FROM THE PASTOR

How do you know if you are the most powerful person who ever lived? If you ever get to the level of Bill Gates or Genghis Khan, how will you know if you are the greatest?

MASSACHUSETTS CONFERENCE ANNUAL MEETING 2013

The Massachusetts Conference U.C.C. met June 14th and 15th for its 214th Annual Meeting at the Sturbridge Host Hotel.

Conference statistics presented for 2012:

373	active churches
68,968	members (estimated)
168	churches reported no change in membership
71	churches lost members
74	churches increased members
175	reported church school enrollment estimated at 17,972 children, youth and adults
217	churches reported youth groups
870	ordained and licensed clergy

- The meeting voted on a change in leadership structure to four ministry councils instead of committees and commissions. Also, attendance would be allowed by real time voice teleconferencing.
- The meeting voted on a draft proposal for a new way of funding the conference and National U.C.C.
- The meeting recognized 10 clergy who were celebrating 50 years of ordination, and 10 newly certified Christian educators.
- Among the resolutions considered was one urging divestment in fossil fuel companies by church agencies, churches, and members in response to carbon emissions and global warming. This resolution is to be presented to the U.C.C. General Synod by the Mass. Conference and at least 5 other conferences.
- As it does at each annual meeting, guidelines for clergy compensation and professional reimbursement were presented.

This is only an overview of items on the agenda for about 14 hours of meetings. This is also an opportunity to meet and greet friends and colleagues and re-affirm the wider church that we all participate in.

Please remember that Cradle Roll starts at 9:45 a.m., so the parents can get the children settled and come to the sanctuary on time.

Highlights of this event include the survivor and caretaker walk and the luminaria ceremony. Survivors and their caretakers are invited to attend the opening ceremony and walk the survivor lap and attend the dinner immediately following the lap. What is Relay For Life?

The American Cancer Society Relay For Life is a life-changing event that gives everyone in communities across the globe a chance to celebrate the lives of people who have battled cancer, remember loved ones lost, and fight back against the disease. At Relay, teams of people camp out at a local high school, park, or fairground and take turns walking or running around a track or path. Each team is asked to have a representative on the track at all times during the event. Because cancer never sleeps, Relays are overnight events up to 24 hours in length.

Relay began in 1985 when Dr. Gordy Klatt, a colorectal surgeon in Tacoma, Washington, ran and walked around a track for 24 hours to raise money for the American Cancer Society. Since then, Relay has grown from a single man's passion to fight cancer, into the world's largest movement to end the disease. Each year, more than 3.5 million people in 5,000 communities in the United States, along with additional communities in 19 other countries, gather to take part in this global phenomenon and raise much-needed funds and awareness to save lives from cancer. Thanks to Relay participants, we are creating a world with more birthdays, a world where cancer can't claim another year of anyone's life. We invite all cancer survivors in the community to attend Relay For Life because they are the reason we Relay.
