Our church is in the wonderful position of having many opportunities to provide ministry in numerous situations locally and nationally and globally. I say “wonderful” because the church and this church were established for ministry. Service and ministry is what saves us from becoming a comfortable, self-serving, feel good organization, and allows us to be a Christian church.

On October 22, we can participate in the CROP WALK which raises money for local needs (Auburn Food Pantry) and for CROP, an international relief and development agency. Sign up with Avis Britton.

On October 28, we will be rehabilitating a mobile home in Auburn inside and outside. The confirmation class and Youth on a Mission will be working. We are looking for about a dozen additional adults to help us. There is a sign up sheet in Fellowship Hall. For Christmas, our White Gift project will again be to supply coats and winter jackets for families in the main south area of Worcester through the Goddard School. We will keep you informed as we get specific information.

In January, we plan to send four or more adults to New Orleans to help rehabilitate the church of the Good Shepard, homes of parishioners, and other community needs. This is supported by the Outreach Committee and the Sibley Grant which was voted last year. Contact the church office if you are interested. We need to make reservations.

We are always in need of people to serve on boards and committees to provide leadership for the church. Please consider saying ‘yes’ when the Nominating Committee asks you to serve.

We are in need of more adults to work with our youth and to expand our youth ministry. This is a wonderful rewarding ministry if you can commit the time.

We also need the financial support of every member, parishioner and friend to provide such a broad spectrum of ministry.

Ministry is the object and purpose of church membership. Help us be what God has called us to be.

Are you doing what you can to advance the kingdom of God within your Church and with those around you?



***Our WAMS, UCC sponsored WAYS workday for this fall needs the help of willing hands and hearts.***

**Our primary project for this fall is the trailer park home of a disabled man and his family in Auburn.**

The floor is falling through, the weather-protecting metal skirt is eroding, the walls around the tub are rotting, the bay window is leaking the winds of autumn.

This project will be more financially demanding than most we take on and also needs many willing hands and a good core of skilled folk. *Can your church help?*

**On Saturday 10/28:**

**9 AM to 5PM**

**~We would like about 20 youth and adults to remove the present skirt and replace it – and a skilled person or two to supervise.**

**~We need about 8 skilled and unskilled folk to help with the floor and the other projects.**

**~Materials or money to purchase them can be donated – carpet, corrugated metal skirting, sub-flooring, tub surround, lunch, drinks or snacks for workers.**

**On Thursday, 10/26:**

6 to 7PM - We need about 10 folk to set up shelters for furniture storage and start to move a few possessions.

**On Friday, 10/27:**

6 to 7:30 PM - We need 6 – 10 folk to move most of the possessions.

**On Sunday, 10/29:**

3-5PM - We need about 6-10 folk ready to return any furniture and possessions to the home.

Musical highlight for October include:

'*We are the Hands of Christ*' to be sung October 22, and '*Jesus is the Song*' to be sung October 29. Both anthems are new for us. '


*We are the Hands of Christ*' by Joel Raney, opens in the soulful key of g minor. The minor key correlates to the text 'No voice to speak his kindness, no eyes to see the pain.' As the key opens up to G major, the text proclaims '*Christ has no hands except your own to reach the world and make him known, His love can change humanity by your touch alone.*' It is unusual for us as it is mostly unison. While not difficult chorally, the unison singing strengthens the message of the anthem, effectively forcing the listener to 'hear' the text above the music.

'*Jesus is the Song,*' by David Danner We sing in four parts.

This anthem gradually builds from a quiet and simple statement of faith to an exuberant and celebratory ending. There are occasional hints of black gospel in the accompaniment but the overall feel of the anthem is gentle and free flowing. The text joyously proclaims '*Jesus is the song of life, Jesus is the song of love, Jesus is the song!*'


