting weekly to prepare for the event. I will have a pet blessing out on the lawn from 1-3, Saturday, October 11th. Plus, we will have our usual pumpkin patch.

All these events are meant to be a time of celebration, fellowship and blessing. We hope to raise money for the church. But it is also a time to get together — have fun, be productive and build a stronger community, both in our church and town.

That would be a good use of Columbus Day, to try to bring people together instead of tearing people apart.

The Prudential Committee has held three meetings with representatives of the Trustees and Stewardship Committee highlighting the current financial position of the church.

<u>Living Within Our Means</u> was the theme of the meetings. We encouraged the Stewardship Committee to be energetic in its solicitation of pledges and the Trustees to be respectful of a <u>Reasonable Budget/Deficit</u> that can be fully supported through pledges and fundraisers.

Our years of operating beyond our income has to be brought under control. As we go forward, the church members will be called upon to pledge and to vote on a church program that we can support.

Please be mindful of the \$20,000 deficit in the current 2014 fiscal year budget that is above and beyond our current income. That deficit can only be solved with increased member giving or modification of our church program.

While we welcome in the beautiful month of October, *Here We Grow* begins its 26th school year. The staff and most of the children have settled into a nice routine. I am happy to report that the majority of crying has stopped, for the children and the parents.

Here We Grow began the school year with 37 three-year-olds and 69 four and five-year-olds. At this time we have a few openings in the A.M. & P.M. three-year-old class and a few openings in the four-year-old A.M. & EXT. day classes. Our one new teacher has settled in nicely with the help of the returning staff. Gina Basili is working with Helen Ethier in the morning three-year-old class and the four-year-old afternoon class. All of our returning teachers are doing what they do best, helping and supporting each other for the good of the children and the school.

During the month of September the children became familiar with their teachers, new friends and new surroundings. They had a tour of the entire building and met Denise and Pastor Brian.

Each child received homework the second week of school. Continuing on with one of our traditions, the children created a picture page of their families and added it to their classroom family album. It is one of the ways we become familiar with the many different types of families attending HWG. It is also a great way for the children to open up to someone, just by talking about their families.

We had a great parent turnout for Parent Orientation which was held a week before school started. Many questions were asked and answered with the hope that any and all fears were put to rest. For the 5th year in a row we offered a "Meet the Teachers" time before the actual first day of class. Again, we had a good turnout.

Starting the first day of school, all the children are taught our prayer that we say before our snack and lunch times. Many of the children teach their families the same prayer at home. I would like to share the prayer with you and again, thank Gloria Whitehead for finding this prayer for us.
