On September 7th and 8th at Lemansky Park over 40 teams of people will walk the track in the annual Central South County Relay for Life. Set up begins at 8 a.m. and will continue until the event begins. Highlights of this event include the survivor and caretaker walk and the luminaria ceremony. We invite you to join us. If you have some time available Friday, September 7th, come to Lemansky Park to see how you can lend a hand. Survivors and their caretakers are invited to attend our opening ceremony and walk the survivor lap and attend the dinner immediately following the lap. The Relay for Life is a fundraising event for the American Cancer Society and we are dedicated to helping the world celebrate more birthdays.

### What is Relay For Life?

The American Cancer Society Relay For Life is a life-changing event that gives everyone in communities across the globe a chance to celebrate the lives of people who have battled cancer, remember loved ones lost, and fight back against the disease. At Relay, teams of people camp out at a local high school, park, or fairground and take turns walking or running around a track or path. Each team is asked to have a representative on the track at all times during the event. Because cancer never sleeps, Relays are overnight events up to 24 hours in length.

Relay began in 1985 when Dr. Gordy Klatt, a colorectal surgeon in Tacoma, Washington, ran and walked around a track for 24 hours to raise money for the American Cancer Society. Since then, Relay has grown from a single man's passion to fight cancer, into the world's largest movement to end the disease. Each year, more than 3.5 million people in 5,000 communities in the United States, along with additional communities in 19 other countries, gather to take part in this global phenomenon and raise much-needed funds and awareness to save lives from cancer. Thanks to Relay participants, we are creating a world with more birthdays, a world where cancer can't claim another year of anyone's life. We invite all cancer survivors in the community to attend Relay For Life because they are the reason we Relay.

I hope everyone had a nice summer. There's still a few weeks left to enjoy. Now it's back to busy schedules in and out of church.

September is National Alcohol and Drug Addiction Recovery Month, National Cholesterol Education Awareness Month, National Food Safety Education Month and Baby Safety

Awareness Month. It is also: National Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month, Children's Eye Health and Safety Month, Childhood Cancer Awareness Month, National Pain Awareness Month, National Preparedness Month, Healthy Aging Month, National Yoga Month, Prostate Health Month, Leukemia and Lymphoma Awareness, Sports and Home Eye Safety Month.

I am working on having a flu clinic after church either the end of September or the beginning of October. I haven't secured the date yet, but it is going to happen! I'm also working on getting someone to speak about Medicare, even before the election! If anyone is on Medicare and is hospitalized for 3 or more days, go to billing and make sure the patient is listed as an inpatient NOT ON OBSERVATION! Yes, you can be in the hospital, having all kinds of tests, CT scans, MRI's, etc, and still be considered on OBSERVATION! If you find this to be the case, ask for the patient representative and get it changed! Medicare will bill you and you will owe! A supplemental insurance may pay some, but watch your status! Stay tuned. I will get more information!
